(October 2021). Nebraska and Texas A&M were both approved for chartering prior to the pandemic but had to delay their chartering events due to travel and gathering restrictions. During the meetings, our brothers elected six new District Archons who are poised to help lead us through the next biennium.

One of the highlights of my year was attending the 100th anniversary celebration of Oklahoma Alpha, which was a spectacular affair. During the celebration banquet, I was honored to present the Phi Kappa Psi Medal of Honor to Brother Richard Bower Oklahoma '56, who has literally dedicated his entire adult life to Phi Kappa Psi. I can't express enough how fortunate we are to have a brother like Richard Bower.

2021 was a time of growth for Phi Kappa Psi. The organization saw three chartering's: Washington and Lee University, Texas A&M University and the University of Nebraska.

"Our recent chartering at these institutions shows Phi Kappa Psi's commitment to expanding our brotherhood and attracting the finest men on campus," said Director of Expansion Elijah Williams *Ball State* '17.

Members of these chapters reflected on their time in Phi Kappa Psi and what it means to be a recognized chapter.

Nebraska Alpha – University of Nebraska

The re-chartering process was stressful but very rewarding. I came into the Nebraska Alpha Colony not knowing what it meant to be a colony, let alone what all went into running a fraternity. But as time went on, I became aware of how much we wanted to become an active chapter again. In the year leading up to the ceremony, we had to fulfill many requirements that tested not only the member's motivation but also our alumni board. We all banded together to earn our charter back. On March 7, 2020, our hard work paid off. The feeling was unlike any other I've ever experienced in my life. We earned our charter back a little over two years after we were allowed to be back on campus, which we thought was impossible.

The chartering ceremony seemed to be unrealistic at the time due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The world shut down and we were all sent home from campus. The chapter was suspended by Washington and Lee (W&L) in the spring of 2015. W&L lifted its suspension of Phi Kappa Psi in March 2018. Throughout the entire suspension period, members maintained connection with each other and continued to recruit men of Phi Kappa Psi character, integrity and vigor. When the

Thirty-seven new initiates were added to our membership register after hearing words of encouragement from SWGP Moyer *Alabama '91*, Brother Ransom and Brother Tangen *Minn.-Duluth '03*. This brought

our total number of initiates since 1855 to 1,688. Many more will be initiated in the spring of 2022.

The Phi Kappa Psi Foundation offers two annual Ralph "Dud" Daniel awards to undergraduate members who excel in leadership, particularly outside the chapter. This year, Brother Adrian Erazo *Binghamton '19* was a recipient of the award. "I joined Phi Kappa Psi in the spring of 2019," shared Erazo. "Since then, I have always strived to contribute as much as possible to the fraternity and our community."

Analyzing Involvement

Due to his involvement, both on and off campus, it was no surprise that Erazo earned the scholarship. "On campus, I am a board member and Head of the Technology Sector for the Binghamton Investment Fund," said Erazo. "It's a student run, multi-class portfolio managing \$600,000 of assets on behalf of the Binghamton University Foundation and School of Management. I also serve as the chief financial officer for the Binghamton Data Science and Analytics club." The club teaches students programming and other technical skills through weekly workshops held throughout the semester. "I am also involved with Binghamton's Finance Society, with the mission of helping students pursue careers in front office finance." He also served as a writer & editor for Binghamton Law Ouarterly, a student run law review journal and was the head of communications for Generation Vote. "Generation Vote is a political advocacy group empowering students to make their voices heard by getting involved in the political process." On a typical week, Erazo can be found working 11 to 15 hours with the various organizations he is a part of.

Outside of campus, Erazo interned at Jefferies, a global investment banking firm, as an equity research spring associate. "I supported the Emerging Markets Strategy team by conducting research on macroeconomic trends to help generate investment ideas for institutional investors." Erazo previously interned for Travelers as a business insurance underwriter where he analyzed historical loss trends and helped devise a new underwriting strategy for an unprofitable line of business. Erazo also worked with a US Congressman



as a campaign finance intern. "Through donor research, outreach and data management, I helped my team secure \$1.2 million in campaign donations." This past summer, Erazo interned at Mizuho in their Corporate Development and Strategy Division. He will be returning to Mizuho to work full-time in their Investment Banking Division after graduation.

While trying to live up to his full potential, he is also helping others do the same. "I try to give back as much as I can. I am a part of the Binghamton School of Management's mentoring program, where I get to help underclassman get accustomed to college life and help them with personal and professional development. I am also teacher's assistant in the finance department, which allows me to be a resource for students struggling in tough finance classes." Whether it's volunteering in philanthropy events or doing small favors, Erazo knows that everyone has the potential to make a big difference for others. "I strive to exemplify this by striving for excellence in everything I do."

Memorial Scholarship

The Honor Connor Fund is a memorial scholarship fund managed by the Phi Psi Foundation and collaboratively supported by the University of Colorado (UC), Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity and Connor's family. Every year, the Honor Connor Fund will award \$3,000 in scholarship gifts to deserving applicants from Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity attending UC. This scholarship is payable annually as \$1,500 for the fall semester and \$1,500 for the spring semester. Candidates must meet the following criteria:

- > Enrolled at UC and entering sophomore, junior or senior year
- > Active member of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity
- > Demonstrates the spirit of giving through community volunteering
- > Exhibits a financial need for assistance

David Thomson, Connor's father, hopes that through this fund, the focus will be to carry on the good work started at Colorado Alpha, helping the community through being selfless men of strong character. David also commends former Chapter President, Frazier Bourgoin *Colorado '19* and current President, Josh Fein *Colorado '20* and Vice President Charlie Loewenguth *Colorado '20* for powering through when Connor's absence is so devastatingly felt and recognizing the need to keep his memory alive.

This year's activities were held Sunday, October 17 and included a barbecue for brothers and family members at the chapter house. One gentleman in attendance was so moved, he donated \$10,000. The two inaugural scholarship winners were announced and presented with Tommy Bahama shirts and plaque to commemorate the occasion — and to honor Connor.



More Than You Know

Too often in life, we don't fully comprehend what's right in front of us.

We don't appreciate all we have, or who we have in our lives. It takes a different perspective, an impassioned plea, a devastating jolt to make us notice. Even then, it's still a process, the fog of preconceived notions gradually lifting so that our minds — and hearts — can eventually see things in a clearer light.

David Thomson experienced this with his son, Connor Thomson *Colorado '18*. Staying close to their Denver home, Connor chose to attend the University of Colorado and join Phi Kappa Psi. David wasn't opposed to Greek life, but he didn't want the distractions that accompanied living in a chapter house to affect his son's future successes.

A single father, David worked hard to provide for both his sons, taking them on philanthropic trips to third world countries and sharing his compassion for others. He emphasized being well-rounded, neighborly, educated, respectful and to excel in whatever they chose to do.

In early 2020, David began warning Connor about his declining GPA and to not let all the social activities

get in the way. "I was really pushing him about his grades, about showing leadership," David said. After a few months of receiving similar messages, Connor emphatically replied, "Dad, you don't know who I am!"

This prompted a frank discussion, after which David realized while he had been focused on grades, Connor's passions were focused on people. He was a leader in the fraternity and on campus, but not in a way his dad could clearly see without getting to the heart of the matter. Connor saw a need and he acted on it. "There was so much more to who he was. He had developed a real heart for people. He had learned that he had a purpose and was needed," David said.

Connor would wake up early, make coffee, put it in a big container and take it to the homeless near the campus, many of whom he called by name. He walked alongside brothers and fellow students struggling with addictions or personal issues. Connor's mission: to serve others and treat them with respect.

"I didn't have any idea how many different ways Connor had impacted people until after his death," David reflected. "And I'm still learning." At the memorial service a young man came up to David and told him, "I was getting ready to take my life. Connor found me and stayed with me. He saved me. He saved me, and now he's the one who is gone."

There was much more to Connor than his trademark Tommy Bahama shirt and ready smile. He was a son who learned by example to be compassionate and empathetic. He was a brother, a loyal comrade, a trusted friend with a deep-seated desire to help those in need.

David encourages not only Connor's brothers at Colorado Alpha but also alumni, friends and colleagues to make looking outward a priority. "Practice the 'art of neighboring,' which means to be a kinder person, finding ways to help your neighbors, whether they are right next door, in another city, state or country," he said. "A handwritten card or letter is a wonderful way to show gratitude or support." A word of encouragement or simple act of selflessness goes a long way. Sometimes the expense of time is all it takes — a call, a text, a note — and you have made a genuine connection, a lasting impression.

To keep the art of neighboring and gift of serving alive in his son's name, David began the Honor Connor Fund. His hope, by fueling the passion, is for others to experience Connor's legacy, and inspire them to say, *"How can I be like that?"*

Aiming for Brotherhood

Before Solomon Goldstein *Case Western '21* ever set foot on a college campus, he already had a successful career in archery under his belt.

What began as a hobby in the 8th grade, when he joined the school's newly minted Archery Club, transformed into a full-fledged passion during high school. To pursue archery at the highest level, Brother Goldstein left his North Carolina home his senior year of high school and moved to Arizona. This cross-country move allowed him to pursue archery with a



professional instructor while he finished school. During this time, he trained with Alexander Kirillov, a world-renowned former coach of the Russian and Venezuelan Olympic archery teams. This intensive training and commitment to his sport led Goldstein to be ranked third in the junior division in the United States.

With training and competition in full swing, Goldstein took a gap year following his high school graduation to devote himself to his passion. Knowing he wanted to continue his education. Goldstein decided on Case Western Reserve University, an institution which most closely aligned with his personal and academic goals. Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic cut

his experience short. With restrictions in place, he began looking to join an organization to kindle friendships. He sought an organization of men that shared the same values and would have a positive impact on his life. Phi Kappa Psi checked all the boxes. At Case Western, Phi Psi is known for being a passionate group of men who have strong values, good character, sense of community, and care about their academics.

Joining Phi Kappa Psi allowed Goldstein to find a community that so many were missing in a time where social distancing and life on Zoom were required. The typical challenges of starting college, meeting people and finding one's footing in a new place were even more difficult for him and his fellow freshman. "It was challenging at times starting school in 2020," Goldstein said. "Phi Psi provided a great group of people who I didn't know at first but was really excited to meet and get to know all of them. Now that I'm living in the house, it's just so different." Goldstein found an organization, who amid all the chaos and uncertainty of the pandemic, provided a community of support and friendship far from home.

As life returned to some semblance of normality, so has Goldstein's college experience. He keeps busy with his studies, Phi Kappa Psi activities and by continuing to enjoy archery, now as a club sport. "On campus [the brothers] are always very supportive, asking how training is going with the club as I manage my schoolwork." It's the support, day-to-day life with his brothers, that stand out to Brother Goldstein as the highlights of his Phi Kappa Psi experience. "Coming back to the house late at night, seeing brothers cracking jokes and playing video games, those are things you only get in a brotherhood." He along with his brothers recently had the opportunity to bond during a road trip to a brother's lake house for fall break and volunteer at a Halloween carnival at Cedar Point.

Archery will always be a part of Goldstein's life, however, his sights are now set on a different career path. Brother Starts 'Helping Hands for Afghans' Initiative

In the wake of the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan, refugee families began settling in the San Diego area and needed assistance.

Brothers from the California Lambda Chapter, led by Behzad Hashemi *San Diego State '20*, responded by launching a GoFundMe called, Helping Hands for Afghans. "This entire crisis in Afghanistan has been one of great importance to me, given my mother came to this country as a refugee from Afghanistan herself," Hashemi said.

The refugee families have not only been separated from family and friends but also thrown into an entirely different culture with a new language to learn. "My grandmother worked as a Military Wartime Interpreter for the Marines in Afghanistan just a few years ago," Hashemi recalled. And his mother currently works as a caregiver to refugee children in Michigan. This effort is deeply personal to Hashemi, and his brothers were fueled by his passion.

Hashemi came up with the idea of a fundraiser after having a conversation with his father and enlisted his chapter brothers to help. They began by setting up tables on campus, selling wristbands for \$2 each. In three days, they raised \$2,000, and their efforts expanded.

In late September, Hashemi and some of his brothers helped a family of six move into an apartment not far from campus. The Fraternity has been working closely with a local resettlement agency and since this work began, at least a dozen chapter brothers have come alongside.

Chapter president, Jack Egan *San Diego State '20*, said Hashemi has been relentless in recruiting brothers to help these families. "It was an issue many of us were informed about but to see it affect someone in your chapter's life like that made all the difference," Egan admitted.

Along with the help from San Diego State students and chapter brothers, a local law firm, King Aminpour, recently donated \$1,000. Bringing total funds raised to more than \$13,000 (at time of publication). "Another corporate real estate company has reached out to me, and we are hoping to strike another deal with them," Hashemi said. Working together on an ongoing community project like this has been extremely important to California Lambda.

Hashemi is thankful to be a part of the bigger picture beyond the local impact. "This is a tangible difference that I think people can get together and see the difference you're making," Hashemi said. "These are people who helped the U.S., they are supportive of our efforts, and I think it's our job to have their backs."

His deep connection to the Afghan people is the reason Hashemi has gained unwavering support from the Fraternity.

"He's been a shoulder to lean on when anybody's been going through any turmoil in their life. I was not surprised that he would be the guy to start a charity like this for the house," Egan said. "He's a beam of light in the chapter."

Philanthropy Project:

Honoring the Ultimate Sacrifice

Moved by the actions that occurred with American troops in Afghanistan, Brothers Kade Borlick *Purdue '20*, Kody Layton *Purdue '20* and philanthropy chair, Aaron Berghoff *Purdue '21*, decided to



investigate opportunities to provide assistance. After looking into it, they found something close to home: Cpl. Humberto Sanchez. He was from Logansport, Indiana, which is less than an hour away from the chapter house.

Sanchez died in a bomb attack in Kabul, Afghanistan on August 26, along with 12 other U.S. service members and more than 150 Afghan civilians. Sanchez was 22 years old. "This was quite

inspiring to us, and we decided to take part in a scholarship that was founded in his honor," Berghoff said.

The chapter brothers were able to raise a little more than \$6,000 using GoFundMe and tabling on Purdue's campus. They felt supporting the scholarship fund would be a way for Sanchez's memory to live on in the community. "It was an honor to be able to do this for all of us involved. I would like to thank all my Fraternity brothers and families who took part," Berghoff said.



New Chapter in the History of Indiana Epsilon

It was termed a "red-letter" day by Phi Delta Psi (the precursor organization to Phi Kappa Psi on Valpo's campus) Brother William Theurer.

The day, July 10, 1933, when the group assembled to purchase what is affectionately called the Wolf Den, Indiana Epsilon's first house. The purchase from the Valparaiso Building and Loan Association, was the first step in what would become a legacy of home ownership for the chapter.

Later in Indiana Epsilon's history it was welcomed into the structure that was known to those that attended Valpo as 801 Mound Street. Serving the chapter for nearly 50 years, the facility far outlived its initial life expectancy of 25 years.

Born of a vision for the future, October 2, 2021, ushered in a new phase for Indiana Epsilon, as the House Corporation and chapter dedicated a new chapter home at 814 Union Street. Working with an Indianapolis-based architectural firm to develop the facility plans and closely with Hagerman Construction Corporation, through Brother Mark F. Hagerman *Valparaiso '65*, serving as the contractor, the new facility offers the amenities demanded by today's undergraduates and allows the chapter to attract and retain the absolute best students, athletes and scholars. The walls stand as a proud symbol of what Phi

Psi represents just as the walls of the Wolf Den and 801 Mound Street facilities once did.

One alumnus during the ribbon cutting celebration commented, "Phi Psi taught us how to lead with integrity, hold ourselves to a higher standard and find joy in serving others. No matter the path we chose in life, we can all look back at our time in the chapter house, be it the Wolf Den or 801 Mound, as some of the most formative years of our lives."

Thank you to the hundreds of investors in the *Pride in Our Past, Foundation for the Future* campaign. The House Corporation's partnership with the Phi Kappa Psi Foundation has been instrumental in helping the chapter complete the campaign, shared Campaign Co-Chairman, Jamie Acton *Valparaiso '88*. While the physical structure is completed, the House Corporation has needed to debt service part of the project. Thus, the funding need continues – alumni contributions of approximately \$200,000 more are necessary.

The House Corporation recognizes the incredible difference that the new facility will make. Its new strategic location within the Valpo campus, along with the amenities, and a house director will allow the chapter to continue setting the standard for fraternity life at Valparaiso University.







The Comeback Kids

Resiliency and hard work define Minnesota Beta, this year's Grand Chapter Award winner.

In 2015, coming off two years of probation, Minnesota Beta committed to changing for the better. The brothers dedicated long hours to revamping their chapter. They focused on recruiting quality men, establishing beneficial programs and putting the brotherhood first.

"I was an active member at that time, and we had been given a blank slate," recalled Andrew Zobel *Minnesota '14*, the current PHI KAPPA PSI chapter advisor and alumnus. "You can look at all the things we had before that were damaged or completely gone because of that probationary period. That was one way to look at it, but we definitely looked at it as a blank slate, something to be excited about, something to really own and that was kind of our rallying cry."

Zobel notes that many of the programs and ideals that were implemented during his time as an undergraduate only began to show their full potential recently. While the reward to their hard work wasn't instant, it grew into something that would allow MN Beta to be recognized as the most exceptional chapter of 2021. With the guidance

of Brother Zobel, support of alumni and the drive and determination of the MN Beta brothers, Max Nelson Minnesota '19 the current GP, has pushed his chapter to be the best they can possibly be.

> "For the 2019-20 year we ended up winning Chapter of Excellence and we were pleasantly surprised how that came out," shared Nelson. "But I knew as I was running for president in fall of 2020, that we took not winning Grand Chapter personal. During my presidential speech, the platform that I ran on was that we needed to view COVID-19 as the challenge not the excuse. This was an opportunity to completely start with clean slate like in 2015

and take a shot at Grand Chapter for real."

The brothers got to work. The chapter raised around \$13,000 for B Positive, a foundation that provides funding for childhood cancer research and provides resources to help the families of children with cancer, through a completely virtual fundraising effort. The chapter recruited around 20 new members and retained the full senior class through Fall 2020's





COVID-19 restrictions. They held brotherhood events that continuously strengthened their bonds, like Pint Night where all the brothers bring a pint of ice cream and watch movies at the house together. In total, the MN Beta brothers completed 3,500 community service hours over the school year and raised \$25,000 for three different organizations.

Throughout the past few years MN Beta has established a wide array of programs and activities to ensure they stay at the top of their game. They do mid-semester grade checks, have a dues kickback if a brother makes the Dean's List and a moment at the end of chapter meetings where the brothers can talk about anything they have on their mind.

"Words at chapter is such a cool, intimate thing because you'll have guys telling the funniest story you've ever heard, but also guys willing to cry and willing to be so vulnerable with each other. You're talking about 18-to 22-year-old men, and it's the exact opposite of what society and the social norms would expect them to be. It's so cool to be able to see a group of guys who love each other so much and who are willing to be vulnerable and authentic," Nelson says.

Moving forward Nelson and Zobel hope to keep the momentum going. The brothers have established the 1609 Club, a nod to their house number, that helps fund the brotherhood and the connection between alumni and undergraduates. Through their commitment to the brotherhood, their resilience in the face of adversity and their dedication to getting the little things right, MN Beta hopes to continue to receive the Grand Chapter Award for many years to come. And to any chapter that might be struggling, in one aspect or another, Nelson shares "I think it comes down to focusing on what makes our house and Phi Psi so special are the guys who are in the house and the brotherhood we share. What it boils down to is that we are in a fraternity, we are brothers and I think that's what everything needs to build from."

The weather was warm this past May in the Florida Keys. Heartbeat.

Many flocked to cheer on participants as they gave their all. Heartbeat. For some, this was their first run. For others, this was a test of their ability. Heartbeat. Laces tied, feet hitting the pavement, this was the challenge Brother Michael Willis LSU '11 was looking to overcome. Heartbeat.

Young adults are usually full of energy, the life of the part, gogetters. Michael's older sister, Rachael, was all of these. Known for her determination, "can-do" attitude, she never took anything for granted. On college graduation day, instead of receiving a diploma and beginning the next chapter of her life, Rachael found herself in the doctor's office. The diagnosis: T Cell Lymphoblastic Lymphoma. She was 22. Younger brother Michael had just finished seventh grade when the Willis family was met with this devastating blow. In Michael's mind, this was a mere "bump in the road in what was going to be a joyous life" for his sister. After two years of hopeful ups and discouraging downs, Rachael, "breathed her final breath and left her broken, battered body on earth to take ranks with angels."

Pushing the Limits

Michael continued through high school and began studying political science at Louisiana State University (LSU). Coming into college, he knew he had struggled with weight issues and needed to make a lifestyle change. He lived in the Phi Psi house at the time and Kristian Jessen LSU '11 recalls how Michael developed a passion for running. "Michael played soccer in high school and knew he needed a better physique. He went back to his roots by starting to run more often." Michael's body was not used to the physical strain of running, so when he started up again, he endured shin splits, strained ligaments and lots of twisted ankles. "He had a hard time getting into the sport. But once he did, a fire lit inside of him. He found a passion for something he didn't know he had."

What began as an avenue toward a healthier lifestyle, became a desire to push the boundaries. "Once Michael found the motivation to run, he knew he wanted something bigger," according to Jessen. "He began to watch ultrarunner documentaries. You would walk into our living room with Michael sitting on the couch learning how he could improve his training regime to heighten his running capabilities." He started with small challenges such as a five-mile run but progressed to ten, 25- and 50-mile runs. He was finally seeing the results of his hard work and dedication paying off.

Michael continued to run throughout college and into adulthood. After graduating from LSU, he began working with a U.S. congressman lobbying for change. The rush of politics was exhilarating but he came to a fork in the road as he missed the impact of helping others more. Having a heart for giving back, he chose to continue to make a difference in his community in southern Louisiana through philanthropy. He took on the role as vice president of advocacy for The Center for Literacy and Learning, formerly known as The Center of Development and Learning, helping families receive high-quality early education programs for their children.

Remembering Rachael

In pursuit of honoring his sister, Michael combined his two passions: helping others and running. He established the Running for Rachael Foundation. "The mission of the foundation is to provide opportunities for runners who have lost a loved one," said Marissa Carroll with the Running for Rachael Foundation. "We are also here to help build a community of runners overcome personal obstacles to allow them to run a race they have never completed." Since its inception, the foundation



has assisted more than 300 runners overcome obstacles and donated thousands to local families across Louisiana, the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and American Cancer Society.

Michael didn't stop there. On November 30, 2018, Michael tied his shoes and began the rigorous challenge of running a 100-mile ultramarathon. **Heartbeat**. He did it in remembrance of his sister and

to raise money for a local cancer services organization. 63 miles in, Michael conceded to the pavement. **Heartbeat**. He fell short of his goal, but this setback did not stop him. Remembering how hard his sister fought her battle, he dusted off the gravel and set out to complete the run again. He trained with his coach over the next two-and-a-half years to build up his stamina. Finally, the day had come. **Heartbeat**. Starting his 100mile journey in Key Largo, Florida, he once again laced up and took one step at a time. **Heartbeat**. A grueling 20 hours, 26 minutes and 29 seconds later, Michael crossed the finish line in Key West. He had completed an ultramarathon. **Heartbeat**.

Crossing the Finish Line

What should have been a time of celebration for the Willis family and their friends became a time of prayer and mourning. Shortly after completing the run, Michael went into cardiac arrest. He was rushed to the local hospital where he succumbed to his injuries. He was 27 years old. Not only did he cross the finish line, but he too joined the ranks of angels with his sister.

Michael's legacy lives on. His family received many accolades and tributes following his death, with the

biggest coming from the foundation he created. The Running for Rachael Foundation hosted a community event in Michael's honor. "People from all walks of life joined in to walk and run in Michael's memory," said Carroll. "Now that he has passed, the organization will honor his legacy by building upon the lessons in life that he taught us. We will continue to fundraise and touch all lives we encounter so we can #livelikeMichael." In the upcoming months, the Running for Rachael Foundation plans to host their signature 5k to honor both Michael and Rachael.

Once a Brother, Always a Brother

The first stanza of the Phi Kappa Psi Creed states the brotherhood is filled with individuals, "who pledge throughout their lives to be generous, compassionate and loyal comrades." According to his brothers, not only did Michael take this stanza of the Creed seriously,

"I can hear him telling me to always keep pushing myself and seek new challenges." but he also embodied it. "He was always there, willing to lend a helping hand," shared Michael Goodrich *LSU '11*. "On gamedays when we would set up tailgate, Michael would get up early to do his run and then show up to lend a helping hand. Tell me, who else do you know would wake up early, run 10-15 miles, then come set up a tailgate function?" Not only did

Michael help set up the tailgate, he encouraged other brothers to stay and strengthen their bonds, including those who had graduated before his time. "If you've ever been to an LSU tailgate, you know how busy they can be," explained Jeremy Fisher *LSU '01*. "Michael would invite me by the site where he and other brothers would be cooking jambalaya. Most of the time I would just drop by to see what the guys were up to and go about my business. Michael kept me there; he wanted to make sure I felt included still in the brotherhood."

Michael's brothers were there for him as he set out on his quest to lose weight and achieve better health. Their support helped him achieve his goals. While deeply missed today, his brothers still sense his presence, urging them to always push the limits. "When I am in doubt about something, I hear Michael's voice," said Fisher. "I can hear him telling me to always keep pushing myself and seek new challenges." Michael is still giving back, providing comfort and his message lives on through his brothers. "Michael would say, 'things will be all right no matter how bad they seem at the present time,' and he is right," said Jessen. "Well, brother, things are going to be all right. We'll take it from here. Enjoy your time with Rachael." **Heartbeat**.



"I wanted something that was more of a brotherhood; guys I know that will be there at my lowest point, standing next to me at my wedding day and every part in between." From the start, his brothers were there to lend a helping hand and offer some valuable advice. "Coming in I had no idea how to even tie a tie! Darian Sueiro *ASU '20* helped me and told me it all starts with appearance. That little piece of information is something that is going to stick with me forever."

The brotherhood drew Jahnig in initially but he soon found that his personal beliefs were reflected in Phi Psi as well. "Brotherhood, service to the community, etc. are all things I was looking for when finding the right fraternity for me." While he found the brotherhood in the instant connections he made during the rush process, it was *The Great Joy of Serving Others* that put the cherry on top for

his decision to join Phi Psi. "Members of Phi Kappa Psi went out one day and packed hundreds of meals for hungry children. Seeing service like that warms my heart because it's about helping out the community and putting others before yourself."

Across the country, he can count on his brothers to continue to encourage and uplift him. "I'm thousands of miles away from anyone I knew at Auburn. I can still reach out to one of my brothers to check-in on them and they still check-in on me."

According to NASA, The Armstrong Flight Research Center is their "primary center for high-risk, atmospheric flight research and test projects." Joshua is grateful to have the opportunity to work beside some of the greatest and most innovative minds today. "They are pushing the edge, going to the bleeding edges of where science can get us. Getting to work beside these people who are committed to that mission, going higher, further and faster, it's an amazing experience."

When thinking back on his time at Auburn and Phi Psi, Joshua is glad that he put in the work early. Being a brother in Phi Psi allowed him to learn personal responsibility and his brothers pushed him to be his best. His advice for anyone that is looking for their dream job is simple: work hard and put yourself out there. "Everyone's path is going to be different. You have to make sure you put in the effort while you're in school. If you get that experience and put in that work while you're in school, start building your portfolio, complete an internship and make sure your resume is up to date. Then when you go to interview with someone, you'll be able to show them that you can do the job and not have as much on-the-job training." Joshua continues to grow within his profession, every day is a new learning opportunity. He is excited about the opportunities in front of him and remains committed to his passion. How many chapters in Phi Kappa Psi have broken three Guinness World Records?

The answer is just one – New York Theta. But more on that later ...

The Great Joy of Serving Others is the maxim under which our Fraternity was founded 169 years ago and since then, brothers have tried to live by that motto. Joshua Geise *RIT '15* was living the spirit of the Fraternity while still in high school through his work for an after-school program. It was not until after joining the New York Theta chapter that his passion for helping others became The Shore Foundation, whose mission it is to solve digital equality and end the digital divide.

"I grew up in Virginia and attended an Information Technology (IT) high school," Geise recalled. "During my junior year, I got involved with an after-school program called Students Working to Advance Technology (SWAT). The goal of SWAT is similar to the Shore Foundation. The school system got computers from within the system itself and companies who donated them. Students would stay after school to refurbish the computers and hosted events called, Bridging the Gap, where we would donate them to individuals in need."

After enrolling at RIT and joining the New York Theta chapter, Geise met Chance Wright *RIT '14*. The two of them quickly realized the possibility of expanding the goodwill that SWAT thanks to the resources the Fraternity offered on a local and national level. Unfortunately, because SWAT's funding comes from the state of Virginia, they were not too keen on giving computers to people in other states. After spending a couple of years trying to make it work, a thought occurred to Geise while traveling back to school after winter break: They could just do it themselves. "It started out with five of us who were living together, with four of us being in the Fraternity," Geise explained. "By that February, we had submitted the paperwork and The Shore Foundation was an official 501(c)3 organization."

The infancy of The Shore Foundation was those five original founders working out of their small house. At their first event, they donated 20 computers to the Hillside Family of Agencies, the same organization already supported by New York Theta's Mud Tug event. With the help of their brothers, Geise and Wright refurbished the computers in their house and distributed them to families in need.

"It would have definitely been impossible without the Fraternity," said Geise. "From the resources around us to having all of us brothers together in the same house, it was invaluable. Everything that comes with the Fraternity is a positive experience. It gave us the ability and drive to get The Shore Foundation started."


Scroll, Save, Support

According to Wright, after that first event the foundation moved to a new office space and it was there that the groundwork for the chapter setting its third Guinness World Record was laid.

"Those first 20 computers came from private donors," Wright explained. "They were pieced together from friends and family, not really an organized effort. But the Guinness World Record is when we really started to position ourselves to start organizing and bringing in a large quantity of computers."

New York Theta had broken the Guinness World Record for the largest game of dodgeball in 2011, followed by the largest tug-of-war game in 2012 with a record 1,574 people (that record has since been broken). In 2018, the chapter joined with The Shore Foundation to do it again.

"Our Guinness World Record is for the most computers donated in 24 hours, which we set at 537 and achieved with New York Theta on December 9, 2018," Wright said. "The catalyst for this was the chapter already had two world records, and it would be a fun idea to try for a third. We did a little research and found that no one had set a record for computers donated, and The Shore Foundation was perfectly positioned to set it."

Without the New York Theta chapter, achieving the record would not have been impossible.

"There were many times throughout the process when we encountered a problem," explained Wright. "Many times, the only solution to that problem was asking people to help and hoping to succeed. For example, transporting 600 computers without a freight elevator or loading dock, every single one of those computers had to have at least three or four touch points. Most, if not all, of those touch points were brothers." The event itself would not have been possible without chapter brothers handling logistics, registration and donor recognition.

Reaching for Digital Equality

Since that day three years ago, the organization has evolved to the point where they are now processing thousands of computers a year. However, the pandemic exacerbated the problems.

"It used to be called the digital divide, but now it's called digital equality," said Wright. "It's the difference between someone who has regular access to a computer and someone who does not. COVID-19 brought awareness to the issue, and it is now being seen a hundred times over as a huge problem that school systems, nonprofit organizations and even large corporations are facing."

Despite these limitations, COVID shone a light on the problem The Shore Foundation is trying to solve.

"One organization had a large group of donors come up, and we were able to ship more than 100 computers to an organization in Georgia," Wright added. "Those computers were used for educational purposes to get kids into the virtual learning space and to allow the parents to search for jobs online."

"COVID obviously caused a big downfall because of all the limitations but it also brought a lot of awareness to the need itself of increasing that digital equality," Geise explained. "People are understanding more because of COVID the disadvantages that people who don't have readily available access to a computer and the Internet have, whether it's telehealth appointments, virtual learning, a job search, or even a young person having the ability to find things they're interested in, really dive into and it, and learn more about it."

Building the Bridge

When donating a computer to The Shore Foundation, not only does it help an individual or family in need, but also you receive a tax write-off and avoid the cost to dispose of the equipment. Many organizations have a technology turnover cycle every 3-5 years that is built into their cost systems. The Shore Foundation will work with them to set up a recurring donation program.

"We're always looking to unlock new partnerships," said Wright. "Whether through donations, partner organizations or volunteering, we'd be happy to have you."

There are opportunities for locals in the Rochester area as well as remote support.

"People can help out by organizing their own donation events, lending support with their marketing skills, or even offering IT assistance."

in undergrad I was a soccer player and gymnast. So, I didn't have an opportunity to experience Greek life," Brian said. Unfortunately, Delaware only allowed undergraduate freshman to participate in fraternity rush. Still, he wanted to be involved with an organization that gave back to the community, like he did as a student athlete, and there was still one option left. "I can't explain how this all happened, but everything aligned, and Phi Kappa Psi was looking to initiate a colony on campus. My interest made its way back to the campus consultants and they asked if I wanted to rush a fraternity."

From there Brian began a winding journey of completing his Master of Science in Disaster Science and Management, Master of Business Administration and recolonizing Delaware Alpha. Since the chapter wasn't technically rushing, only re-chartering, Brian received permission from Headquarters to be a colonist and then become a member. Ian Sneed UC Long Beach '10 and Tony Vaccaro Muskingum '11 were not just Expansion Consultants, but mentors that guided Brian during his Phi Psi journey. His involvement before the chartering in 2014 was on the down low; he didn't want to jeopardize the colony if the school found out he was a graduate student. Brian credits his undergraduate brothers for doing a substantial amount of the heavy lifting during the colonization process especially attending required university events that needed to be completed. So, Brian kept his head down and worked hard, both for Delaware Alpha and academically. He remembers the pivotal moment of putting together the

binder of information for Headquarters to reestablish their charter. "I submitted it to Headquarters and later got a phone call saying congratulations. The charter had been approved and Delaware Alpha was officially back on campus," Brian recalled.

Through Phi Kappa Psi, Brian's passion for giving back to his community was amplified. In his job, he is able to help people when large weather events impact communities. Personally, he has spent the COVID-19 pandemic sewing personal protective equipment for healthcare workers and packing boxes at food banks (something he enjoyed during his time at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School). In Phi Psi, he found the true essence of The Great Joy of Serving Others. This is one of the many reasons he gives to the Phi Psi Loyalty Fund. "It's important for me to give to the Loyalty Fund because I am making a financial stake in the future of our organization. Being able to make a financial donation to go where it needs to, to help across the country, that's huge. To see the progression, development and leaders at headquarters move the organization forward, that's invaluable."

Brother Gildemeyer credits Ron Ransom *Butler '00* with the leadership that inspires him to continue to give to the organization. He looks forward to continuing his donation to the Loyalty Fund to help advance the brotherhood; to help current and future brothers with their own unique Phi Psi stories.

Elevate Lifestyle, an event marketing company in Charlotte, North Carolina, annually solicits submissions for the city's outstanding entrepreneurs, executives, managers and professionals from public and nonprofit sectors.

One of our own was recognized in September as one of the 30 Under 30 Future Leaders of Charlotte. Brother Clayton B. Wood *Bowling Green '13* received the honor at a public ceremony after being nominated by one of his peers. The 2021 honorees appeared in the Best of the City magazine.

Highlighted in the same publication was Wood's consulting firm, C.B. Wood Financial LLC. The firm works with 50-to-1,000-employee businesses, structuring their healthcare plans to improve predictability, produce better medical outcomes and lower the risk of the plan. In return, the business should see an increase in profitability. "The plan is to continue to grow the firm so we can help businesses control their healthcare expenditure," Wood said.

CEO Dad Knows Priorities

The Indiana Alpha chapter house is in the center of campus, and it seemed like a place Jason Becker *DePauw '01* would be proud to call a second home.

And so began Brother Becker's time with Phi Kappa Psi, where he developed friendships with brothers — both older and younger — who have been among the most meaningful relationships in his life.

"As an undergraduate student, I loved being responsible and accountable for the chapter's success as a sophomore and then representing the broader Greek system's interests as the Interfraternity Council President as a junior and senior," Becker recalled. "My early adult experience of serving others helped prepare me to be a Chief Executive Officer."

Earlier this year, Becker was recognized as one of the Indianapolis Business Journal's "Forty Under 40." Honorees are chosen by a committee comprised of IBJ editors and managers as well as previous honorees. This year, more than 300 names were reviewed. The goal: To find promising business and community leaders who excel in their careers and community service — often beyond what is typical for their age — and who are likely to be making important contributions for years to come.

Becker's career started in Management Consulting with a Chicago-based firm called West Monroe. He later joined RICS Software (Retail) and Dyknow (Ed Tech). As the CEO, his goal was to turnaround the performance of both companies and – as it turned out – his team has made both businesses grow revenues, more profitable and achieve success. "We prioritized changes that enhanced our product-market fit, focused on serving clients that were growing, and made sure we had the right size and type of organization for the market we are in," he said.

A Carmel, Indiana resident, Becker gives back by serving on the boards of Community Health Network (CHN) and the Running Industry Association (RIA). Looking back at the effect the pandemic had on his volunteer work, Becker reflected, "As Boards, we had to make big decisions with limited and fast-changing information. In some ways it felt like 20 years of lived experience smashed into two."



"A force of nature," is how Becker describes his wife, Nicole, whom he cites as one of the most influential people in his life. John Taylor, Becker's late "uncle" and mentor, is someone he also holds in high regard. "His key piece of advice was to read, watch, and listen more than you talk."

If Becker could advise his younger self, he would say, "Invest in your health because it compounds." Finding himself at an unhealthy weight in mid-way through college, Becker started running. At first, he couldn't run a quarter of a mile without stopping, but he kept at it. "My first race was the Chicago Marathon with the goal of beating Oprah and P. Diddy's time, which I did!" Since, he has completed many half marathons, a trail marathon, sprint triathlons, Olympic distance triathlons, and a Half Ironman. Today, Becker runs six or seven days a week for mental health. "It's an essential part of my routine that I love."

While Becker has achieved a great deal of success already, his current goal is to keep developing as a role model for his kids. "I want to show them how to have 360-degree success in life — health, family, marriage and career."

That attitude is exemplified by what he considers the highlight of his year. Not his job. Not the accolades or a new personal record for a race, but this: "Going back to DePauw University (DPU) in June with my wife Nicole (DPU '06) and four sons (5, 5, 4, and 1) to see her Young Alumni of the Year plaque hanging in the Union Building. She was recognized for her outstanding leadership and service. Seeing her recognized, showing the boys the campus, Phi Kappa Psi and Marvin's (a popular diner on the edge of campus) was spectacular and a 2021 highlight."

Priorities obviously in order, Brother Becker is a shining example of noble character.



In addition to being able to — finally celebrate his chapter's 100th anniversary, Bower was given the prestigious Medal of Honor from SWGP David Moyer Alabama '91. Lifelong Friends

In his undergraduate years, Bower recalled having a great group of guys in his pledge class. "It was a core group of men with different backgrounds who shared experiences as initiates and became lifelong friends."

After graduating, Bower worked for DuPont and then obtained a master's degree from Harvard Business School in 1964. While in Boston, he connected with some alumni and helped with fundraising phone solicitations. After a while, he joked, "I'd make a call, and before I could really say anything, they would ask, 'how much do you want this time?'"

Returning to the Dallas, Texas area, where he would spend the rest of his life, Bower focused on his career and family before getting back into a more active role with Phi Psi. But once he did, there was no turning back! He remembered meeting so many supportive alumni during his time at Oklahoma Alpha. "And then I woke up 20 years later to be one of those guys, taking over the reins."

An inspiring leader in Bower's eyes was J. Bart Aldridge *Oklahoma 1922*, who served as national president from 1952-54. He was present at chapter activities and was admired on both a local and national level. "He was a marvelous, encouraging person and instilled in me that if practiced diligently, the qualities and values of Phi Psi are a lifelong event."

"Societally, things are in such flux today. We need to remind ourselves that the Ritual and Creed are great guides for life, the bedrock of our core values. It's so important for us to carry on these qualities and impress upon our young alumni to do so, too," Bower said.

One way to continue the good work and stay connected is to attend GAC. Bower has attended 14 so far — the first in his freshman year — and each one has been rewarding. "You miss a lot by only being involved locally. When you attend GAC, you can see the breadth of work organizationally and gain appreciation for the talents of others from chapters across the country."

Lifetime Accomplishments

Over the years, Bower served as a house corporation and alumni association officer, member of Project 2025 and the Order of the S.C. Fellow Project 2025 committee member Wynn Weigand *Missouri '74* recalled, "Richard and I worked together on Project 2025. We helped set the groundwork and organizational structure for creating the Canonsburg Corporation in 2005." Bower served as Canonsburg's first secretary until he retired in 2006. Bower's expertise in many areas was critical in the formation of Project 2025. "Richard is a major reason Canonsburg has been able to be successful in assisting our house corporations financially," said Canonsburg Corporation Chairman John Ziegelmeyer *Kansas '70*.

Looking toward the future, Brother Bower encourages alumni engagement to grow the organization. "We need to replenish, educate and mentor new members. The work we do now will keep the wheels turning for a lifetime to come."

Putting the Pieces Together

How do you help others understand that COVID-19 is easily transmissible? Sure, you can use word of mouth, social media or even graphics. But what about LEGOs?

Brother Connor Dunwoodie *Ashland '14* is a former news reporter with WYMT in Hazard, Kentucky, and along with his news director, they used LEGOs to help their community understand how one person could put others at risk. Just over a year later, they received a regional Emmy award for their creative explanation of how social distancing can save lives.

It was at the height of the pandemic when Brother Dunwoodie knew he needed to help the people of southeastern Kentucky understand more about COVID-19. "There were a lot of questions and misinformation about the virus," explained Dunwoodie. "I had a rough idea for the story, and I got together with my news director to help add in some more details to it. We wanted to explain - in a familyfriendly way – what was happening." But how do you communicate to thousands of people how easily the virus spreads? That's where LEGOs came into the shot. "Using LEGOs allowed us to visually show our viewers that if one person was infected and not practicing social distancing or wearing a mask, how quickly they could transmit the virus to others. Plus, who doesn't want to get paid to play with LEGOs for a day?" After the story aired, community members flooded Dunwoodie's inbox about how easy he made it to talk about COVID-19, especially children.

On August 15, 2021, Dunwoodie and his news director were awarded one of television news's highest honor, an Emmy award. The pair won the award from the Ohio Valley Emmy chapter in the Health/Medical News category. "When putting this story together, an award



was the last thing on my mind." It wasn't until a friend encouraged him to submit the piece to the nominations committee six months after the story aired, "And that's how the story goes!" While he knows winning an Emmy is no small feat in broadcasting, he is very humbled to be honored with the award. "There's a lot of phenomenal work done in the Ohio Valley chapter, so to be contending for the award and then to win, it's quite incredible. However, focusing on honest, factual journalism is what my team and I strived for."

Brother Dunwoodie spent three years at WYMT in Hazard, Kentucky where he was a multimedia journalist and anchor covering natural disasters, crime and feature reporting. Growing up, he had a passion for photography, videography and editing. He found his calling in journalism. Recently, Dunwoodie left television news and founded his own company, Chronicle Creative Media, in Columbus, Ohio. The company creates commercials for businesses and works with media companies throughout the country.
