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




About This Issue . .

Phi Psi Returns to Johns Hopkins

THE University was founded in 1876, when Johns Hopkins, a Baltimore merchant, willed \$7,000,000 for the establishment of a school and of a hospital. The tone of the University was set by its first president, Coilt Gilman. He modeled Hopkins after the great universities of Germany. In doing so, he established the pattern for graduate education in this country.

In 1892, the University accepted its first class of medical students. In 1917, a School of Public Health was established. In 1942, a School of Advanced International Studies was begun in Washington, D.C. At present, the medical institutions as well as the hospital are located in east Baltimore. The Division of Arts and Sciences is located on the Homewood Campus in northern Baltimore.

The fraternity system at Hopkins is as old as the University itself. The first to be chartered was Beta Theta Pi in 1876. The next was Phi Kappa Psi in 1879.

The system flourished until the years prior to

World War II when there were 19 fraternities represented on the campus. The coming of the war caused a sharp decrease in the number of fraternities. However, after the war, fraternities began to flourish once again.

The trend continued until the late sixties. Since then the number of fraternities has steadily declined. In just the past year the Kappa Alpha Order chapter has ceased operations and the Beta Theta Pi chapter gave up its house.

At present there are nine fraternities at Hopkins. They are Beta Theta Pi, Phi Gamma Delta, Delta Upsilon, Tau Epsilon Rho, Delta Phi, Sigma Nu, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Alpha Tau Omega, and Phi Kappa Psi. Approximately one quarter of the 1,500 men at Hopkins are initiated into fraternities. To date there are no sororities.

Unlike some institutions, Hopkins gives no housing support to its fraternities. Instead of being located on the campus proper, the houses are located in residential areas surrounding the campus.

History of Maryland Alpha

Phi Kappa Psi started at Hopkins in 1878 as a graduate organization and was chartered as an undergraduate chapter in 1879. The chapter had to suspend operations in 1942 due to the diminished number of men.

In 1949, several local alumni with help from Fraternity officers managed to reestablish the chapter. Once again Phi Kappa Psi became one of the strongest fraternity chapters at Hopkins. By 1968 Maryland Alpha had 71 Brothers.

In 1969 the Executive Council took away the chapter's charter on the grounds that Maryland Alpha did not live up to the ideals of Phi Kappa Psi.

The present group was started when four people, Stuart Dickenson, Jay Berger, Sinan Serber, and Siniti Oneda decided to start a new fraternity at Hopkins. After talking to several national fraternities, the group became identified with Pi Kappa Alpha in No-

vember, 1973, with 12 members. However, in July of last year the colony asked for and received a letter of release, and approached Phi Psi. In August, 1974, the Grand Arch Council granted the group colony status.

In October, an investment company purchased the Beta Theta Pi house with the intention of leasing and/or selling it to the colony. From October on, the members worked steadily to correct over 100 housing violations as well as make the house presentable for rush.

Negotiations for the house were successfully completed in January, just in time for Hopkins' rush in February. In fact, the lighting for the party room was completed just five minutes before the start of our first rush party.

After a successful rush, the colony continued to work on the house and to institute a Fraternity education program. On May 1, Chapter Consultant Guy Minardi administered the final fraternity education test to the colony. All members passed the first time. On May 3, the colony received its charter.

Initiation and Chartering Ceremony

On May 3, 22 were initiated into Phi Kappa Psi at Johns Hopkins. At that time, Maryland Alpha received its charter and once again became an active chapter of the fraternity.

The ceremony was performed at the Second Presbyterian Church in Baltimore. In addition to the members of the Executive Board, the ceremony was performed by the Archons of Districts I and II, Alan Fleisher and Dave Melson, respectively, Executive Secretary Ralph Daniel, Assistant Executive Secretary Gary B. Angstadt, several local alumni and an induction team from Pennsylvania Eta.



Miami University

THE SUCCESS STORY OF OHIO LAMBDA

THIS past May 6, Ohio Lambda at Miami University celebrated its third year as an active chapter. During these past three years, this chapter has experienced unparalleled growth and commendable achievements.

In 1971 when Robert Goldman, Washington & Jefferson '64, came to Miami as a graduate student, there were already 24 National Fraternities well established on campus. Since this time, Ohio Lambda has grown from 17 original Colony members to an active membership of 64 undergraduates and 46 alumni while attaining an extremely high level of ac-

complishment and recognition from the community and University.

This is the success story of Ohio Lambda.

Miami University

Miami University, established in Oxford, Ohio, February 17, 1809, by a legislative act, opened its doors for collegiate instruction in 1824. It is the second oldest college in Ohio. Early studies at Miami were the uniform and classical liberal Arts and Sciences. The University flourished through the years and produced many young men and women who assumed positions of leadership throughout the nation. Closed in 1873, due to changed conditions and prices after the Civil War, Miami re-opened in 1885, when resources and funds had accumulated and the State made appropriations for its support.

Since 1885, expansion of the educational services has occurred with the addition of five schools. They are the schools of Business Administration, Education, Fine Arts, Applied Science and Graduate School.

Miami's campus lies in beautiful, wooded, rolling country of southwestern Ohio. The main campus, in Oxford, covers more than 900 acres. In addition to the Oxford campus are branch campuses in Hamilton, Middletown and Luxembourg, Grand Duchy. The total enrollment exceeds 16,000 with approximately 14,000 on the main campus.

Miami has long been considered the "Mother of Fraternities" and boasts 24 other national fraternities and 19 national sororities. Included in this number are four Alpha chapters: Beta Theta Pi, Phi Delta Theta, Phi Kappa Tau, and Sigma Chi. The Greek system maintains a strong Interfraternity and Panhellenic Council which have been recognized as one of the best in the nation.

Social life at Miami, and University operations, have long been centered around the Greek community while the University provides services and, at the same time, creates an atmosphere of involvement and growth for the sororities and fraternities.



The chapter house was constructed in 1972. It consists of 10 apartments, each having a living room, dinette, kitchen, bath and two bedrooms. In addition, the house also contains a communal kitchen and dining room.

Phi Psi Comes to Miami

Realizing that he was faced with strong competition from the already existing 24 fraternities, Robert Goldman reasoned that he had to provide an alternative to the traditional fraternity concept. In early May of 1971, he contacted approximately 60 freshmen men at Miami. These men had shown an interest in the Greek system by participating in open houses and rush functions of other Miami fraternity chapters, but had chosen not to pledge. Many had actually depledged other fraternities. Following days of interviews, he pledged 17 of these men on May 13, thus creating the Ohio Lambda Colony. It was a common idea among the group to be slightly different from the typical fraternity at Miami. Their approach to fraternity life gained popularity with others who also sought personal enrichment from their college experience.

The colony members believed that "Hell Week's" hazing and general beratement of pledges was detrimental and immature. As an alternative, they introduced the concept of "Help Week" which emphasized the positive approach of this chapter. They felt that it was the responsibility of the chapter to do something FOR a pledge, not something TO him. Stressed during the first pledge program were the ideals of good scholarship, University involvement, and community service-thus the principles of the original group were imparted into their protégées. They considered a pledge as a member; a person with a voice, feelings, and ideas. The program was designed to educate a man to be an active brother, not an eternal, inferior pledge. This philosophy has become the basis upon which the chapter has developed into a strong and productive organization within the University and community.

Ohio Lambda Chartered

After only 51 weeks as a colony, this group of men, now numbering 38 were formally initiated; Ohio Lambda was installed as Phi Kappa Psi's newest chapter on May 6, 1972. The ceremony involved Past Presidents Philip Cornelius and Mark Sullivan, and Executive Secretary Ralph Daniel. The banquet which followed included many fraternity officers and University officials.

The newly installed chapter encountered many difficulties during its first year of existence. In accordance with Miami regulations requiring each fraternity to operate a chapter house, Ohio Lambda began the procedure of establishing a suitable residence for

its members. The product of their endeavors was to be a different type of fraternity house which featured apartment-style living. The house was to consist of 10 units, each having the living capacity of four to five men.

At the outset, the chapter was required to post \$10,000 as a retainer fee to the builder which was solicited from its members. This amount was re-paid to the members in the Fall of 1972, after procurement of a loan from the Fraternity. The house was ready for occupancy in September of 1972.

The Growth Period-38 to 115

Having settled in the house, the Brothers began planning for their first in-house formal rush. They maintained their original ideals of academics, service and involvement and emphasized these to the rushees. That winter, 22 men were pledged and subsequently initiated into the chapter. The following year, 20 new initiates were taken. Ohio Lambda had reached its desired size.

In this span of time many innovations and adaptations were initiated—some retained, others rejected. In an effort to establish itself as a recognized chapter and campus leader, mandatory attendance for all sporting and social events and a dress code were instituted, and eventually dropped after this goal was attained.

The chapter graduated her first seniors in the spring of 1974; thus the original cluster had departed, leaving their ideals and attitudes to their followers.

In 1975, 25 new initiates were taken, each pledging to uphold and defend the premises of the original 17.

Ohio Lambda Today

The ideals of the original 17 members are inherent in this chapter's philosophy and practices today. Ohio Lambda has become a leader in the University and community. It is well represented by its members in all aspects of campus affairs: the student body President was a Phi Psi. John Burke completed two terms in office. His cabinet included Phi Psi's Dave White, Vice-President of Business Affairs and Greg Zinga, Vice-President of Communications. These Brothers have been instrumental in creating an innovative and responsive Student Government at Miami. Carl Bennett has recently completed his term as Interfraternity Council President. Under his administration, the Greek system at Miami realized its most successful operation in years. His successor is Phil Gray.

Phi Psi Tom McArthur initiated and edited *The Greek Independent*, an all-campus newspaper highlighting activities of all Greek organizations. Architecture major Brother Rick Daugherty serves on the University President's advisory committee on future buildings on campus. Jim Ulrich has membership on the advisory committee of the School of Applied Science while Tom Ulrich was recognized as Miami's 1975 Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

In addition, Ohio Lambda is well represented on the Miami football, wrestling, and baseball teams, the Miami University theatre, symphony, chamber orchestra, and opera theatre, and many service organizations and honorary fraternities.

Phi Psi at Miami has received recognition as a campus and community leader; the city of Oxford beautification award was presented to Ohio Lambda for its exceptional service to the community. Phi Psi assists the University with class registration by counseling students with scheduling difficulties. This service was begun as a project by the winter Pledge class of 1972. Ohio Lambda sponsored a day of activities for a children's home and contributes to the Cancer Society, Heart Fund, and Multiple Sclerosis. Weekly dinner guests have included University President Dr. Philip Shriver, Oxford Mayor Gilbert Williams, and professors from all departments of the University.

The Chapter has received much guidance from Housemother Marcetta Snell and Advisor William Mogk, N.Y. Alpha '40. Mrs. Snell has been instrumental in instituting the Ohio Lambda Parent's Club, sweetheart dinner, and other social functions. Brother Mogk was presented the outstanding Chapter Advisor award by the Interfraternity Council, recognizing him as the foremost Advisor on Miami's campus.

. . . And the Future

Much has been learned through the past four years, but much more remains. Many challenges are on the horizon—the establishment of a House Corporation, maintaining correspondence with the alumni, and prospects of relocating in a few years. The prospects of the future imply that the chapter will continue to make itself what it wants to be, not what tradition dictates it should be.

Through her constant self-evaluation and reassessment of goals, Ohio Lambda will continue to uphold the proud name of Phi Kappa Psi.

California Epsilon's Community Service "House of Horrors"

L AST spring the California Epsilon chapter of Phi Kappa Psi participated in the UCLA Mardi Gras

one of the largest student-run charity events in the

Every year Mardi Gras takes place in late April. The event runs for 18 hours, 6 on a Friday night and 12 on Saturday. Mardi Gras offers rides, food and entertainment; all of which is sponsored by student organizations such as fraternities, sororities and residence hall groups. All student time is donated.

The proceeds, totaling about \$55,000, are for the operation of Uni-Camp, a summer camp in the San Bernadino mountains. The camp offers recreation for underprivileged children.

In past years California Epsilon and a sorority have offered their talent and participation in this charitable event. But never before had we undergone such a difficult and rewarding booth as the "House of Horrors."

It started in early February when decision time came for the 1975 Mardi Gras. Previously we had only done small booths, but this year due to a strong fall rush and a resurgence of energy within the chapter, we felt it was time to try our talent in one of the biggest booths at the event.

After consulting with the UCLA Mardi Gras committee and the UCLA alumni, it was felt that we could handle the project. Financial backing in the amount of three thousand dollars was obtained and the wheels were set in motion.

Kappa Kappa Gamma agreed to assist us in both the construction and operation of the project. Our membership of 27 brothers and the Kappa's 80 women, gave us sufficient manpower for everything that might be encompassed by our partnership in the "House of Horrors."

Our two chapters started working in late February. We worked two nights a week and on Saturdays. During these periods we built and painted 200 assorted flats for assembling the house. The work nights and days became more and more frequent as the event approached.


We went out on the UCLA playing field a week before opening night and it took two days to complete the construction of façade and booth. The remaining time was spent on special effects, rehearsal for actors, painting and solving miscellaneous problems.

Opening night found us ready with actors, makeup crew and spare participants. The finished booth had five rooms with at least two actors in each room, a guy and a girl. Within the rooms, the actors would be doing a specific, rehearsed act. All action revolved around the theme of an old haunted ship captain's house.

The actors totaled 16 and worked two-hour shifts before being relieved. The make-up people and those who supervised worked almost continually without stopping.

The 1975 Mardi Gras went flawlessly and when it was over on Saturday night, we were presented six awards—five first places and one second place, including the coveted Sweepstakes and Chancellor's trophies. It was the culmination of many hours of hard work for both chapters.

The booth materials are in storage at present awaiting next year's event. California Epsilon would like to thank all the alumni of UCLA who offered their time, expertise and plans which helped to make the project possible.

Why Join A Fraternity?

By David Nail

The following article was originally presented as a speech at an Interfraternity Council introductory rush smoker at Texas Tech University on September 11, 1974. Delivered by David Nail, Assistant Dean of Students and faculty sponsor of Tech's IFC to over 400 prospective rushees; the speech is reprinted here as an answer to the old question of "Why join a fraternity?" Nail's appraisal of the reasons for joining a fraternity provide an interesting perspective as he is not a fraternity member but has worked closely with the fraternity system at Texas Tech and believes in the role of fraternities.

EDITOR

WONDER why I am here? Well, I suppose it is because I have been requested to tell you something about the fraternity system or, moreover, why you should become a part of it. I find my assignment rather curious, for I am not what is loosely labeled a "fraternity man." I was not in a fraternity. So, you ask, why was I selected? Was it merely because I am faculty sponsor of the Interfraternity Council? I hope not, and I hope to show you why.

Being a historian by training, it might at this point be worthwhile to say a brief something about the origin and evolution of fraternities.

That takes us back 198 years. More often than not, historians agree that what we call fraternities are native to America and that the first, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded at the college of William and Mary in Virginia the same year Mr. Jefferson of that state was helping found a nation by virtue of writing the Declaration of Independence. Now, Phi Beta Kappa was a secret club of sorts. At least it borrowed some of its

secrecy from the Masonic order—things like an oath, and handclasp, and rites of initiation. But it was principally constituted to be a literary society. Back then, you see, colleges were strictly academic sorts of places. Well, mainly they were. Yet being a literary society said something. It said that a group of students got together, secrecy and all, because they had something in common. That began to be called brotherhood.

Today, I doubt one Phi Beta Kappa would know another unless they walked past one another twirling their keys. So diluted has brotherhood become in that organization that one member often does not know the other, even on the same campus, or so says the fellow who was the best man in my wedding. And he is a key-carrying member of Phi Beta Kappa. Now, of course, academic excellence is the hallmark of that organization. And brotherhood took a different route.

In the 1820's other Greek-letter societies took form—Greek because that language was then part of the set and classical curriculum of study everywhere. These, too, were literary, but they soon mutated into secret student societies interested mainly in campus politics and what one historian called "formalized snobbery."

Maybe that is a bit over-done. Early fraternities did fill a social need on campuses, for college administrators, what we now might call Deans of Students, tended to shy away from the lighter sides of life. And although most of those administrators thought of fraternities as "creating artificial and false position" among their male charges, some recognized that "one object of some of the societies here is the cultivation of manners, and so far they have improved."

So by the turn of the century, fraternities, their houses, their rituals, and maybe even their snobbery were here to stay. Fraternities became more than sentiment. They became institutions. To belong to a fra-

ternity was to have connections upon graduation. To have connections was oftentimes the key to later success. Indeed in 1909 when the National Interfraternity Council was formed, it was for alumni of fraternities, not students.

Yet this is too harsh. What was the cornerstone of the foundation of fraternities, what is now the capstone, is brotherhood. And brotherhood by any measure is growing through sharing. Which says nothing about sisterhood.

When women were first allowed on all-male campuses, they rapidly followed the lead of the all-male fraternities. Thus what we now call sororities are by their own definition officially and formally chartered as fraternities. The purpose was at first to keep other girls in their proper places and, obviously, to establish contacts with fraternity men. In fact, by the 1920's a good bit of the racoon-coat variety of campus superstition had established that at college "A" the Phi Psis traditionally favored those co-educational students, or co-eds, pledged to the Kappas; at college "B" the Delts were assigned the Chi Omegas, and so on.

Greeks had, it seems, arrived. Competition among fraternities for pledges was exceeded only by the backstabbing among sororities. The "barbs," or barbarians, or as we understand currently, independents, only laughed if they paid any attention at all. And if a fraternity might later provide appropriate connections upon graduation, why some mothers thought that a sorority might secure appropriate husbands for their daughters. It was as if all this was some sort of Great American Rite of Passage to adulthood—or so thought the Great American Quality Class.

You can understand this has been a generalization, a generalization too often held among independents. Which leads me to my point. You gentlemen do not have to belong to a fraternity to have a successful college career. Being in a fraternity does not automatically allow you to make the best grades or the best women. Membership will not manufacture for you a plastic image of what I used to know as the B.M.O.C.—the Big Man On Campus. Nor will a fraternity make of you a man by magically raising you from bungling puberty to social grace. In some cases it will not even increase your tolerance for ethyl alcohol.

What then can you expect? Why join? What will pledging a fraternity do for you? Well, like most other worthwhile endeavors it will do for you only what you put into it. But I promise if you contribute something positive, say something like friendship, you will reap a great deal more: brotherhood.

You see, gentlemen, I am a slow learner. And I have only recently realized that. I missed the opportunity to contribute a positive friendship by being in a fraternity. Also I missed the brotherhood.

"By choosing to join a fraternity you do not limit yourself, but allow yourself to be woven into a rich fabric of diversity bound together by brotherhood."

In part, I guess it was the times. Being an undergraduate in the mid-sixties was to be surrounded by a philosophy of "do-your-own-thing-ism," something I understand now to be the most conforming "ism" I have ever encountered. The Greeks were then thought the conformists; being one was not to do your own thing. Yet doing my own thing was, in and of itself, rather hollow.

As I say, I missed the stabilizing element, indeed the somewhat humanizing element of brotherhood. I made a mistake now impossible to correct. I sincerely hope you will not repeat that mistake, at least for the same reason: arrogance.

Thus, gentlemen, you find yourselves at a point where you must make a decision. And if you decide to pledge, to whom shall you pledge yourself? Only you can decide that. But remember that the concept of rush, held not only by this IFC, but by most others across the country, is rather like a two-way street. It allows both the individual chapter and the individual student a chance to evaluate and choose. Look around. Consider more than a few options. Fraternities, like college students in general, possess a great many common elements; each also has a distinct personality. Fraternities are people with individuals of varying interests, viewpoints, and experiences.

But do not take your choice lightly. In these days of snowballing events, of "Future Shock," the decision you will make in the next several weeks is one of the few rather permanent ones left to make at all. Base that decision on the important things, not the minor differences in size of lodge or number of trophies. Decide on ideals, character, and standards. Consider also academic records and service projects. Do not hesitate to ask questions.

Finally, pledging is a learning period. You will learn about your fraternity and its traditions, your pledge brothers and those in the active chapter. You will spend time working with your fraternity and in serving others on the campus and in the community. You will be expected to contribute not only energy and effort, but also money.

All this will not be easy. Pledging is not expected to be easy. Attaining things of value seldom are. But there will be no hazing. Mental and physical duress are games played by mindless infants, and serve no purpose. True, hazing was part of the old fraternity image, but it has no place in the twentieth century.

Brotherhood does. That, gentlemen, in one word, is what fraternity is all about. I trust you will consider the opportunity before you.



The Johns Hopkins University 85 Years of Operation

In ceremonies opening the 100th year on Sept. 10, 1975, Governor Marvin Mandel presented a proclamation officially designating 1975-76 as "the centennial year" in Maryland. A series of symposia, concerts, affairs, and special events at all of the Hopkins institutions will commemorate the centennial, climaxing with the 100th Founding Day convocation on February 22, 1976. The theme of the centennial pervades every student and university activity.

Brother Burnett's survivors are a daughter, Eliazbeth Burnett; and a son, David Burnett.






CARL H. BENNETT

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

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

Installation of Montana Alpha

Montana Alpha Becomes Newest Phi Psi Chapter

THE University of Montana. A relatively small university of 8,000 students located in the southwest portion of one of the most sparsely populated states in the Union.

The University of Montana. A university located 600 miles from the closest university that holds a Phi Psi chapter, 1,500 miles away from the core of District VI.

The University of Montana. A group of Montanians as far back as 1914, petitioned the Grand Arch Council of Phi Kappa Psi to obtain a charter.

Six times that group petitioned Phi Kappa Psi: in 1914, 1918, 1920, 1922, 1923, and finally, what they believed was their last attempt to have a chapter at Montana, they petitioned in 1924, only again to be refused.

They petitioned again and again, even when "the result was a disaster" because of their denial. But still they tried to become a chapter of Phi Kappa Psi because they felt a chapter should be in Missoula, and they knew why.

On Saturday, May 31, 1975, through the result of a separate effort, the group's dream of 1914 became a reality. The Montana Alpha chapter received its charter and was installed with the badge of Phi Kappa Psi.

The colony itself was very young, being organized only in October of 1974. However, during the period of eight months, they were able to organize from a group of 24 individuals into a solid band of 24 Brothers. During this time they were able to solidify Fraternity education, form a house corporation, purchase a house of which they were very proud and learn the hardships of the time and hard work that go into forming a working organization.

They were able to accomplish this as a group because they believed a chapter should be formed at Missoula, and they knew why.

The Common Bond

The evening before the official installation, the colony had the honor of being addressed by Walter Lee Sheppard Jr. Brother Sheppard commented on what the group had been, and indeed, what might be in store for them. A discussion followed and there was expression of the common bond of this group. It was a bond of pride; a pride that did not demand individual superiority, but one that met and accepted a challenge. This pride did not seek exclusiveness, but sought the common bond. It was one not held by miles nor separated by a scarcity of population.

This is why a chapter was formed at the University of Montana and why the badge of Phi Kappa Psi was sought.

Initiation and Chartering Ceremony

On May 31, 1975, 24 were initiated into Phi Kappa Psi at the University of Montana. At the same time, Montana Alpha received its charter and became an active chapter of the Fraternity.

The ceremony was performed at the Church of the Holy Spirit in Missoula. With members of the Executive Council taking part, the initiation was performed by the Archons of District II and VI, Dave Melson and Jerry Mowery, respectively, Executive Secretary Ralph D. Daniel, Assistant Executive Secretary Gary B. Angstadt and several local alumni.

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FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

PRESENTED here are the financial highlights of the Fraternity's operations for the fiscal years ended May 31, 1974 and 1975. An earlier issue of THE SHIELD reviewed the statistical record of the Fraternity, and provided the usual overview and commentary on the state of Phi Kappa Psi and the fraternity system. The fiscal year of the Fraternity, ending as it does, makes it necessary to offer this report separately. This, then, is a supplement to the annual report.

The Fraternity, for the second year in a row, operated with undergraduate membership income representing only 40 per cent of the budget, the balance of operating revenue, 60 per cent, coming from interest from investments and alumni contributions. Net assets approached \$2,000,000 in 1975, compared to \$1,766,000 a year ago. The gain from operations for 1974 was \$58,000, with 1975 showing a \$15,000 loss, which included Grand Arch Council costs, a major budget item. For the two-year period, 1974 and 1975, a gain of \$43,000 was recorded. The surplus for the 1973 fiscal year was \$26,000, and for 1972, \$59,000, or \$85,000 for the 1972-73 biennium. No Federal tax liability was incurred in 1975.

The Endowment Fund of Phi Kappa Psi, the Fraternity's educational foundation, increased its total assets from \$230,000 to \$261,000 during the year, a gain of \$31,000. Student loans at the same time increased from \$36,000 to \$48,000. Revenue in excess of expenses was \$31,000. Disbursements, including Summerfield Awards, grants, and losses on uncollected loans, was \$17,000, compared to \$18,000 a year ago.



From the World of Sports to the World of Beauty



SOMEWHERE out West, there's a firm called World Sports Marketing. Some say it's close to being Shangri-la, for it's a mixture of working with sports, sports promotion and beauty pageants. But President of World Sports Marketing, Ray Garra, UCLA '54, tells us that his firm is located in Newport Beach, Calif., and while his job has its rewards, it is not quite Shangri-la. Well, not yet.

In the Spring of 1975, the Los Angeles Times published an article on World Sports Marketing and its President, remarking upon the unique services to the national sports world of this organization. Ray Garra is a UCLA graduate and did a three-year stint with the U.S. Coast Guard. His business career began in the printing industry, which led to his involvement in graphic arts and then consulting. Lately, he combined his business know-how and love of sports into a very successful business venture-World Sports Marketing. The firm not only deals in advertising and public relations for such concerns as the World Football League, North American Soccer League, World Team Tennis, World Hockey Association, and International Volleyball Association, but also presents a complete package to its clients, including designing logos and uniforms to presenting them with new marketing programs.

As well as its national accounts, World Sports Marketing also handles individual promotions, such as the Marina City Offshore Classic, Larry Mahan Rodeo, and the International Forum Horse Show. As a part of many of these individual sports promotions, beauty contests are managed, contributing to the overall publicity impact of the event.

In expanding his business, Garra observed that pro sports have generally become show biz. "I don't think there's even a fine line anymore between pro sports and entertainment," says Garra. He continues, "Did you see the Riggs-King tennis thing? Did you see how they wheeled her out there on the float? That wasn't a sports event, it was a super-promoted show biz event."

Garra became involved with pro sports through

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event programs. "I was working for Children's Publishers Corp. of San Francisco a couple of years ago. They were printing the Giants' and Raiders' game programs then, but I really wasn't too involved with that end of it.

"Then World Team Tennis came along and asked Children's Publishers to help them out at a time when the company was looking for ways to diversify."

Today, World Sports Marketing puts together the programs for WTT's 16 teams. This includes selling national ads, creating the graphics and writing editorial copy. Garra says that his firm sold \$150,000 worth of advertising and printed up a half-million programs during their first season.

Garra's next sports client was the famous World Football League. World Sports Marketing designed all the WFL uniforms, each team's logos and put together all their programs and publications.

The WFL, of course, has some unpaid bills.

Next, came the World Hockey Association to be followed by the North American Soccer League and the International Volleyball Association.

Somehow the world of sports merged with the world of beauty and World Sports Marketing picked up a new client, the Miss American Teen-Ager Pageant. In the summer of 1975, Garra was asked by the national franchise to produce the Miss California Teen-Ager Pageant on 30 days notice.

The California State Pageant came off in fine style and Garra found his attention turning with enthusiasm to the marketing of beauty pageants. A new company was formed to give this project proper attention and in September of 1975, Garra became President of Miss California Teen-Ager, Inc., while still maintaining his position with World Sports Marketing. The two businesses now share the same facility.

The style in which World Sports Marketing achieved precedence in the sports world was applied to the pageant business and Miss California Teen-Ager underwent some significant changes. First, the American Cancer Society was designated as principal beneficiary of the pageant. Then California's Exchange Clubs joined in to support the pageant and provide statewide screening facilities. The latest innovation and an unprecedented dimension to a teenage pageant was the announcement of an international goodwill tour for the California titleholder.

Needless to say, Garra's influence on beauty pageantry is not being limited to the state of California. Nevada and Hawaii at the time of this writing are being offered to his care. His firm represents the National Pageant in solicitation of sponsors and acts as a general advisor on expansion plans. In keeping with this activity on a national level, Garra's firm has also drawn up plans for a series of pageant and contestant alumni publications.

The advent of pageantry has not diminished the progress of the basic World Sports Marketing operation. A current project of no small dimension is fundraising and sponsorship solicitation for the U.S. Ski Team. Also a new market that will be added to WSM's promotion schedule this year is the mini-cycle world. Starting with Cyclorama '76 in the Spring, WSM will evidence itself nationally by assisting in the development of the existing National Mini-Cycle Association.

Sports and beauty. Both are exciting; both provide a necessary release. Ray Garra's in the middle of both. Even Nick the Greek couldn't come up with better odds

Washington, D.C.—1976

WASHINGTON, D.C. is a city where the best things are free. After all, you and every other American owns a big chunk of the city. Thus, you can expect free admission to your federal properties. Another important thing that will be free Aug. 11-15, will be the experiences and memories gained from attending the 58th biennial Grand Arch Council of Phi Kappa Psi. The site of the Council will be the Marriott Twin-Bridges Hotel in Arlington, Virginia. Hotel reservation forms and advance registration information will be offered in the Spring issue of The Shield.

Washington, D.C.

Washington's early history was merely a chronicle of its Presidents. The city itself was muddy or dusty, depending upon the season, and was the object of savage jokes. There were few houses, still fewer buildings, and the residents' lives centered on the few saloons.

Not too many people visited Washington prior to the Civil War. In fact, ambassadors who lived in Washington drew hardship pay. But in late May of 1865, more than 100,000 people flocked to the city to witness the Grand Review of the Union Army.

Following this, a strange thing happened. The visitors went home and told their friends and relatives that Washington wasn't such a bad place after all. And tourists started coming to see their capital city.

Washington underwent great periods of expansion during the First and Second World Wars. New federal agencies, new buildings and many thousands of new civil servants appeared almost overnight. This increase in population generated a great deal of private business, too.

Now, in the seventies, the Federal City is a thriving metropolis of 850,000 persons with another 2.5 million suburbanites living in Maryland and Virginia.

Because of Washington's continuous growth, more and more tourists and conventions come into the city each year. In 1973, over 19 million visitors passed through the city, reinforcing its reputation as one of the most popular cities in the United States. This Bicentennial year should see even more numbers of visitors to the nation's Capital.



Places to Visit

Since Washington is, above all, the seat of Federal Government, every visitor should make it a point to journey over to the U.S. Capitol and take the free guided tour of its interior. From the Capitol, a visitor has only short walks to six other major attractions; the Senate and House Office Buildings and the Library of Congress.

The White House, or given its formal name, the Executive Mansion, is of late 18th century design. Ironically, every President but George Washington, for whom the city was named, has lived there. The cornerstone of the mansion was laid in 1792 and the structure was completed in 1800, one year after George Washington died. When the building was burned by British troops in 1814, during the War of 1812, white paint was applied to cover fire damage and the White House got its common name.

The most obvious landmark in the District of Columbia is the 555-foot Washington Monument, located on the Mall, halfway between and in alignment with the Capitol and Lincoln Memorial.

The Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials, both of which stand out majestically against the city skyline, are two other local points of visitor interest.

Washington is many different things to many people, but it is the perfect host with great hotels, restaurants and shops.

Whatever a visitor wants to do or see, he can do it or see it in Washington. So make plans now to attend the 1976 Grand Arch Council. There is no better place to observe the Bicentennial than in our nation's capital. Chapters and alumni associations will soon be receiving a complete list of activities as well as delegate credential forms. Let's all meet at the Great Bicentennial GAC.


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



ELECTED AT IL MEETINGS





Detlev Bronk Dies at 78

R. DETLEV WULF BRONK, Swarthmore '15, described as one of the most sought after and influential men in science, died Nov. 17, 1975, at New York Hospital, N.Y. He was 78. Brother Bronk is best remembered as president emeritus of Rockefeller University and the former president of Johns Hopkins University, the National Academy of Sciences, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Brother Bronk lived a routine that would exhaust the average man. To have several speaking engagements a day, be an administrator of a university, find time for his own research and biophysics, read two books per week, as well as man other activities, he conducted a busy 18-hour day. A very organized person, he allotted time for each project or meeting, and was able to create a relaxed, unhurried atmosphere around him.

A native of New York, Brother Bronk was the son of a Baptist minister and a descendant of a famous old New York family-the Broncks, for which one of New York City's five boroughs, the Bronx is named. His studies at Swarthmore were interrupted by World War I, during which he was a flying instructor in naval aviation at Pensacola, Fla. Returning to Swarthmore he resumed his engineering studies and took a job as assistant power engineer with the Philadelphia Electric Co. Later as an industrial engineer with a food company, he decided to take up studies in physics at the University of Pennsylvania. Transferring to the University of Michigan, he continued with physics while taking up biology, earning his doctor's degree in both subjects. With the idea of combining the two subjects into one, "biophysics," he and Dr. Selig Hecht of Columbia University launched the new term on its way in 1927. In 1928, Brother Bronk became a full professor of physiology and biophysics and dean of men at Swarthmore. Some years later he was made head of the Institute of Neurology at the University of Pennsylvania.

At Pennsylvania, Dr. Bronk enjoyed dramatizing his talks at medical conferences with unconventional methods. He is remembered for playing without warning a recording of the sounds of the

nervous system sending impulses to the brain. Amplified loud enough, the nervous system sounds very much like machine-gun fire.

Accepting the presidency of Johns Hopkins University in 1950, he made it understood that he would continue to do scientific research. A firm believer in justice and academic freedom, Brother Bronk once resisted an effort by Senator Joseph McCarthy to have Johns Hopkins dismiss one of his subordinates, a former State Department advisor on Far Eastern affairs. "I am not against investigations," he remarked, and "if national security is involved, I feel anyone, even my own father and mother, should be investigated." But he could not tolerate "trial by innuendo and guilt by association," so the gentleman remained on the Johns Hopkins staff.

Dr. Bronk is remembered for having developed the Hopkins Plan, a program designed to erase long-standing barriers between undergraduate and graduate study, enabling students to progress at their own rate and at whatever level their capabilities dictated.

In 1953, he was named president of the Rockefeller Institute. During his tenure the medical research institute gradually progressed to a flourishing scientific graduate school, becoming The Rockefeller University in 1965. Turning over the presidency to a physicist, Dr. Frederick Seitz, Dr. Bronk began devoting his time to writing articles for scientific publications in 1968.

As an advisor to Presidents Truman, Eisenhower, and Kennedy, Brother Bronk was deeply concerned with our complacency, especially in the area of science. After the Soviet Union launched their Sputnik I, man's first space satellite, he warned President Eisenhower and the American people that we could not preserve our heritage of freedom unless we encouraged and defended our creative spirit. "Shorter work weeks and longer coffee breaks" were not the answer, he commented.

Brother Bronk was called upon an untold number of times a year to deliver speeches on a great variety of subjects.

Commenting once about the many nonscientific talks he gave, he said, "Usually I compose my speeches on the way to deliver them. Or sometimes they give me a little time to think them up after I have arrived."

In addition to his leadership of the National Academy of Sciences and the American Association for the advancement of Science, he was a member of scientific societies in 12 countries and was a trustee of six universities. He held 60 honorary degrees from colleges and universities and was honored by the Order of the British Empire, the Medal of the International Benjamin Franklin Society, and the Presidential Medal of Freedom as well as many others.

He was a well-rounded individual, adept at sailing his two-masted auxiliary schooner with his sons, and just as competent at mountain climbing in the Swiss, Italian, and French Alps. He had a great love for his summer home at Woods Hole, Mass., where he and his three sons spent many hours building stone walls and walks, making the place their "family roots."

Brother Bronk is survived by his widow, the former Helen Alexander Ramsey; three sons, Dr. John Everton Ramsey, a professor of biochemistry in Britain, Adrian Mitchell, Pennsylvania '57, an English teacher at Loomis Academy, Windsor, Conn., and Mitchell Herbert, head of the science department of Milton Academy in Massachusetts; and four grandchildren.

Dr. Detlev Wulf Bronk had possession of a superior scientific mind, the logic of which he applied to his every encounter. He once expressed his theories about society and its ability to withstand outer as well as inner pressures by saying, in a lecture, "The future welfare of democratic cultures will rest upon translation of science into all realms of thought and culture." He believed that to survive, this country must maintain great military power and at the same time preserve its traditional liberties. Only by maintaining a vital interest in our nation's affairs could we keep such a delicate balance. "We have a tryst with destiny!"

ORRIN CARLYLE GRAY, Beloit '00, long time educator, died Oct. 26, 1974, following his wife's death by a month. He was 93. Brother Gray began his career teaching in Wisconsin high schools, then he moved to California to be the superintendent of the Indian school at Fort Bidwell. He was transferred to Fort Totten, N.D., then sent to Fort Peck, Mont. Retiring in 1945, Brother Gray lived in Mariposa, Calif. until his death. He was an active member of the Masonic Lodge and the United Methodist Church.

He is survived by a daughter, Katherine Westley; a granddaughter, Anne Westley Vigil; a nephew and a niece.

HAMILTON H. GILKYSON JR., Swarthmore '02, publisher and former fire insurance executive and businessman. died in 1975, at age 94. A resident for many years in Mont Clare, Pa., Brother Gilkyson was chairman of the board of the Phoenixville Publishing Co., vicepresident of the Southwest National Bank of Coatesville, and until 1940, owner of the Chester County Mutual Insurance Co.

He is survived by his two daughters, one son, nine grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

COL. OLIVER ANDREWS DICKIN-SON, Amherst '03, graduate of the U.S. Military Academy and former instructor at West Point, died at age 91, on May 29, 1975. He was named International Fencing Champion while at the Military Academy, and before his retirement in 1942, wrote the first field manual for an armored division. For many years he wrote letters to the editor of the Charlotte Observer and The Pilot, with the signature, "An Old Soldier." Brother Dickinson is survived by his widow, Leroy Langdon Buck Dickinson; three daughters; four grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

CHARLES P. BARRETT, Swarthmore '05, died Jan. 8, 1975.

JOHN O. SUTPHIN, Indiana '05, died July 22, 1975, at Bloomington, Ind., at the age of 91. He was one of a number of Phi Psis in the executive group of Showers Brothers Furniture Co. of Bloomington. Brother Sutphin won letters in football and baseball at Indiana University and in 1965, received the Zora Clevenger Award for outstanding support of Indiana sports.

WILLIAM H. CHESEBROUGH, Beloit '06, died May 31, 1974, from an auto accident. He was 87. A food broker by profession, Brother Chesebrough gave much time and energy to civic projects of his hometown, Rockford, Ill.

He is survived by his widow, Annette; two daughters; seven grandchildren; and a

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

Kansas Alpha Recognition

KANSAS ALPHA has always been proud of the accomplishments of her Brothers, and our Sunday luncheon April 4, was specifically set aside to honor these accomplishments.

We have been particularly proud of those of us who have contributed to the betterment of university life and to education of its students. On the university campus we have four buildings named after Kansas Alpha Phi Psis. One of Kansas Alpha's founders has the Architectural Engineering building named after him: Frank O. Marvin ('76) Hall. William A. Snow ('87) Hall houses the Life Sciences. The Solon E. Summerfield ('99) Building houses the School of Business.

Solon E. Summerfield also created the National Scholarship Fund for incoming freshmen and in 1952, on the 100th Anniversary of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, the current Phi Psi undergraduate scholarship award was created. This award has, until this year, consisted of a \$100 award to a scholar selected by the undergraduates of each of our Chapters. This year the award has been augmented by an overall winner in the amount of \$1,000 and runner-up awards of \$500 and \$300.

Of course at Kansas Alpha it would be impossible to skip over the "Dean of College Basketball," the late Forrest C. "Phog" Allen, '05. The University of Kansas Field House is properly named after Brother Allen.

"Phog" was also the first of three generations of Kansas Alpha Phi Psi Brothers including eight Allen Brothers. Besides his older brother Harry B. "Pete" Allen, '02, "Phog's" two sons, Dr. Robert E. Allen, '38 and John M. "Mit" Allen, '33, are Kansas Alphans. Dr. Bob's sons: Robert Jr., '65, John, '70, and Mark, '71, are all Kansas Alphans. And, "Mit" Allen's son, Milton P. Allen Jr. is also a Phi Psi "Allen."

The oldest Kansas Alpha Phi Psi returning to the weekend celebration was Harold D. Evans Sr., '09, the beginning of three generations and five Kansas Alpha Brothers. Harold Sr. has a brother Russel E. Evans, '17, and two sons, Harold D. Evans Jr., '37, and William A. Evans, '42, followed by William A. Evans, '69.

The oldest of all three generation Phi Psis began in 1894 with the initiation of Fred M. Harris Sr., followed by his son Fred M. Harris Jr., '34, and grandson Fred M. Harris III, '59.

The latest three-generation family to begin includes five Kansas Alpha Brothers beginning with E. Lawrence Winn Sr. ('15) and progressing thru E. Larry Winn Jr., '38 (current U.S. Congressman), and three grandsons: E. Larry Winn III, '62, Robert E. Winn, '63, and Douglas S. Winn, '65. We are especially proud of these families.

There have been many other Phi Psis who have given of their time to help assure the continuance of Phi Kappa Psi's high ideals. Edward C. Little, '78, began this chain of dedication by performing as Editor of The Shield for 1885-86-87. Francis H. Robertson, '96, served as editor of the Phi Psi song book for the years of 1904 and 1924. He and George "Dumpy" Bowles, '08 contributed a dozen scores and lyrics to those books including "Phi Psis We Are The Men," "For We Are Phi Psis," "Stein Song," and "Phi Kappa Psi Triumphant" by Brother Robertson; and by Brother Bowles "The Phi Psi Rag." Brother Bowles also created the K.U. fight song still in use today: "For I'm A Jay, Jay, Jayhawk."

Two past national presidents also honor our rolls including the late Charles E. Strickland, '11, who began his Phi Psi career as Director of Alumni Associations from 1934 to 1938. In 1936, he was elected VGP and in 1938, SWGP. Brother Strickland also received special recognition for his efforts to create the lifetime membership program which is now part of our regular initiation fee.


Brother Winston R. "Cactus Pete" Tate, '18, is considered one of our most dedicated Brothers. Brother Tate began his service with Phi Psi at the national level as Director of Fraternity Education in 1934, and continued in this capacity thru 1946. During this tenure he published the "Phi Psi Manual" editions of 1936 and 1938. He also published "Duties of Chapter Officers and Committees." In 1938, he was unanimously elected Treasurer and served until 1946, when he was elected President of Phi Kappa Psi. Brother Tate also served in various capacities in the Kansas City Alumni Association where he became a leading contributor to The Shield under the pseudonym of "Cactus Pete." Brother Tate continues to serve as President of the Order of the S.C. of which he became a Charter Member in 1938. Brother Tate has attended 19 GACs thru 1974.

There are many other Kansas Alpha Phi Psis who have and continue to distinguish themselves in their own fields and in their communities. We are all proud of our associations and indeed feel a special honor to be members during the 100 years of Kansas Alpha history.

Oregon Alpha Is Back

Mission accomplished. When all the work on the restoration of the chapter house was completed and equipment and materials stored, members of Oregon Alpha were indeed proud of the Oregon Alpha Phi Psi house.

OREGON Alpha Chapter is back! It's alive! It's active. It's strong!


That describes today's situation at the University of Oregon chapter. Not so long ago the picture was one of despair and loss. The chapter's comeback is a story of dedication and hard work by many Brothers.

During the early 70s, Oregon Alpha suffered from internal problems and the anti-fraternity wave which swept the country. Though it had reported the largest active membership of any Phi Psi chapter in 1969, with 90 active members, by September, 1971, it had none. It joined ten other Oregon fraternities which died during this period. The chapter died despite efforts by alumni, including a large infusion of money, rush help, and other assistance.

With no members living in the house and no income, the chapter's house corporation faced bank foreclosure. To save the chapter house and property, the corporation auctioned all the chapter's furnishings and sold an adjacent piece of property to satisfy mortgage payments. At about the same time the corporation leased the chapter house to the Beta Theta Pi corporation for three years, ending in June, 1975. All of these actions saved the chapter house property, which few of the other ten fraternities were able to do. We had land, building, and dedicated, loyal alumni, but no undergraduate Brothers to continue the chapter's long-standing, strong tradition at Oregon.

A letter in February, 1973, from Ed Meserve, Oregon '32, began the process toward acquiring an active chapter's most important element—undergraduate members. His letter, telling of some freshmen at Oregon who had indicated to him interest in helping to restart the Phi Psi chapter, was relayed to Fraternity Treasurer Bob Danielson, Oregon '61, and Fraternity Secretary Hal Dick, Bowling Green '55. Danielson and

This isn't exactly how the professional painters do it, but for members of Oregon Alpha, it was the completion of a long, hard job of painting and repairing the chapter house.

Dick met with these freshmen and decided that they had the qualities needed for a reestablishment effort. In late March, Steve Merge, Steve Wick, Bill Ruckman, and Mark Sweeney were pledged. Being the first fraternity to attempt a comeback at Oregon, these pledges found interested individuals, but no one wanted to pledge. They ended the school year with just three, as Mark transferred to Stanford.

During fall formal rush, 1973-74, no pledges were taken. By this time the three pledges had moved from the dorm to an apartment, and Mike Garvey, Oregon '65, had become advisor and pledge educator. Though the group had weekly rush parties in the apartment and a few alumni showed up to help, it was mid-November before any success was achieved. Then, within two weeks eight men were pledged. These 11 were initiated at a joint Oregon Alpha-Oregon Beta initiation at Founders Day, 1974.

For the next year and a half, though operating without a house, the chapter grew. As it grew, one of its constant goals was becoming strong enough to get back into the Phi Psi house.

Meanwhile the chapter, through Bob Danielson, began an alumni communications program. The program's goals were to keep the alumni informed, involve them in the re-establishment effort, acquire some financial assistance for rush and other programs, and build a permanent bond of fraternalism between undergraduates and alumni. Alumni were asked to become active partners in the rebuilding of their chapter. It brought home the true meaning of "a Phi Psi for life." To date, the alumni have contributed nearly

\$8,500 toward this program, but most importantly, it has brought the Brothers, young and old, closer together.

Simultaneously, the corporation began requesting financial help through its "PROJECT FULL HOUSE" to refurbish the house for when it would again be occupied by Brothers. This "Project," which started in October, 1974, brought in over \$10,500 in gifts and pledges. This along with \$5,000 borrowed from the national Fraternity, was used during the summer of 1975, to completely refurbish the house. Several undergraduates stayed at the house during the summer, completely repainting and repairing it, inside and out. Many Oregon alumni, including Jim Dotten, '66, Gary Bartel, '63, Mike Kuratli, '63, Ron Erickson, '61, Bill Bloodworth, '41, Mike Gerot, '65, Mike Garvey, and Bob Danielson, spent many hours buying furnishings and helping during weekend work parties. Of course, many others were involved in the success of this "Project," including Maurice Warnock, '23, who offered a \$1,000 challenge to other alumni, which was matched two for one. In all, nearly 400 Phi Psis responded with gifts from \$1 to \$1,250. Without this help, the chapter would now be living in an unfurnished, unpainted, unrepaired house. Now, Oregon Alpha, once thought to be dead and buried, is alive and well in Eugene, Oregon.

Today there are 45 active Phi Psis at the University of Oregon and 800 alumni who have seen what Brotherhood and fraternal cooperation can accomplish. Working side by side they have rebuilt our strong band at the University of Oregon.

Buzzie Bavasi Leads San Diego Padres

THE San Diego Padres have known only one president since the club's inception back in 1969 and that is long-time baseball executive Emil J. (Buzzie) Bavasi, DePauw '19.

Brother Bavasi joined the Padres from the Los Angeles Dodgers organization when the National League added San Diego to the Western Division in its expansion move in 1969. Prior to taking over the reins of the Padres, Bavasi had served with the Dodgers since 1939.

A 1938 graduate of DePauw University in Indiana, he joined the old Brooklyn Dodgers in 1939, as part of the office staff. A year later he was given his first chance at administrative work and was named as the business manager of the Dodgers farm club in Americus, Georgia. He remained in the South for several years as he moved on to become business manager at Valdosta, Georgia (1941-42) and then Durham, North Carolina in 1943.

Following the 1943 campaign, he was drafted into the United States Army and remained in the service until 1947, when he rejoined the Dodgers organization as the General Manager at Nashua, New Hampshire.

From there it was just a short hop to Montreal as General Manager of the International League, the Dodgers top farm club, where he stayed from 1948-50. His efforts at Montreal won him the "Executive-of-the-Year" award in 1948, and helped gain a promotion to General Manager and Vice President of the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1951.

He then moved with the club when the franchise shifted to Los Angeles in 1958, and his work in 1959 (when the Dodgers took the World Series from the Chicago White Sox), earned him the "Executive-of-the-Year Award" for the second time.

With the Dodgers from 1951-68, he saw the club win eight National League pennants, tie for first place on two occasions (losing play-offs to the Giants both times) and win four World Series in 1955, 1959, 1963 and 1965.

With a little luck, according to the Associated Press, the San Diego Padres might have more to celebrate this year than just the Bicentennial. Some experts are

picking the Padres for third place in the National League West. This would be up from their fourth place finish last year.

On paper, at least, the Padres aren't nearly strong enough to challenge either Los Angeles or Cincinnati for the two top spots in the division. But on paper, who is?

If San Diego, again according to the experts, can get better performances out of their pitching staff and hitters, the Padres have a chance to beat out San Francisco, Atlanta and Houston for third place.

Buzzie Bavasi is married to the former Elizabeth Evit Rice with children, Peter (33 and presently General Manager of the Padres), Christopher (29), Robert (22) and Billy (18).

A member of many organizations outside the realm of baseball, his most notable positions are: Director, WINCORP (the Western Harness Racing Association); Director, Boys Town of the Desert; Director, National Athletic Institute; and a Knight of the Holy Sepulchre.

PHI KAPPA PSI's 58th biennial Grand Arch Council will be held at the Twin Bridges Marriott Hotel, Washington, D.C., Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, August 11-15, 1976. Registration will begin at 2:00 p.m., Wednesday, August 11, with the opening event at 8:00 p.m. that evening—an informal Phi Psi get-together for all Phi Psis, their ladies, and special guests. The GAC will adjourn at about noon on Sunday, August 15. Between the opening and adjournment there will be a jam-packed program of fun and business designed for the enjoyment of all in attendance. The nation's capital will be especially exciting this bicentennial year!

Delegates

Each chapter should immediately elect three Grand Arch Council delegates—two undergraduates and an

alumnus. Alumni associations in good standing* are entitled to three GAC delegates.

Chapter Advisors, Area Directors

Every chapter should induce its Phi Psi Chapter Advisor and Area Director to attend the GAC and should contribute to his travel expense if possible. This investment will lead to valuable dividends in the way of counsel, advice, and guidance. An allowance of \$25.00 is provided by the Fraternity for each Advisor and Area Director in attendance to assist in the cost.

^{*} An alumni association must have paid \$40 to the Executive Secretary for each of the two years immediately preceding the GAC or DC to be eligible to vote at either council. The payment, due May 1 of each year, includes \$25 for general expenses of the Fraternity and \$15 for the Endowment Fund.



Credentials

Present the original credentials at the registration desk at the Twin Bridges Marriott Hotel when you arrive.

Attendance at Council Sessions

At least one delegate from each chapter and alumni association entitled to representation must attend each session of the GAC. The fine for missing a roll call is \$5. Each delegate has one vote. No chapter or alumni association shall instruct its delegates to vote in any specified way upon any matter. Every undergraduate, alumnus, pledge, or colony member, whether an accredited delegate or not, is cordially invited and sincerely urged to attend the 1976 GAC. All members are welcome to each session and are given the privileges of the floor.

Delegates Expense

An allowance is provided each chapter and colony to help cover the travel expenses of delegates. The Fraternity does not pay the expenses of alumni association delegates.

The travel allowance is indicated on the enclosed form. This allowance may be distributed among the delegates in any manner prescribed by the chapter or colony. Allowances will be paid at a designated hour the last day of the GAC.

Chapter Records

Chapter delegates should bring the chapter's most recent financial statement or audit. No additional books or records are necessary unless specifically directed by the Executive Council.

Reservations and Rates at the Hotel

Special rates (European plan) will apply during the GAC. Singles \$32, Doubles or Twins \$36, Triples \$39, Quads \$40. Suites are available at \$80. Reservations should be made directly with the hotel.

Registration Fee


Undergraduates and alumni will register at the Twin Bridges Marriott Hotel when they arrive. The fee for members is \$60 and \$45 for ladies and guests. The registration fee includes the cost of the Awards Luncheon, GAC Banquet, and other events. The fee is reduced to \$50 for members and \$40 for ladies and guests who preregister by July 30.

Fines

Any chapter failing to register for the GAC will be fined \$250.

Arrival and Departure

The first session of the GAC begins at 8:00 p.m., Wednesday, August 11, with adjournment as close to



noon as possible on Sunday, August 15, so you should plan your arrival and departure accordingly.

Honors and Awards

Outstanding scholarship and publications will be recognized at the GAC awards luncheon, Friday, August 13. Be sure your chapter or alumni association has submitted copies of its newsletter and rush booklet to the Executive Secretary so that they may be included in the competition sponsored by the New York Alumni Association.

Standing With the Fraternity

It will be most embarrassing to both the officers of the Fraternity and individual chapter delegates if the GAC is told of any debt owed the Fraternity. When the Fraternity's fiscal year ends May 31, the books will be audited for submission to the Grand Arch Council.

Chapter officers are requested to determine the exact financial position of their chapters with the Fraternity, and to make arrangements to pay any outstanding debts before May 10. Any charges billed after that date should be paid at once.

Any chapter whose account with the Fraternity is in arrears 90 days will not be entitled to vote upon any matter coming before the GAC. Each chapter, however, must be represented at the GAC.

Each GP should read this information to his chapter when the delegates are elected.

New Award Honors Phi Psi's Alumni Leaders

FROM its founding in 1852, Phi Kappa Psi has encouraged the qualities of leadership, sacrifice, and loyalty to the Fraternity and its members. A new award for Alumni which will be presented for only the second time at the 1976 Grand Arch Council in Washington offers each Chapter and Alumni Association the chance to recognize our Fraternity's outstanding alumnus.

The EDWARD H. KNIGHT AWARD will honor an alumnus who:

- -has rendered invaluable, unselfish, and meritorious service to Phi Kappa Psi or to one of its Chapters or Alumni Associations in the past two years; and who
- -is not an elected or appointed officer of the national Fraternity.

The first Knight Award recipient was Philip M. Cornelius, *Indiana '25* and former President of Phi Kappa Psi. Brother Cornelius received the honor at the 1974 GAC in New Orleans.

Edward H. Knight, Indiana Gamma '93, set a number of records in his long career as a Phi Psi. Initiated

when the Fraternity's membership numbered only a few thousand, he lived to see Phi Kappa Psi grow nationwide and include 45,000 living members. Eddie served as an Archon and in several national offices, but he was proudest of his role in re-establishing Indiana Gamma in 1948. He picked a group of young men on the Wabash College campus, inspired them to want to join Phi Kappa Psi, and worked with them to renovate a chapter house, establish a reputation for leadership on the campus, and persuade the 1948 GAC to award a new charter to Indiana Gamma. Incidentally, that GAC was only the most memorable of many he attended-from 1894 to 1970, Eddie Knight never missed one of the 39 Fraternity conventions. It is not surprising that he was one of the co-founders of the Order of SC.

Following his death in 1974, the undergraduate and alumni members of Indiana Gamma established the Knight Award in "Brotherly love, sincere humility and deep gratitude." Nomination forms for the 1976 Knight Award have been mailed to all Chapters and Alumni Associations. Nominations should be returned to the Fraternity Headquarters, 1940 East 6th St., Cleveland, Ohio 44114, no later than June 15.

The names of the recipients will also be published in THE SHIELD, and announcements sent to newspapers in a recipient's hometown.

Recipients will be selected based on their scholarship, qualities of leadership and community and university service.


Prediction is for 5 per cent fewer jobs


A recent survey indicates 5 per cent fewer college graduates will be hired than were employed last June, according to the College Placement Council. Based on responses from 630 employers, the forecast is for 2 per cent increase in hiring in engineering and business, a 19 per cent drop in "sciences, math, other technical" and a 12 per cent decrease for "other non-technical" which category is composed largely of the humanities and social science majors. The demand for MBA graduates is expected to be up 5 per cent. A year ago the projection was that hiring would be down 4 per cent. Business conditions deteriorated and the year actually was off 18 per cent from the year earlier, according to the survey.



§200 Years §A Proud Heritage

PHI KAPPA PSI will mark its 125th anniversary in 1977, and the American college fraternity system celebrates its bicentennial with the Nation this year. It is an American institution as old as the country itself, and the fraternity chapter as it exists on the college campus is a reflection of our American society. This reflection has changed—Phi Kappa Psi has changed—during the nation's history, just as society has changed.

As we review the year just past, we can take pride in our fraternity history. The Greeks have a great tradition. The concept of fraternity—of brotherhood—is as old as man himself. Phi Beta Kappa was the first fraternity, founded at William and Mary on December 5, 1776, and it, like all fraternities, had a background of high idealism, a strong tie of friendship and comradeship, and an urge for sharing its values through nationwide expansion.

Kappa Alpha Society founded in 1825 at Union College, Schenectady, N.Y., was the first to function as we know fraternities now, followed by Sigma Phi (1827), and Delta Phi (1827), and all are in continuous existence today and constitute the Union Triad. Beta Theta Pi, founded at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, in 1839, joined by Phi Delta Theta (1848), and Sigma Chi (1855), constitute the Miami Triad, with Phi Gamma Delta (1848) and Phi Kappa Psi (1852) representing the *Jeff Duo*, having sprung to life at old Jefferson College in Canonsburg, Pa., another cradle of fraternities. There were other Greekletter groups founded at Union before 1855-Psi Upsilon in 1833, Chi Psi in 1841, Theta Delta Chi, 1847, with Alpha Delta Phi at Hamilton College in 1832. Delta Upsilon claims its founding in 1834 at Williams College, with Delta Kappa Epsilon and Alpha Sigma Phi at Yale in 1844 and 1845, respectively. There followed Delta Psi, 1847, at Columbia, Zeta Psi, 1847, at New York University, Phi Kappa Sigma, 1850, at the University of Pennsylvania, and Chi Phi at Princeton in 1854.

Fifty years after the founding of the last of the Miami Triad in 1855, there were 31 general fraternities. Those fraternities had 970 active chapters and 379 inactive—a total of 1,349. Phi Kappa Psi had 42 active chapters and 21 inactive. The total number of members in all fraternities was just under 180,000. There were 658 chapter houses of which 290 were owned and 368 rented. There were, in Phi Kappa Psi, 1,119 undergraduate members, 364 initiates, and a total membership of 9,895 in 1905.

Fraternities Today

The American college fraternity system today has over 4,550 active chapters of 58 national and international fraternities on over 615 campuses in the United States and Canada, with more than 2,675,000 living members. Add to that the statistics of sororities—over 2,300 chapters and 1,600,000 members—and the Greeks are truly a significant force in our society. The college fraternity rightfully celebrates its achievements with the Nation's bicentennial of freedom, and enters its third century as healthy as ever, and with promise to remain a significant part of America and higher education.

1975-1976 In Review

The annual report is here presented for the 124th time, 76 years since the turn of the century, embracing the usual and required statistical and general information, based on the annual reports of chapter AGs covering the period March 1, 1975, to February 29, 1976, as are most of the figures in this report. This "statistical year" is at variance with the academic and fiscal years, but has served the purposes for data gathering since 1853 when the first annual report was prepared by Pennsylvania Alpha, then Grand Chapter of the Fraternity.

MEMBERSHIP

One thousand one hundred forty-one (1,141) initiates were added to the growing list of members of Phi Kappa Psi during the past year. This total compares to 1,154 a year ago, a decline of 13. The year of 1967 was the highest ever recorded at 1,511 initiates.

Two Chapters Installed

Maryland Alpha at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, inactive from June 13, 1969, was rechartered on April 3, 1975, returning an old chapter founded in 1879 to the active list. Also chartered was Montana Alpha at the University of Montana, Missoula, on May 31, 1975, giving the Fraternity its strong, first foothold in the Big Sky Country.

Colonies

At February 28, there were six colonies in operation, working towards meeting the requirements for receiving chapter charters. These were Arizona Alpha at the University of Arizona, Tucson; Arizona Gamma at Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff; Florida Beta at the University of Florida, Gainesville; Georgia Alpha at the University of Georgia, Athens; New Mexico Alpha at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque; and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and University, Blacksburg. Since the close of the reporting period, three additional colonies have been organized, California Gamma at the University of California, Berkeley, Pennsylvania Iota at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, and Wisconsin Alpha at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, all formerly strong chapters. One colony, Arizona Gamma at Northern Arizona University, unfortunately has been discontinued for lack of progress.

No chapters were closed during the last year. Warning flags still fly for some chapters, but continued improvement generally is noted all along the line, particularly those chapters reported as making good progress in the annual review of a year ago. Missouri Beta at Westminster College is in difficulty and a determination of its future is now being studied. Louisiana Alpha at Louisiana State University is undergoing reorganization at this time, as will California Beta at Stanford this fall.

Pledges

This year the Fraternity's 76 chapters at Feb. 29, 1976, pledged a total of 1,528, compared to 1,415 a year ago. This represents an increase of 113. Two years ago, pledges totaled 1,433. More than 80 percent of the pledges were initiated, following a trend in the past years due to late reporting of pledges by the chapters, with early depledgings not accounted for. Fraternity law provides that pledgeship terminates 1) upon initiation into the Fraternity, or 2) upon expiration of two semesters or three quarter final grade reporting periods from date of pledging.

Kansas Alpha Joins 1500 Club

Kansas Alpha at the University of Kansas, celebrating its centennial this year, joined the 1500 Club open only to chapters claiming 1500 or more members, becoming the second chapter to gain membership in this exclusive club. Indiana Beta at Indiana University had been the sole 1500 Clubber since 1966. Kansas Alpha moved from 1,479 to an even 1,500, with the initiation of Michael J. Rohrig on Feb. 15, 1976. Indiana Beta's consecutive roll went from 1,800 to 1,828 during the year under review. Other chapters pushing for membership in the 1500 Club are Pennsylvania Beta at Allegheny College-1,433; New York Epsilon at Colgate-1,433; and Ohio Alpha at Ohio Wesleyan -1,406, with Illinois Alpha at Northwestern University and New York Alpha at Cornell approaching 1,400 members, recording 1,388 and 1,375, respectively.

Iowa Beta Joins 1000 Club

Iowa Beta Chapter at Iowa State University joined the 1000 Club, now consisting of 33 chapters. Martin Joseph Bohlke became Iowa Beta's 1,000th initiate on Dec. 13, 1975, bringing the total initiates of Iowa Beta to 1,009.

Those chapters close to 1000 Club membership are: Virginia Beta at Washington and Lee—992, the same as a year ago; Oregon Alpha at the University of Oregon—930; and California Beta at Stanford—979, the same as a year ago.

District III Has Largest Chapters

District III, comprising 13 chapters, reported the largest total undergraduate membership, with 656, and recorded the largest average undergraduate membership with 50.5 members per chapter, up from 45.5 last year. This represents the eleventh straight year that District III has led all others in total membership, but displaces District I, with 12 chapters, which had the largest average undergraduate membership a year ago, dropping from 46.7 to 45.0.

Districts V, II, and VI, followed the leaders with average undergraduate membership of 41.3, 39.9, and 38.2, respectively. District IV, with 12 chapters, reported the smallest average undergraduate strength of 29.8, up from 28.8 last year.

For the fourth year in a row, average chapter membership for all chapters has increased from 35.4, to 38.1, to 39.4, to 40.8 for the current year.

Initiates

The 76 chapters reported 1,141 initiates and transfers during the 1975-1976 period. This is down only 13 from a year ago when initiates and transfers totaled 1,154. West Virginia Alpha at West Virginia University reported 54 initiates to lead all other chapters. Pennsylvania Gamma at Bucknell was first last year with 53, but recorded only one initiate for 1975-76. New York Epsilon at Colgate was second in total number of initiates for the year, with 43. Two chapters, Indiana Alpha at DePauw and Nebraska Alpha at Nebraska, reported 37 and 33 initiates, respectively. Twenty-one chapters reported between 20-29 initiates. These were Oregon Alpha (20), Pennsylvania Alpha (21), New York Alpha (22), Ohio Beta (22), Ohio Delta (22), California Eta (22), Indiana Delta (23), Maryland Alpha (23), Montana Alpha (23), California Delta (23), Tennessee Delta (24), Rhode Island Beta (25), Ohio Lambda (25), Louisiana Beta (26), Texas Beta (26), California Epsilon (27), Indiana Beta (28), Nebraska Beta (28), and Illinois Delta (29). The number of initiates and transfers and undergraduates for all chapters are listed in detail in the membership table accompanying this report.

Numbers in Chapters

New York Epsilon at Colgate University with 105 members leads all other chapters in undergraduate strength at Feb. 29, 1976. Indiana Beta at Indiana University, with 98, was second, followed by West Virginia Alpha, West Virginia University, with 96, Nebraska Alpha, Nebraska, with 92, and Illinois Delta, Illinois, with 91.

Others in order of undergraduate strength are In-

diana Alpha at DePauw, 72, New York Alpha at Cornell, 72, Ohio Delta at Ohio State, 70, Pennsylvania Gamma at Bucknell, 70, California Eta at California Poly, 70, Kansas Alpha at Kansas, 69, Tennessee Delta at Vanderbilt, 67, Indiana Gamma, Wabash, 63, and Texas Beta at Texas Tech, 62. Nine chapters reported between 50-59 undergraduate members, 13 between 40-49, 8 between 30-39, 14 between 20-29, and 13 between 10-19. Only five recorded less than ten undergraduate members compared to three a year ago.

INTERFRATERNITY

20 Largest Fraternities

Phi Kappa Psi since her founding in 1852 has initiated 67,691 men through the spring of 1976, on which the figures for the 20 largest American college fraternities are based. This continues to rank her 18th among the largest in total numbers of initiates. This rank has remained constant since 1969 when the Fraternity went from 17th to 18th as a result of the merger or the amalgamation of Zeta Beta Tau with several other national fraternities which brought it to the list for the first time in ninth place. There have been no current statistics for Zeta Beta Tau since 1971. Sigma Alpha Epsilon, with headquarters in Evanston, Ill., and founded in 1856, remains the largest with 164,436 initiates. Phi Sigma Kappa, founded in 1873, with headquarters in Drexel Hill, Pa., ranks 20th with 54,700 initiates.

Tau Kappa Epsilon is the largest fraternity in numbers of active chapters with 312. Lambda Chi Alpha follows with 202. Sigma Phi Epsilon, with 199 chapters, is third, succeeding Sigma Alpha Epsilon, with 185, which is now fourth. Phi Kappa Psi, with 76, has the smallest number of chapters among the 20 largest fraternities.

Among the 20 largest fraternities alone, there have been 777 new chapters installed in the last ten years, 345 in five years, and 1,425 during a 25 year period. Phi Kappa Psi has installed 22 chapters during the decade, six in the last five years, and two in the 1975-76 period. The Fraternity has lost no chapters during the last year and has eight colonies as identified elsewhere in this report.

HOUSING

The total value of the 48 houses owned by chapter house corporations of the Fraternity (including land valued at \$1,706,120) totaled \$8,084,624, compared to \$8,561,000 a year ago, a decrease of \$476,376. Mortgages totaled \$1,308,715, a decrease over the \$1,848,000 indebtedness reported in 1974-75.

Of the 76 chapters 48 own houses, 15 occupy houses owned by the college or university, eight rent homes privately, three are provided dormitory sections (Rhode Island Alpha at Brown, North Carolina Alpha at Duke, and South Carolina Alpha at South Carolina) by the universities. Two chapters (Nebraska Beta at Creighton and Texas Beta of Texas Tech) occupy lodges.

Phi Psi chapters provided 2,622 bed spaces for students. Chapter owned or privately rented housing accounted for 1,849 beds, and 773 bed spaces are provided by colleges and universities in houses or dormitories restricted to fraternities. The total number of bed spaces increased by 135 over last year, mostly accounted for through housing acquired by Maryland Alpha and Montana Alpha, and the new dormitory section occupied by South Carolina Alpha. There is also a trend towards better utilization of existing space in houses as the demand for rooms increases with the rising rents of apartments and dormitories.

EXECUTIVE OFFICES

The changing nature and activities of the Fraternity is reflected in the increasing variety and volume of work carried out by the Executive Offices—"The Bureau of Standards"—in Cleveland, Ohio. The varying changes in the collegiate scene, along with the continued new developments in operations and techniques, require the Executive Offices to keep in step with the times.

The Executive Office staff consists of the Executive Secretary Ralph D. Daniel, Arizona '47, who coordinates and unifies the various services of the office; the Assistant Executive Secretary Gary B. Angstadt, Indiana '70, who assists in the everyday operations of the offices along with having responsibility for the recruitment, training, and scheduling of chapter consultants, and with matters of new chapter development; and a staff of five chapter consultants; and one part-time and three full-time secretaries.

Staff Appointments

During the year, the Executive Secretary announced the appointment Sept. 15, 1975, of Carl H. Bennett, Miami '72, New Springfield, Ohio and John A. Burke, Miami '72, Medina, Ohio and of John W. Harris Jr., Alabama '71, Russellville, Ala., on Feb. 10, 1976, to the staff as Chapter Consultants. In addition, Thomas E. Kraemer III, Penn State '72, of Newtown Square, Pa., was named a Chapter Consultant effective June 16, 1976.

Continuing his outstanding service to the Fraternity as a Chapter Consultant is Guy L. Minardi, Rhode

Island '72, of Fair Lawn, N.J., who has served since July 8, 1974. Two other veteran riders of the Red and Green have completed their tours of duty and have the grateful thanks of the Fraternity for their work. J. Carter Noonan II, Texas Tech '73, of Houston, Texas, who joined the staff Jan. 1, 1975, left Jan. 1, 1976, to return to his native state, and Robert A. Wolter, Iowa State '71, of Marshalltown, Iowa, who had served since July 8, 1974, completed his two-year assignment and resigned from the staff June 8, 1976.

The Chapter Consultant program is one of the general Fraternity's most important and necessary services. These highly trained and intelligent young Phi Psis provide services and dissiminate information to the Fraternity's many chapters, alumni associations, and clubs, and work in the area of new chapter development. The Chapter Consultant is an important communications and public relations source providing continuity between the Executive Offices, Executive Council, and the chapters and alumni groups.

Chapter Visits

During the 1975-76 academic year, the Fraternity's chapter consultants conducted 125 visits to chapters and colonies of Phi Kappa Psi. Some of these included extended visits in cases of chapters with special problems. In addition, five colonies were organized, two chapters restructured, and many visits made to colleges and universities with respect to new chapter development.

Alumni Increase Support Of Annual Giving Program

Record Breaking Year

A T the risk of sounding like a broken record, the Fraternity Headquarters announces that another all-time high was reached during the 1975 Alumni Support Program. The 1975 total of \$82,512.04 was contributed by Phi Psi alumni and undergraduates. This marks the third consecutive year the program has gone over the \$50,000 mark. Surpassing last year's total by \$8,907.84, this brings the grand total since 1952 to \$691,636.68. That's record-breaking.

In the days of rising costs, the Fraternity holds no exemption from the cost spiral. The Alumni Support Program supplements the income derived from pledge and initiation fees, the Permanent Fund income and other investment income for the day-to-day operation of the Fraternity. Alumni support dollars are used to increase and improve the services for chapters, colonies, alumni associations and clubs. The Program also sustains continuing efforts like the Educational Leadership Conferences, the development of new chapters and the various Fraternity publications.

Broadening Base

Throughout the history of the Alumni Support Program the base of giving, or the number of contributors, has increased. Each year has usually seen a gradual increase in the number of Phi Psis participating in the Program. The year 1975 was no exception as 4,640 contributors sent in their assistance to Phi Kappa Psi. As the base continues to expand, the larger amount of dollar assistance will be even more helpful to the Fraternity.

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Mil Batten Named Chief of New York Stock Exchange

WHERE do you go after you've been chairman of J. C. Penney? Well, in the case of William M. (Mil) Batten, Ohio State '29, it's the chairmanship of Wall Street's New York Stock Exchange. On May 19, Brother Batten assumed the command of the exchange at a critical time in the exchange's 184-year history as Congress and the SEC continues their restructuring of the securities industry. Many believe the central issue is whether or not the NYSE gets swallowed up in a computerized national stock market system or remains as the national centerpiece of the industry.

Born in Reedy, W. Va., Mil Batten attended The Ohio State University and was president of the student body and his chapter, Ohio Delta. He was also a member of Beta Gamma Sigma, Bucket and Dipper, and Sphinx. He was graduated in 1932 with a B.S. in economics. He did graduate work during 1932 at the University of Chicago.

He married Kathryn Clark of Gettysburg, Ohio, in 1935 and the couple have two children—a son, David, and a daughter, Jane. Today, the Battens live in Mill Neck, Long Island, New York.

Mil Batten began with the J. C. Penney Company, Inc. as an extra salesman in 1926 and as a regular salesman in 1928 in Parkersburg, W. Va. He joined the company on a full-time basis in 1935 as salesman, section manager and then assistant manager in Lansing, Mich. During the period 1940-42, he served as training director in the personnel office at J. C. Penney's central office and following three years military service, he returned to the central office to serve as Eastern Zone personnel representative during 1945-51. He was named assistant to the president of J. C. Penney Co. in 1951, elected vice president in 1953, named to the board of directors in 1955, elected president and chief executive officer in 1958, and chairman of the board, 1964. He retired as chairman in October, 1974.

While with the Penney organization, he was known to be a stiff competitor, while being a smooth and persuasive diplomat. In the highly competitive world of retailing, he brought Penney from its long traditional dry-goods firm to a department store chain. It was Batten that pushed Penney into the catalog business in direct competition with Sears, Roebuck & Co.

Batten first joined the NYSE as one of its ten "public" (or non-Wall Street) directors in 1972. Before being named chairman, he led a Big Board study that recommended reforms in the ways stocks are allocated to specialists. In the face of a potentially touchy political issue, he produced what many experts regarded as a workable solution.

Even before officially taking over the job of James J. Needham as the chief executive of the exchange, Batten, who was 67 in early June, was hard at work preparing himself for the new job. He normally arrives at Wall Street at 8 a.m. and often leaves as late as 7 p.m. Since being named to the new post, he has met with scores of brokers, legislators, industry officials and staff members to get first-hand reports on proposals, problems and programs.

Many Wall Streeters feel that Batten was chosen to replace Needham because of his stature in the corporate community. And besides his marketing success at J. C. Penney, he has a reputation as a cool, analytical thinker, one who can translate thoughts into action judiciously.

"He has the ability to look ahead and establish objectives, and measure performance toward those objectives," said Donald V. Seibert, current J. C. Penney chairman in a recent interview with *The Wall Street Journal*. "He won't emphasize the bottom line today at the expense of tomorrow."

Batten was an early advocate of the concept of competition among exchange specialists, or brokers who are supposed to try to minimize price fluctuations. In early May, the exchange endorsed this principle.

Other activities in which Mil Batten participates include directorships in J. C. Penney, American Telephone and Telegraph, Boeing Company and Texas Instruments, Inc. He is a trustee for the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars (Washington, D.C.), National Urban League, and the Committee for Economic Development. He was president of The Economic Club of New York, 1967-68.

Book Review

The Life and Hard Times of James Thurber

Editor's Note: Kent C. Owen took time from his busy schedule in Bloomington to prepare this book review on Brother James Thurber. He has taught courses on Thurber and other American humorists at Indiana University in addition to his own writings.

HE was probably the greatest American humorist since Mark Twain, if you disallow such claimants as Robert Benchley, Ring Lardner, and George Ade. His comic drawings made men, women, and dogs materialize in antic shapes that revealed the surreal dimensions of modern life. The New Yorker, perhaps the country's best magazine, owes much of its success to his work. There is a way of regarding the human condition that is uniquely identified with James Thurber, 1894-1961, Ohio State '16.

It's a shame we can't leave it at that. The greatness of his achievement is beyond question, no matter what the latest canvass of the professoriate may show. You could look it up, as he wrote once. No, it isn't his work that's hard to figure, it's his life. The present source of the quandary is Burton Bernstein's *Thurber* (Dodd, Mead; 532 pp.; \$15), which was supposed to be the authorized biography, but was disowned by the widow, Helen Thurber, upon its completion. I can see why.

The James Thurber who emerges from Mr. Bernstein's diligent research and trenchant perceptions is at once wittily entertaining, companionable, kindly, generous, reflective-clearly the ironical humanist one expects him to have been-but also through much of his later life a desperate man, tormented by sickness, blindness, booze, and, at the very end, madness. Although the book is by no means a despicable hatchet job, one soon gains the impression that Mr. Bernstein gradually lost patience with Thurber because of his often exasperating behavior; the consequence is that the biographer eventually lost his sympathy for his subject. Admittedly, according to the author's sources, Thurber was frequently a most trying man, particularly in his very last years when he made his friends suffer almost as much as he himself must have. Although Mr. Bernstein's account of the "truth" about Thurber is hard to take for anyone who hopes to admire the man as well as the work, the book, perhaps in spite of itself, reveals much of significance about the man's will to survive. How Thurber withstood his afflictions at all deserves to be considered, for it must help to explain the substance of his character.

Thurber was, of course, initiated into Phi Kappa

Psi by Ohio Delta through the intercession of Elliott Nugent, his lifelong friend and co-author of "The Male Animal." Nugent, who has recounted his own life in *Events Leading Up to the Comedy*, sensed in the gawky, aimless, one-eyed townie something other fraternities had failed to recognize. Nugent and Jack Pierce shepherded Thurber into Phi Psi, and the loner at last found himself among men who appreciated his wit and gentle nature, who accepted him for what he was and for what he would become. It may have been the making of James Thurber, and he never forgot.

The very fact that a man of significance is a member of a fraternity does not necessarily imply a casual relationship between that experience and his later achievements. And yet . . . Like others who have made a difficult passage from the painful uncertainties of adolescence to the exactions of manhood, Thurber needed the understanding and support of friends. Because he found them in Phi Psi at a time when he most needed them, it would lessen our knowledge of him to ignore or undervalue the Fraternity's influence on his development.

Mr. Bernstein seems to regard the whole thing as a less than mild form of retardation. He is civil enough to avoid making any direct claim that the Fraternity stunted Thurber's growth as a man or writer, but the phenomenon is obliquely viewed as just another example of benighted Midwestern provincialism. (Incidentally, the author is not likely to be offered the key to the City of Columbus or an honorary doctorate by Ohio State on the basis of his characterizations of them. Generosity toward all things Midwestern is not one of his more conspicuous virtues. Indeed, Mr. Bernstein seldom misses an opportunity to be slighting and snide, but he is not, by that token, necessarily untruthful.)

His attitude toward Thurber's declared affection for Phi Psi is pretty snotty, although Thurber does get carried away in his letters to Elliott Nugent, usually in a breezy campus manner that soon becomes cloying. (These just might be some of Thurber's parodies, but I can't detect the irony.) This early epistolary style stands in sharp contrast to the astringently funny and supple letters he was to write in later life. But the length of the letters doesn't change much at all; Thurber seems to have been an untiring exponent of the old-fashioned ten-pager. Nonetheless, his enthusiasms and loyalties are convincingly expressed, and, despite some embarrassingly silly passages (maybe boyish is the right word), a compelling sense of

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the artist as a young man comes through in bursts of energy and sincerity.

I think that Mr. Bernstein misses something crucial about Thurber and Phi Psi: that the Fraternity, in accepting James Thurber as a man and a brother, enabled him to form friendships that strengthened his confidence in himself and his art, enriched his life beyond measure, and supported him through his troubled college years and, indeed, for as long as he lived. It is surely no coincidence that Nugent and Dr. Virgil "Duke" Damon (who delivered Thurber's daughter Rosemary) were first his brothers at Ohio Delta and then his friends until the end, enduring both the bright good times and the bad. It's also worth noting that the principal influence on his literary education was Joseph Villiers Denney, dean of Ohio State's College of Arts and Sciences, inspiring teacher and scholar of Shakespeare, and defender of intellectual freedom. Denney, the model for the humane Dean Damon in "The Male Animal" was a Phi Psi, one whose luminous character Thurber described in The Thurber Album, contrasting him with a popular English professor who was effusively fraternal and speciously literary.

Thurber was blessed with many real friends over the course of his life, men and women alike. (It appears that the prototype of the Thurber woman, that overbearing, emasculating virago, was his first wife, an Ohio State beauty and campus leader. That she was a Kappa is not, alas, an extenuating circumstance.) His letters to them, which the author quotes extensively, show Thurber as a considerate and compassionate man, eager to bring them good cheer and consolation. These acts of kindness are at odds with the sorry scenes that he made all too often. Burton Bernstein is not the only chronicler of his mischief, for Brendan Gill in the recently published Here at The New Yorker also reports what he calls Thurber's "wanton malice." Neither writer cares much for the practical jokes that Thurber played with genius and compulsion.

What, then, is one to make of Thurber's Jekyll and Hyde behavior? There were rumors of a brain tumor, there was even some talk of congenital insanity, but no sound evidence exists to support either supposition. He endured a series of eye operations, five in one year, eventually losing all sight. A severe toxic thyroid condition weakened him and interrupted his work, friends and associates died, his drinking got worse and worse. As his health deteriorated, his temper became nastier, breaking out in spasms of ranting and raving, after which he would become abjectly apologetic. Perhaps Thurber refused to resign himself to darkness, striking out at everything and everyone that came his way until his rage and anguish subsided. It may have been that his nature demanded excessively fierce resistance to the demons that beset him, whatever the cost in reason and civility. That he hurt those about him, there is no doubt; that he struggled to save his dignity and his spirit however perversely, there is some reason to think.

Now that you know the worst the author has to say about Thurber, it may come as something of a relief to hear E. B. White, his long-time colleague at *The New Yorker*, say "When he was well and sober, there was never a kinder, nicer friend." Which may be the most humane way to put it.

Thurber had written E. B. White in 1958, "To paraphrase and extend a thought of George Meredith's: My heart is not made of the stuff that breaks, my mind of the stuff that cheapens, my soul of the stuff that is on sale to the devil." It is a bold defiance of the fates and a proud statement of integrity, and it accords with what he wrote to Peter DeVries in 1961: "My only solution is a high heart and a brave spirit, however hard these flags may be to flaunt in the stormy weather of today." As his writing began to reflect the maelstrom of his inner and outer life, he struggled valiantly to keep from going under. In the foreword to Lances and Lanterns, the last book published during his lifetime, he wrote, ". . . let's not look back in anger, or forward in fear, but around in awareness." But even then he told Elliott Nugent, "I can't hide any more behind the mask of comedy that I've used all my life. People are not funny; they are vicious and horrible-and so is life!" It is reported that his last words were "God bless . . . God damn."

If Burton Bernstein's book fails to treat Thurber with as much charity as I believe he deserves, it does at the very least present a scrupulously detailed account of his life and circumstances. Its prose is workaday, at times even flat and banal. Yet the book is valuable because it organizes effectively the essential facts and materials about Thurber in a chronology that may form the basis for the work of other interpreters. Fortunately, the whole work is exceptionally well-paced, which is a consideration of some importance in a book of more than 500 pages. One must also be grateful that Mr. Bernstein is a veteran staff writer for The New Yorker and not a callow academic careerist who has thrust his dissertation upon us. The difference is not so much a matter of scholarship as it is one of literacy.

The place of James Thurber in both American letters and the Fraternity is remarkable, not only for the universality and excellence of his achievement, but for the gallantry of his life. To know Thurber as intimately and starkly as his biographer presents him to us is to place ourselves under the obligation of charity for his shortcomings, compassion for his suffering, and affirmation of his life and work. The boogie men, big and small, that scare the bejabbers out of us are less terrible because Thurber has lambasted them with laughter. The ordeal of becoming human is less awesome because Thurber has tempered it with irony. Thurber took to heart the counsel of his great master, Henry James, in his favorite novel, The Ambassadors, "Live, live all you can." Thus it is that comedy and tragedy become one in his work, and that work remains inextinguishable, an enduring celebration of the gift of life.

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Missouri Alpha Initiates John N. Booth

In 1932, John N. Booth was a pledge of Phi Kappa Psi at the University of Missouri at Columbia. Due to the hard financial situation of the era, he was not able to pay his initiation fee, thus was unable to be initiated. Forty-four years later on April 24, 1976, John N. Booth, president of the alumni association for the University, was initiated into the mysteries of Phi Kappa Psi.

In January 1976 upon the recommendation of several Phi Psi alumni, the Executive Council meeting in Denver voted unanimously for Booth to be considered for initiation by Missouri Alpha. The chapter in a confidential ballot voted their approval for his initiation.

The initiation was the main event of the 1976 Chapter Day at Missouri Alpha. At a noon luncheon following the ceremony, Booth received a standing ovation from the guests and said, "My words can't tell you the depth of my appreciation of this honor."

The speakers at the luncheon praised Booth and the local chapter. Steve Roszell, director of alumni activities of the University said, "Last year the alumni of this university contributed over \$3.5 million. But they also gave a lot of time and effort. I don't know if I can choose which is most valuable. John Booth is an excellent example of this spirit and effort received by this University from its alumni . . . this chapter should be proud."

Ken Potter, Fraternity vice president, was present at the ceremonies and said, "This chapter has made history today. The Fraternity has opened its arms to a man who pledged Phi Psi, he rightly deserved. Now this chapter

Cost of education to go up 32 per cent over the next decade

The cost of a year's college education has increased 42 per cent in the last ten years and will go up an additional 32 per cent in the coming decade, reports the National Center for Eudcation Statistics. To eliminate the distortion of inflation, amounts were adjusted to prices in 1974-75. The current average cost of a year's education is \$3,070, up in ten years from \$2,167 and expected to go to \$4,052 in ten years. For public institutions, the average for ten years ago was \$1,936, is currently \$2,796 and is expected to be \$3,705 in 1984-85. For private schools, the statistics are \$2,593 for ten years ago, \$3,954 in 1974 and \$5,427 in ten years. NCES sees a peak in enrollment in 1981 at 10.2 million students.

The Chronicle includes comment about increase in fraternity membership

A series of articles entitled "The Student Mood, 1976" which started in the April 26 edition of THE CHRONICLE OF HIGHER EDUCATION has this to say about fraternities.

'Membership in fraternities and sororities, which dropped off during the 1960's, is increasing again. Campuses where the Greek-letter societies are making a comeback include one time centers of student activism as Berkeley, Columbia, Cornell and Wisconsin."

NIC statistics show the lowest membership was in 1971-72 when the average chapter size dropped to 34 (from a high of 49 in 1965). There has been a gradual and consistent increase since the spring of 1972 until today the average chapter size is 44. Interestingly every year since 1945-including the period when chapter membership dropped-there have been more active chapters than there were the year before.
