Message From The President



Dear Brothers:

I come to you as the new SWGP—your leader for the next two years. It's a high honor and responsibility, but I could not have a better team.

Board members with wide and long experience working with the Fraternity in various roles, Archons who have very competently represented their Districts for a year, appointive officers of the Executive Council with talent and expertise to fit the particular calling of their office, and, of course, a hardworking Executive Director and loyal staff at Heritage Hall in

Indianapolis. Gary Angstadt is a leader among his peers in the fraternity world, and during the last biennium he has received some badly needed assistance to administer this fast growing organization. Tane Abbott is doing an outstanding job as Director of Chapter Services and Risk Management as is Terry Harper as Director of Publications. Tane and Terry both previously served the Fraternity as Educational Leadership Consultants. Three of the Educational Leadership Consultants now on staff are new this fall with the fourth, Dave Boersma, a holdover from the previous school year.

Brothers, I give you my sincere thanks for placing your confidence in me. Your officers will do their utmost to keep Phi Psi the predominant organization in the fraternity world.

You will see a feature article in this issue of THE SHIELD on the GAC, and I urge all of you to read it. Many weighty and important matters such as procedures to improve scholarship, were acted upon which should have a positive effect and benefit to Phi Psi in the years to come. In my view, it was certainly one of the best GACs of the fourteen I have attended.

In my remarks to the GAC on acceptance of office, I took the opportunity, and exercised what I believe to be a privilege of the office, and briefly outlined my goals for an organization with almost one hundred Chapters and Colonies. Other than to substantially add to our list of alumni associations and clubs and revitalize some of the associations which seem to be somewhat dormant, my goals most naturally are all oriented to the Chapters and Colonies. Alumni activities, however, are not all divorced from the Chapter. An active alumni group can be of great assistance to a Chapter by providing a pool for Chapter advisors and house corporation members, and less we forget the very vital role of recommending prospective members. An alumni group is essential in the area of a new Chapter or Colony if the new unit is to survive and grow.

First and foremost a Chapter or Colony must have quality men in sufficient numbers to properly and completely enjoy the Fraternity experience of Brotherhood, and to economically operate the living unit so that the financial obligations of an individual member are not prohibitively burdensome. In my opinion, adoption of "dry rush" by units not now following this procedure would greatly increase the quality of our members. Our experience with dry rush shows this to be true and beneficial to the Chapters in other ways as well.

In preparing for this message, I ran across language in Dave Hull's Message From the President in the Spring 1987 issue of THE SHIELD which although now a year and one-half old is still timely concerning most of the described problems.

"These university and fraternity representatives with whom I have been interacting are spending much of their time and energy discussing—even arguing—about who is responsible for and who will respond to the major problems facing the American college fraternity system (i.e., the rise in hazing practices, increased incidence of alcohol and drug abuse, and declining grade point averages)."

Happily, and thanks in large measure to our outstanding Director of Scholarship, John Buck, I can report that Phi Psi grade point averages are increasing rather than declining. I feel confident the other so called problems will be greatly reduced if not eliminated by leadership in the Chapters.

Great strides have been made to implement and educate the Chapter advisors, who in my opinion are the single most important cog in the smoothe operation of our Chapters. Show me a Chapter with the likes of a Harlan Selby at West Virginia or Ralph Haney at USC, both Brothers now in the Chapter Eternal, and I will show you a Chapter at the top of its campus in most every aspect of fraternity life. Under the able leadership of John Ciccarelli continuing as Coordinator of Chapter and Faculty Advisors, the trained advisor, together with the undergraduate who has had exposure to one or more Woodrow Wilson Leadership Schools, should provide that enlightened leadership at the Chapter level that results in a real brotherhood of gentlemen. I can't honestly say all this will happen in the next biennium, but with "Chic" at the helm anything is possible.

The fraternity experience, and especially the Phi Psi brand, is better than ever. All of us should be positive and upbeat concerning our fraternity affiliation. Fraternities supply a much needed part of college life, and for many of us an important part of life after undergraduate days. I am very proud to be a Phi Psi.

THE CRESCENT CITY

n August of this year, New Orleans, Louisiana was definitely the


place to be. Not only was the city abuzz with excitement for the impending Republican National Convention, but the "Big Easy" was also the site of Phi Kappa Psi's 64th Grand Arch Council. In fact, the GAC banners were still hanging in the International Ballroom of the Fairmont Hotel on Sunday morning as thousands of people poured into the Superdome hoping for a glimpse of the President and First Lady as they kicked off the Republican convention.

For the Fraternity, the real excitement had begun four days earlier on Wednesday, August 10 as Phi Psis from across the nation gathered to renew old friendships and make new ones at the "Welcome to New Orleans Reception." It set the tone for what was to be a very fun and productive time for all.

Following a hearty opening breakfast, the opening gavel rapped at 9:55 a.m. on Thursday morning to signal the official opening of the GAC business sessions. Throughout the

course of the convention more than 400 undergraduates, alumni and guests representing 86 Chapters, 4 Colonies and

31 Alumni Associations took part in the GAC activities.



impact on our lives. He said, "Each of our lives have people that are very important. And it's important at a time in our Fraternity, that we as people, recall the people who live in our lives. Most of you in this room are very young, and you think you're going to live forever. It isn't true. And one of the things I hope is that as you grow older, you begin to have a storehouse of memories of people who touched your life, who made a singular impact on your life, and who you recall with great fondness, "How good it was for me to know that person."

GAC ATTENDANCE

The 64th Grand Arch Council attracted 434 registered participants which is an increase of the attendance over the last several conventions. The 1986 convention in Scottsdale, Arizona drew 409 participants while the 1984 GAC at French Lick Springs, Indiana had 413 attendees. The Centennial GAC in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in 1952 stands as the record turnout year in recent memory with 471 Phi Psis and their guests enjoying that convention.

The following amendments were made to the By-Laws:

ARTICLE VI, Section 6, Clause 2;

Each officer shall be chosen semiannually, through majority vote, and not otherwise, at such times as may be prescribed in the Chapter By-Laws, except the P, the AG, and SG, who shall be elected annually, and except the GP, who shall be elected either annually or semi-annually. The P shall be elected at a meeting held subsequent to the first of January of each year to be determined by the By-Laws of each Chapter, and the AG and the SG shall be elected at the meeting before the last regular meeting of the Chapter of each collegiate year, or at such other time or times for election of officers as the Executive Board of the Fraternity shall approve. Provided, however, each elected officer of the Chapter, except in exceptional circumstances, meet personally the Fraternity's standard for grades required of Chapters, effective September, 1989.

• ARTICLE XIII, Section 5, Clause 4;
Any Chapter which fails to pay any charges due the Fraternity, including, but not limited to those fees described in ARTICLE XIII, Chapter Service fees, Conference fees, insurance premiums, or outstanding loans within 90 days after same should be payable, shall, as an additional penalty, lose the right to vote upon any matter concerning the Fraternity.

Through various committee reports, the following recommendations were made:

- That a task force be created to review the Fraternity's system of government, and that it report to the 1990 Grand Arch Council.
- That the participation of a Nominating Committee in the election process be continued.
- That a videotape library of prominent alumni be started.
- That the Headquarters remain vigilant and aggressive in use of current communications office equipment.

- That the new Development Council continue its work.
- That the Executive Council continue to be diligent in its pursuit of financial improvement.
- That the Fraternity Education workbooks be utilized fully, with the following recommendations:
- 1. That the Fraternity Educator should, at the end of the pledge period, send a report to the Director of Fraternity Education, and that the Director should send a reply to the Fraternity Educator.
- 2. The program should steer fraternity education programs toward the ethical values for which Phi Kappa Psi stands.
- 3. The use of the *Manual* should create uniformity among Chapter Fraternity Education programs.
- 4. That the entire Chapter, not just the Fraternity Educator, should play a role in educating each pledge.

That, if funds are available, a paid full time position for a director of alumni affairs be established to assist new alumni associations and clubs and help existing ones.

- That the statement of Position on Alcohol Use in Chapters be reaffirmed, and further, that a committee to research and investigate the use of alcohol in the fraternity system be formed. Due to the overwhelming concern of liability and use of alcohol on college campuses, the following was suggested:
- 1. To provide an alcohol awareness seminar at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School.
- 2. To propose the formation of a committee within each Chapter to regulate the use and distribution of alcohol.
- 3. To provide a handbook on the legalities of the distribution and consumption of alcohol.
- 4. That open parties with unrestricted access or structured solely around the sale of alcoholic beverages shall be prohibited
- 5. That non-alcoholic rush shall be promoted on all campuses.
- That we develop a strong financial structure within each Chapter pertaining to the payment of dues, taxes, insurance and budgeting. Due to the

complexities and time consumption of an efficient financial system, the following strategies should be reviewed:

- 1. That we create a separate position that advises Chapters on financial matters, such as director of financial planning.
- 2. That we create a committee to review and update the Treasurer's Handbook
- 3. That we provide financial planning materials that the Treasurer can use to plan Chapter finances.
- 4. That a Chapter provide to its members a summary describing the financial responsibility of each member.
- That we achieve and maintain a pledge retention rate of 90% and offer the following strategies:
- 1. That a pamphlet be distributed during rush describing the qualities of the national Fraternity as well as the individual Chapter.
- 2. That a thorough investigation be conducted by the Chapter at each incident of depledging.
- That we work toward the improvement of Chapter housing on campuses on which Phi Psi is not competitive.
- That we pursue geographic diversity in expansion.
- That future expansions in institutions with rapidly growing Greek systems should be made a high priority.
- That Alumni Associations and Clubs should be reminded of their responsibility to assist Colonies and growing Chapters in the Fraternity.

Statement of Position on



Alcohol Use in Chapters

(adopted at the 1984 Grand Arch Council and reaffirmed at the 1988 Grand Arch Council)

Whereas, Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity and its member chapters are concerned about the increasing consumption and abuse of alcoholic beverages on college campuses, and

Whereas, the dangers of misuse of alcohol to individuals, to groups, to the fraternity system, and to the campus communities are becoming increasingly evident, and

Whereas, a similar resolution has been unanimously passed by the National Interfraternity Conference House of Delegates, and

Whereas, an affirmative program to deal with the problems will only be effective by common consent and unified action, now.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the following policies be adopted and incorporated as the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity Policy:

- 1. That the possession, use, sale, and/or consumption of alcoholic beverages on the premises of any Chapter or at any entertainment or function of any Chapter shall be in compliance with all applicable laws.
- 2. That moderation be encouraged during lawful consumption, and that Chapters develop and support programs in those groups and organizations seeking to educate Chapter members on alcohol awareness.
- 3. That open parties, meaning those with unrestricted access or structured solely around the sale of alcoholic beverages, shall be prohibited.
 - 4. That non-alcoholic rush shall be promoted on all campuses.

Robert Meserve, Stanford '34, takes the reigns of the Fraternity as Phi Psi's 51st president for the 1988-90 biennium after serving as vice president the past two years. Bob comes from a family rich with Phi Psi heritage. His grandfather, father, brother, and son are all members of the Fraternity. His father, Shirley, UC Berkeley '08, was Phi Psi's president from 1924-26.

As president of the Fraternity, Bob's goal "is to create a desire in the undergraduate Brothers to live and share together a college experience where education is of primary importance and life in the Fraternity is free of substance abuse. Brotherhood should be more important than social standing. Phi Psi should be synonymous with gentlemen."

In addition, he views rush as "the most important activity of a Chapter. It secures numbers necessary to efficiently operate and maintain the high quality of Phi Kappa Psi."

As an undergraduate, Bob served his Chapter as vice president, corresponding secretary and chairman of the governing committee. As an alumnus, he has served the Fraternity as Director of Extension from 1954-64 and Attorney General from 1964-66. He returned to the Executive Council in 1986 when he was elected Vice President at the Grand Arch Council in Scottsdale, Arizona.

He earned his undergraduate degree at UC Berkeley and then his Juris Doctor at Hastings School of Law at the University of California. He was admitted to the State Bar of California in January of 1942. His law career has been spent with the law firm of Meserve, Mumper and Hughes, where he is a senior partner. The firm was founded by his grandfather, father and another Phi Psi, the late Hewlings Mumper, Dickinson '07.

In the forties, Bob served his country in the U.S. Army. He was on active duty from 1942-46 and then served in the reserves as a Judge Advocate until he retired from the service as a Lieutenant Colonel.

He also has a community service record worthy of note. His many activities include serving as vice chairman of the Board of Trustees of UC Irvine's College of Medicine; Treasurer of the Santa Ana Advisory Board of the Salvation Army; Trustee of the Multiple Sclerosis Society of Orange County; and director of the Newport Beach Nautical Museum.

Bob and his wife, Dottie, Alpha Chi Omega, have three children, Edwin, USC '67 (Oregon Alpha '66); Penny; and Pamela. The couple resides in Newport Beach, California.

Paul J. LaPuzza, Creighton '66, becomes Phi Psi's Vice President after serving on the Executive Board during the last biennium as the Fraternity's Treasurer. He has also served the Executive Council in the appointed role of Attorney General and Deputy Attorney General. In addition, Paul is a charter member and past president of the Omaha Alumni Association.

In his college days, Paul chaired Nebraska Beta's scholarship and fund raising committees. On campus, he was the president of the debate team and a member of Delta Sigma Rho and Tau Kappa Alpha honoraries. As an ROTC distinguished military student he was a drill team commander.

At Creighton's Law School, Paul was on the Dean's List and was a member of the National Moot Court Team. He currently helps out Nebraska Beta as "one of a group of untitled alumni advisors."



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Phi Psi Honors Dual Recipients of Distinguished Alumnus Award

uddick Carpenter Lawrence, Washington '31, was initiated into the Fraternity at the University of Washington on February 1, 1931—an initiation which was witnessed by his father, an 1893 initiate of Wisconsin Gamma.

Brother Lawrence started his business career as director of publicity for the Detroit Institute of Arts and as assistant director of the World Adventure Series, civic lecture course. Later, he was appointed western manager of the American Boy magazine based in Chicago.

He joined Time Inc. in 1939 and became Philadelphia and southern manager for Fortune magazine. During World War II, Lawrence served as a lieutenant in the Navy. Following the war, he returned to Time Inc. as New York man-

ager for Fortune and was named associate advertising manager in 1949.

In 1950, Lawrence joined the National Broadcasting Company as director of sales development for the television network. With the integration of NBC's radio and television networks, he became director of promotion, planning and development for both networks.

In 1953, Brother Lawrence accepted the position of vice president of the New York Stock Exchange, where he was responsible for public relations and investor services. He directed the Exchange's programs for broadening share ownership and institutional investing, as well as its education and market development activities.

Lawrence was hired by the Continental Oil Company (Conoco) in 1968 as vice president of public relations and public affairs, and was promoted to vice president of corporate activities in 1974. He retired from the Company on February 1, 1977.

On February 1, 1977, he created Lawrence & Associates, a New York-based company which provides consultation and management services for public affairs, film distribution and trade relations in the United States and Middle East.

Brother Lawrence serves on the board of managers of the New York Botanical Garden, and is honorary president and director of the New York Board of Trade. He is a director of the International Film Foundation; governor of the Invest-in-America National Council Inc.; and director of the New York State Festival.

Lawrence is honorary president of the U.S.-Arab Chamber of Commerce. A trustee of Sarah Lawrence College for 12 years, he was chairman of the college board from 1964 to 1969. He also served six years on the Bronxville, N.Y., School Board.

In 1973, Lawrence was presented the Star of Jordan by King Hussein for his service to the Arab people. In 1974, the government of Lebanon conferred on

him the Cedars of Lebanon.

A native of Michigan, he was raised in the state of Washington and worked as a cub reporter for the Aberdeen Daily World. At the University of Washington he was editor of the student newspaper and president of the honorary journalism society, Sigma Delta Chi. Brother Lawrence served Washington Alpha as corresponding secretary and president, and represented his Chapter at the 1934 GAC at Mackinac Island. His future was clearly predicated in a 1933 Chapter report to THE SHIELD when he was described as "Phi Psi's A-1 publicity man."

Lawrence has served as a trustee of the Endowment Fund of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity since 1960 and today is the educational foundation's chairman. Under his leadership, the Endowment Fund has increased the scope and range of its programs, and has become increasingly supportive of the educational programs of the general Fraternity.

Dr. John Wieland "Jack" Oswald, DePauw '35, was initiated into the Fraternity on March 10, 1935 at DePauw University by the Indiana Alpha Chapter. Among the alumni attending his initiation was C.F. "Dab" Williams, the Fraternity's first executive director.

Born in Minneapolis, Oswald graduated from DePauw in 1938 with a degree in botany and a minor in history. He was a true scholar-athlete, earning membership in Phi Beta Kappa and being selected captain of the football team. He also earned varsity letters in basketball and track.

Brother Oswald enrolled at The University of California-Davis as a graduate student in plant pathology in 1938, and four years later earned his doctorate after completing research and study on the Davis and Berkeley campuses. While a graduate student, he began a research career that led to the publication of more than 70 scientific papers.

After graduate school, Oswald served from 1942-46 in the United States Navy. He was involved in more than 50 combat missions as PT boat captain and divisional commander in the Mediterranean, which helped him earn the U.S. Navy Commendation Medal and Great Britain's Distinguished Service Cross.

After military service, he returned to the California-Davis campus as an assistant professor and researcher of plant pathology. His research resulted in the discovery of a new disease of cereals called Barley Yellow Dwarf, since recognized as one of the principal cereal diseases in the world.

From 1953-54, Dr. Oswald served as a Fulbright Research grantee at the Agri-

cultural University of the Netherlands. Upon his return, he transferred to the Berkeley campus to become chairman of the department of plant pathology. He was promoted to professor in 1957, when he also accepted the position of administrative assistant to the chancellor of the Berkeley campus.

In 1958, Brother Oswald was promoted to the office of the president of the statewide university system, where he served successively as academic assistant to the president, assistant vice president, vice president and executive assistant, and vice president for administration.

In 1963, Oswald was selected to be the president of the University of Kentucky. In his five years there, he moved the university into new areas, strengthened its faculty and supervised the largest development program in that University's history.

In 1968, he resigned from the University of Kentucky to accept the position of Executive Vice President of the University of California nine-campus system. On July 1, 1970, Brother Oswald

became president of The Pennsylvania State University, which later honored him for his many contributions by renaming the 12-story liberal arts building in his honor. The University of Kentucky had previously named its Lexington technical institute building in his honor.

On July 1, 1983, Oswald became president emeritus of The Pennsylvania State University after serving 13 years as its 13th president.

Over the years he has lent his leadership abilities to a number of organizations, including the Alta Bates Community Hospital in Berkeley, Children's Hospital of Oakland and the National Science Foundation. He has served as a director and chairman of the American Council on Education, president of the Association of American Universities and president of the Pennsylvania Association of Colleges and Universities.

Presently, Brother Oswald is serving as a director of Chestnut Hill College (Continued on page 60)

EDWIN C. REICHERT, Wisconsin '29, Lake Forest, Ill., July, 1988. He was a professor emeritus and former chairman of the education department at Lake Forest College. An authority on educational administration and educational psychology, he was a widely known speaker and the author of 16 children's books. He came to the college in 1946 as head of the education department and director of its evening session. Under his leadership, Lake Forest became the first liberal arts college in Illinois to offer a program of preparatory courses for secondary and elementary school teachers.

RALPH. V. CECIL, Indiana '30, Muncie, Ind., September 7, 1988. He was a senior partner in the law firm of Benadum, Cecil, Painter, Drumm and Schafer. He was a member of the Muncie Bar Association and the Indiana State Bar Association. He was a former member of the American Bar Association and the American Trial Lawyers Association. He was also a life member of Elks Lodge 245 and a member of Moose Lodge 33.

HON. ROBERT BARTLETT LEE, De-Pauw '32, Denver, Colo., June 16, 1988. Following his graduation from DePauw he attended the University of Michigan Law School for a year then continued his legal education at Notre Dame, receiving his J.D. in 1939. His legal career was spent in Denver where he practiced his profession successfully for many years before becoming a judge in the Colorado state system. Thereafter, he rose rapidly in the judiciary ranks, becoming finally a justice in the Colorado Supreme Court. At DePauw, he excelled in athletics, being center on the varsity basketball team, as well as a high jumper and hurdler on the track squad, holding many school records. He was honored by the university on his golden anniversary year as an outstanding alumnus-and a year later entered the DePauw Athletic Hall of Fame.

MARK SALISBURY GIBSON. Missouri '32. Columbia, Mo., August 4, 1988. He was in the Army from 1941 to 1945 and retired as a lieutenant colonel. He was a manufacturer of airplane parts in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., where he owned his own plant from 1945 to 1961. He was an instructor of mechanical technology at Jefferson College in Hillsboro until his retirement in 1973. At one time, he earned Teacher of the Year honors. He was a member of the National Rifle Association and the Missouri Tractor and Engine Club. He was a volunteer at Truman Hospital and a van driver for the University of Missouri. He also worked on antique clocks and was an amateur printer who owned an antique press. He was an honorary member of Columbia Rotary and was president of Fort Lauderdale Rotary in 1947.

RICHARD R. SENS, Case Western Reserve '33, Scottsdale, Ariz., July 1, 1988. He was a former quality assurance manager for the Aluminum Company of America. He had been employed by the company for 40 years before retiring in 1977. He was a member of the Aluminum Association where he was involved in specifications for aerospace technology. He also belonged to the American Society for Testing Materials. He was a member of Fountain Hills Golf Club and a choir member of St. Maria Goretti Catholic Church.

LT. COL. RUSKIN McARDLE BLAND, West Virginia '34, Virginia Beach, Va., May 10, 1988. Prior to joining the military he was employed as a clerk in the Library of the U.S. Senate and he also worked for the Senate Appropriations Committee. He entered the Army in 1941 and later was in the Military Transport Command of the Army Air Corps, which subsequently became part of the new U.S. Air Force. During World War II, he served in the Inspector General Group of the same and was stationed at several bases in the U.S., Bermuda, Greenland, and the European Theater of War and Vietnam. He concluded his service as a member of the base command at Wright Patterson Field in Dayton, Ohio. Following his retirement, he settled in Bethesda, Md., and went to work for the Maryland Employment Service as manager of the Montgomery County office. He was an active member of the Maryland Retired Officers Association and a past president of the Bethesda Lions Club. He is survived by a brother, George Linn Bland Jr., West Virginia '35, and a first cousin, Robert Linn Bland Jr., West Viginia '24, grandson of Phi Kappa Psi Founder Charles Page Thomas Moore.


Allegheny Back to School



Change. Some view this as a dirty word. Others believe it must take place in order to survive. I've been a consultant for well over a year and when I tell myself I've seen it all, someone or something comes along and makes me eat my words.

Students who have always been able to rely on the administration must now fend for themselves. The groups on the Franklin and Marshall campus have taken a "business as usual" approach to the situation, but it's plain to see that this Greek system must adapt to a new environment.

Since we can't change the past, let's take a look at the future. Educators have higher expectations these days and Chapters can no longer plead being blind to a changing society. As several Chapter histories can attest, they were not willing to make change and were consequently left by the wayside or ceased to exist

Finally, what will happen to fraternities in the 21st century? Some say we'll become like sororities in our alcohol policies; we just won't be able to cope with the liability and the destruction anymore. For a clearer definition, take a look at some of the sorority chapter houses on your campus and compare them to the fraternities. Maybe fraternities will continue to evolve and deemphasize the social aspects, reverting back to truly secret associations. I'm not going to venture any more guesses, but I will say if I have a son, I want him to be able to have the same fraternal experiences I did.

Sorry to mislead everyone with the title, but would you really want to listen to me drone on about this interesting, yet not your average cocktail party conversation?

A gypsy's life brings stories of interesting and exotic places. I am a gypsy and I love it! I have visited small liberal arts schools and large state schools and everything in between. There is a consistency in Phi Psi Chapters. Our undergraduate members are intelligent, sharp and challenging. During four-day visits we discuss many issues and one always is the topic of discussion: Hazing.

Hazing is often misdefined as just members hazing pledges. Hazing can be: members hazing other members, pledges hazing members and pledges hazing pledges. Twenty-three states have antihazing laws and others are expected to follow suit. Hazing is no longer socially acceptable. The Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity has never rationalized hazing. To overcome this continuing problem we must understand how hazing originated, why it is wrong and how we can remove it from our Chapters.

The roots of hazing are in military life. Soldiers that came back from our nation's wars were older and more mature than the average freshman and military-educated. It was natural to incorporate a pledge period that would prove a pledge was worthy, similar to boot camp. The main goal of the pledge class was (and still is) initiation into the fraternity. To achieve that goal they were forced to respect the members of the fraternity while being responsible for most of the work.

The major problem with this is the military trains followers, while fraternity education creates leaders. Soliders are

trained to obey orders without questioning the chain of command. The Fraternitv educates students to think, question, and lead. The goal of boot camp, much like a hazing pledgeship, is initiation. The goal of pledge education is assimilation. New initiates that have been through a hazing pledgeship often feel that, "I'm done, now it is the new pledges turn to work hard. It is time to kick back and enjoy." Assimilation into the Chapter is far more effective. Pledges serving on committees, hearing motivational guest speakers, and being involved in Chapter discussions are some examples of ways to excite and motivate a new initiate to be a contributing member right after his pledge period ends and brotherhood begins. Do you think intelligent pledges become disenchanted with the fraternity when the Brothers do not even pick up after themselves.

Removing hazing from our Chapters has not been easy, but we must remain vigilant in doing so. Fraternities are facing an anti-intellectualism accusation from educators and the substantiation of their argument is hazing. Our fraternity is the ideal, ancillary college educational experience. We learn to lead, live with, care for and support our peers who become our lifelong friends. Hazing has no place in this rewarding experience. history, referred to his Chapter's blatant lack of good taste and judgement as "a tradition."

Webster's Ninth New Collegiate Dictionary, a very dear friend, says that a tradition is "an inherited, established, or customary pattern of thought, action, or behavior . . . " Well, in this light it would seem that "tradition" could be properly used by our guilty fraternity man to describe the heinous activity the pledges pursued the night before, or the ridiculously dangerous open parties which are designed primarily to bathe the student body and the Chapter house in fraternitypurchased beer. In either case, "tradition" is certainly one word, among many, which could be chosen for use. But it is not the best word, and that is the whole point of diction.

Instead, our guilty fraternity man should have chosen the word "habit," since the activities described have effects much like cigarette smoking or picking one's nose in public-they are

inherently destructive to either one's life or one's image and sometimes both. Webster's says that a "habit" is "an acquired mode of behavior that has become nearly or completely involuntary." The key to understanding why "habit" is more appropriate than "tradition" centers around the word, "involuntary." It seems to me (and this is quite an assumption) that the only way intelligent, self-respecting fraternity men could perpetuate ridiculous and dangerous activity is involuntarily, without thinking. And this is habit, not tradition, cloaked in the positive connotations of a word intended for far better uses. Believe me, the MATSAWTTEF is just waiting to happen. Bad habits, disguised as tradition, will only hasten the good intentions of mothers to protect their offspring. Use proper diction; it's the first step in changing behavior and improving our image in the minds of those wonderful people who are nurturing next year's pledge class.


LARRY W. JOHNSON

He served Oregon Alpha as chaplain, scholarship chairman and philanthropy chairman.



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





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Message From The President



Dear Brothers.

Let me take just a few moments of your time to discuss a certain word which I believe is very important to Phi Psi. The word is "gentleman." Webster's 3rd New International Dictionary, 1981, in part defines a gentleman as "a man of quality."

I don't believe I am divulging a Fraternity secret if I remind you that our Ritual provides that a candidate for membership of Phi Kappa Psi must prove himself to be a "gentleman," and the successful candidate takes an oath to at all times conduct himself as a gentleman.

From various sources and publications it has come to my attention that the following conduct has alleged to have been observed in the fraternity world:

Pledges have been encouraged to quickly drink glassfuls of hard alcoholic beverages, sometimes in the presence of members, some of whom may be officers of the chapter. In a few of these cases the pledge has died of alcohol poisoning. In many of these cases, the conduct could also be in violation of state laws pertaining to alcohol use by parties under twenty-one years of age; and

Abuses of other drugs, but my information is that alcohol abuse is a far greater problem for the fraternity system; and

Hazing pledges in various forms. At many campuses, the administration declares pledges drinking in the presence of members is hazing per se. However, the most common form involves the physical and mental mistreatment of pledges which comes to light from a mistreated pledge or his family. Hazing is now unlawful conduct in most states; and

Generally, also involving alcohol abuse, reports of "date rape" have come to the attention of fraternity administrators as conduct occurring in their chapters; and

It has been reported that some fraternity chapters are collecting various fees or accounts, such as a pledge or initiation fee, and instead of forwarding the sum on to the national office, the officers of the chapter are diverting the amount to the social account for the purchase of beer or other requirements for a chapter party.

The conduct described above is certainly not gentlemanly conduct—far from it. Accordingly, it is refreshing to know such conduct could not take place in a Phi Kappa Psi Chapter since all of us have taken the vow to live and act as gentlemen. As always, I am proud to be a Phi Psi.

Maryland Boasts Its Second Chapter

Prelude

niversity of Maryland, Baltimore County-1986. Not more than 20 years old, yet she lay host to three fraternal colonies and four sororities. Nine men: All equally dissatisfied with their options, chose to solicit a national fraternity to back them in their crusade to build a better fraternity. Phi Kappa Psi: The most impressive to respond, offering leadership, scholarship and organizational skills required in today's business world. With those ideals in mind, the original nine set course toward the ultimate goal of entering the ranks of national brotherhood.

UMBC

fter twelve years of planning, UMBC was founded in 1966 and is the youngest campus of the University of Maryland system. The 472 acre campus is ideally located on a hillside overlooking the distant skyscrapers of downtown Baltimore and lies just 30 miles north of the nation's capital. Ninety-seven percent of UMBC's 300 member faculty hold Ph.D's or terminal degrees from the nation's venerable institutions. Over 30% of all UMBC students go on to graduate or professional schools. Others go into business and industry or into service to the community. The University, at age twenty-two, now boasts a student body

of 10,000. Her basketball team has forged its way from the unknown, to a seat in Division I intercollegiate athletics. Her Greek system has evolved from null to nine Chapters strong.

The Greek System

rowing" is probably the best way to describe UMBC's Greek system. Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Alpha Tau Omega, Lambda Chi Alpha and Phi Kappa Psi have all matured as chapters within the same basic time frame. UMBC additionally hosts three national sororities; Phi Sigma Sigma, Phi Mu, and Delta Phi Epsilon, as well as two local sororities; Delta Alpha Delta and Alpha Delta Lambda. The nine organizations represented here work very well together to get programs planned and activities attended. For instance, our newly formed Presidents Council (consisting of all Greek Presidents) meets bimonthly to coordinate the activities of each organization and to maintain smooth relations among them. The Presidents Council is additionally responsible for hosting UMBC's annual Greek Week. Our Greek system is still in it's infancy; that is to say, nearly through it's first decade of existence, and there is plenty of room for the establishment of new policies and traditions. Recently, our IFC has been attempting to institute formal rush as a unified effort among UMBC Greeks to attract new members. Maryland Beta Chapter stands ready and willing to contribute to the enrichment of a unified Greek community.


Maryland Beta Colony

he Colony was founded in the fall of 1986 by nine men. These nine shared views, opinions and outlooks unmatched by members of other fraternal organizations of the time. With the desire to look back, someday, and see a full grown fraternity formed of their own efforts, the interest group of friends entered into brotherhood together.

It wasn't long before friends told friends of a fantastic new organization at UMBC; begin with Alpha pledge class. Two men joined nine for the duration of fall 1986. Educational Leadership Consultants frequented the maturing Colony to help guide the founders in their efforts to mold a lasting entity. Emphasis was on inner group strength. Alpha merged into the group, to learn and grow, as well as to teach the now interested group of gentlemen who would soon be known as Beta class.

With the spring of 1986 came the Beta class. To the surprise of the eleven-man Colony came their first real pledge class. Trials from the Alphas turned to guidance as the Colony stood to nearly double its current membership. Beta Class was to be the class of leaders who would later take the Colony through it's final stages of probation and into Chapterhood. With a class this large, in comparison to the existing Brotherhood, Betas challenged the Colony to teach them the methodology of Phi Kappa Psi. The Beta class quickly learned the loose and growing structure of this Phi Psi Colony. A short time later, initiate six new members and look towards fall's Gamma Class.

New ideas and interests from the freshly initiated Beta class offered Gamma a unique opportunity to join the most diverse and well rounded group on campus, and yet still have their opinions heard equally as any other. ELCs proved vital in refining Maryland Beta's policies on pledging and activity programming. Gammas reaped the benefit of an almost fully developed Fraternity Education Program, as well as having entered at one of the Colony's social highs. Popu-

larity and recognition on campus were steadily on the rise. Other Greek organizations stepped back to watch the "new guy on the block." Initiate five Gammas, file for charter requirements with Headquarters, and glide into the spring's Delta Class.

Delta class. Almost two years since the seed of an idea was planted by nine men in a pub. This class was to be the last before Maryland Beta's petition for charter was filed. The deadline was set by the administration elected for the current 87-88 year. Formal programs began to evolve. Planning and forecasting took precedence over spontaneous "Whaddo ya say we have a party" attitude of the not-so-distant past. The Colony began to run like a well-oiled machine by implementing Robert's Rules at meetings, by planning a rough calendar of events a month in advance, and by respecting the authority of elected officials. It looked like a fraternity instead of a vaudeville act. Delta absorbed unbelievable amounts of information from The Manual and quickly became the most knowledgable group in the Fraternity. Initiate twelve new Phi Psis and begin final summer preparations for petition submission.

Rumors were passed that the Executive Council had accepted the petition

and had tentatively set December 10th as the day. Two weeks later at the first meeting of the new school year, shocked and overjoyed, Maryland Beta's presiding president formally announced that as of December 10th, the nation would recognize Phi Kappa Psi's Maryland Beta Chapter. Preparations began to accommodate incoming national officers and guests. Groups of Brothers spent countless hours quizzing each other on material expected to be on the colony exam. Final arrangements for a church, a ballroom, invitations, transportation, notification and education were made. The Colony was finally ready to fly. Marvland Beta passed the exam and proceeded to the most grandiose celebration any former Colony member had seen. We did it!



One, Two, Three point 0.

received a letter recently from one of our Brothers asking help in getting his Chapter to recognize the importance of scholarship, and to provide guidelines on how to achieve it. He indicated that his Chapter was a fun loving group dedicated to having a good time. Well, here are some of the ideas I shared with him that I would like to suggest to all Chapters.

First—Everyone is interested in getting good grades, if only to get mom and dad off their backs. Though they may not admit it, many Brothers do want to excel. Of course, if it were possible to do so without effort that would be the best of all worlds. The suggestions I will make may take a bit of effort but, for the most part, should be painless.

Second—We are all capable of improving our performance. It does not always require great effort to do so.

Third—What everyone really wants is a simple 1—2—3 way of achieving academic success. We need to realize that there is no magic formula, but there are ways of improving performance which are easy to implement.

Well, here we go!

A few good rules for academic improvement. Tried and true. Proven! So give them a shot no matter how simple they seem, and see what happens.

1. Sit in the front third of the class. This does many things. It puts you in front of two thirds of the class and therefore cuts down on distractions. It also places you where the professor can see and get to know your face, and per-

haps your name.

- 2. Be neat. Neatness does count. Use a word processor. Erase errors, do not strike out.
- 3. When you study, copy important facts into a notebook. This condenses them for review and reenforces them in your mind as you copy the words. Just underlining or highlighting offers no reenforcement.
- 4. Talk to your Professor. Help him get to know you. Show him your interest in the subject, no matter how slight. Remember, it is very hard to flunk a friend.
- 5. Good writing usually puts key items at the beginning or end of a paragraph. We are taught to start each paragraph with the salient thought and then expand on it. Or conversely, to present ideas and finally form a conclusion. It stands to reason then that if we concentrate our attention on the first and last sentence of each paragraph we should, ninety percent of the time, get the key data from the material
- 6. Don't try to learn it all at once. You could not memorize the Ritual or The Manual in one sitting, what makes you think you can master calculus that way? Do it in small does. Perhaps three times a day instead of once. Take a moment in the morning to do a couple of review questions and then go on to something else. Hit it again in the afternoon with a few more, and finally just before you turn in with another short burst. This way it all seems fresh and never becomes dull. Recent research seems to indicate that morning study is good for short term memory while late afternoon or early evening study is better for long

term memory. Of course, we all have our own day-frame, but those general rules are currently thought to be true.

- 7. Don't be afraid to ask for help. Many schools have graduate assistants to give aid. These people can be invaluable to you. Get to know them. Most professors are pleased if you ask them for aid. They are often anxious to know where their lectures need a bit more beef to help students understand. Unless someone shows them where the lecture was weak they will give the same talk again, often with the same results. Naturally you are not going to walk in and say, "Doc, you did a bad job on today's lecture so straighten me out on these points." But a nice request for aid will easily show the professor where he needs to put a bit more emphasis. Their gratitude may have tangible results beyond your learning the material.
- 8. Find something interesting in each course you take. I found geometry and trig both difficult and dull until I realized that the principles they expressed were used by the ancient Egyptians and Chinese in constructing the pyramids and the Great Wall. Suddenly they took on new meaning. There were useful things to learn here. They even got to be fun. Try to find fun in all your classes. You may have to search a bit but there is truly something interesting in any class you take.

Well there it is. The simple magic formula. Put it in use and look for success. There are more things you can do but start with these. They will get you going. We will put polish on the system in future articles. On your mark . . . get set . . . go!



RHODE ISLAND BETA CHARTER SUSPENDED

Rhode Island Beta was installed as Phi Kappa Psi's 91st Chapter at the University of Rhode Island at Kingston on January 8, 1966. Throughout most of its 22-year history, the Chapter enjoyed a prosperous existence. However, it came to light in the fall of 1988 that the Chapter's Fraternity Education practices, which included deprivation of sleep, mental and physical distress and personal servitude, were completely incongruent with Fraternity law and tradition. The Chapter was suspended from activity by the University for a period of six months, but the Executive Council felt the Chapter could not represent the high ideals of the Fraternity with its current membership and, thus, the Chapter charter was suspended on December 12, 1988. Rhode Island Beta initiated 601 members during its existence.

ALUMNI VOLUNTEERS: A PRECIOUS RESOURCE

Ask anyone associated with an organization such as the Rotary, Kiwanis, P.T.A., American Red Cross, Scouting, Chamber of Commerce, Little League, etc., what is the most important element affecting the success of their respective association and the answer will always be the same . . . Volunteers.

Without volunteers there would be little or no progress and without progress, there would cease at some point to be a viable and growing organization.

In the 137-year history of our beloved Fraternity, Phi Kappa Psi has been enriched immeasurably by the volunteerism exemplified by her undergraduate and alumni members. Each Chapter within our Fraternity can trace its founding and its continual well-being to the volunteer spirit of its respective members.

Since we spend the longest period of our lives as an alumnus member of our proud Fraternity, nowhere is there a greater opportunity to support Phi Kappa Psi than in the years that follow our graduation from college. This is especially true in the area of volunteer advisorship and participation. If we examine the record of Chapters which have enjoyed success over a period of years, almost always without exception we will witness strong alumni advisorship and involvement somewhere in the background.

Without volunteers there would be little or no progress

This is becoming increasingly important in view of many new challenges that now face the modern day Fraternity Chapter. These issues include alcohol and other substance abuse by members, legal liabilities, affordable insurance coverage, hazing, housing costs, aging student populations, etc.

In an effort to meet these challenges now and help prepare our Fraternity's entry into the next century, the Executive Council of Phi Kappa Psi is developing a strong local network of alumni volunteers whose assistance is designed to be an important resource for all Chapters and Colonies.

Listed here within this article is a brief summary description of various alumni volunteer positions:

Chapter Advisor

A Chapter Advisor should be an alumnus who fosters Fraternity ideals and positive attitudes. He should be able to offer adult perspectives on Chapter issues. The Chapter should be able to draw on his experience to understand the consequences of their decisions. If the Chapter is experiencing difficulties in its operation, the advisor offers suggestions to help facilitate a proper response. The basic criteria for serving as a Chapter Advisor requires that the interested brother be a college graduate, out of school at least 5 years, and living within 50 miles of the Chapter. His basic term of advisorship is two years from the date of appointment by the Executive Council and he is eligible for appointive officer coverage within the National Insurance Program. In addition, in an effort to encourage alumni support and participation many Chapters are now utilizing additional advisors who specialize in particular areas like finance, housing, membership, recruitment, fund raising, etc. By working together, this "team" of alumni volunteers is under the direction of the Chapter Advisor and can provide additional assistance in various aspects of Chapter operation.

Faculty Advisor

The purpose of the Faculty Advisor is to promote scholastic and cultural endeavors within the undergraduate Chapter. He is a member of the faculty, administration, or staff of the host institution. It is preferable that he be an alumnus of Phi Kappa Psi, however, this is not required. It is important that he not serve in the same capacity for another fraternity chapter. The Faculty Advisor works with the Chapter Scholarship Chairman and helps create and maintain an acceptable program of scholastic excellence, award incentives, etc. He can assist in helping members in career decisions, making known campus agencies helpful in this area. Most importantly, he represents the Chapter's best interests in matters dealing with the college or university and cooperates with the institution's Greek Affairs Office, advisor to fraternities, etc., if such exists. He cooperates on all fraternity matters with the Chapter Advisor and House Corporation. If geographical location or time on other commitments change necessitate resignation as an advisor, he can assist the Chapter in locating and educating a replacement.

House Corporation

The role of the Chapter House Corporation is one of great importance. This incorporated alumni board serves as a legal entity whose primary responsibility is to provide and maintain safe, quality,

competitive housing for the undergraduate membership. The House Corporation holds title to property and assets: serves as landlord and can negotiate rental agreements on behalf of the Chapter. In addition, the House Corporation Board may also spearhead fund raising projects to repair, remodel and make new additions to Chapter house property. In this era of large insurance claims, the House Corporation also works in conjunction with the national insurance program prescribed by the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity to insure complete liability and property coverage protection of undergraduate members and designated

alumni volunteer positions. Depending on the local situation, the meetings of the House Corporation board are scheduled on an annual, quarterly or monthly basis. Responsibilities are divided among various board members whose term of office can average one to four years. Alumni Associations

The benefit of lifetime membership in Phi Kappa Psi is best described by the active role in our Alumni Associations. Listed in the directory section of *The Shield*, these Alumni Associations are located in any town, city or locality in the United States upon the written appli-

cation of at least fifteen resident alumni whose charter is approved by the Executive Council. Each Alumni Association has the right, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Constitution of the Fraternity to represent and vote, equally with Chapters at District Councils and Grand Arch Councils. An Alumni Association can also be very instrumental in organizing activities, i.e., Founders Day celebrations, golf tournaments, alumni picnics, homecoming weekends, etc. An Alumni Association can also serve as a resource for alumni rush recommendations, legacies and career placement. In addition, an alumni association can help provide assistance for an adjacent Chapter experiencing difficulties or be a catalyst for a colonization effort at a nearby college or university.

The Alumni Association officers include the president, vice president, treasurer and secretary, as well as other volunteer alumni Brothers who may serve as event chairmen.

Volunteer Information

Your valued participation as an alumni volunteer will play an important role in the future of our Fraternity. There are almost 50,000 living alumni members of Phi Kappa Psi that live and work in close proximity to our Chapters, Colonies and Alumni Associations.

By so doing, you will enjoy the sense of accomplishment and feeling of good will that characterizes the many alumni volunteers who serve this strong Brotherhood.

GET RID OF "RUSH" TO INCREASE YOUR MEMBERSHIP!

everal of our Phi Psi Chapters have achieved dramatic membership increases by getting rid of rush. Impossible you say! How can a Chapter obtain more members by abolishing rush? By throwing "rush" out the window and changing an approach where members make friends instead of selling rushees.

Every single member ought to have some role in recruitment.

"Rush" sometimes makes people act and talk in ways unnatural to them. Some members, especially younger ones going through rush for the first time on the inside, think they have to speak certain "lines," talk "good BS" and act in a certain cool manner to be successful. This creates an often false picture of what the Brothers are really like, and may cause the prospect himself to act differently than he would otherwise. Both parties get an incorrect picture of what the other is like. This short circuits the way membership selection ought to work, which should be matching college men with a group they feel comfortable with. When a freshman finds out that some active members are different than what they saw in rush situations, he may depledge.

Friend-making on the other hand, means both members and prospects act simply as themselves. Each side will then receive a true picture of what the other is like. Better, longer-lasting matchups are made. Depledging is reduced. Chapters that have second semester freshman pledging find this approach especially successful, because no one has to keep up a rush front for an entire semester!

Friend-making is actually easier, too, than having to worry about rush lines and the proper way to act. That is how Founders Letterman and Moore operated. They rounded up friends from among their classmates at Jefferson College and turned those friends into Phi Psi Brothers. You should do the same. Plan your membership recruitment program along a strategy of members making as many friends among the eligible, non-affiliated men on campus, and then make the best of those friends into pledges and then Brothers.

How exactly does a Chapter accom-

plish this? Emphasize one-on-one and two-on-two situations, not groups-ongroups. Large parties are the least productive setting for really getting to know someone. They should be seen for what they are, entertainment for the members and guests, many of whom you will not see again. Instead, based on your school's schedule and rules, meet prospects anywhere and everywhere you can find them, over the summer, in classes, in campus organizations, in residence halls. Meet and get to know as individuals as many prospects as you possibly can, given the time frame within which you have to work. Ideal rush or recruiting is when you meet and become acquainted with every single prospect. Strive to get as close to this ideal as you can.

Now, I am *not* saying do not market the Chapter. Certainly every member should know the facts and best selling points regarding your own Chapter and about fraternity membership in general. What I am saying is, when you make friends, you act naturally, you are yourself, you are not putting out lines you ordinarily would not say. Rushing, on the other hand, frequently leads men to put on an act that presents a false picture of reality. Be yourself!

How is this friend-making organized? Every Chapter should have a Membership (not Rush!) Chairman. He can be elected or appointed. It doesn't matter either way, but regardless of how he is chosen, he must have the support and goodwill of the Chapter. He does not have to be the best "rusher," but he should be the best recruitment organizer.

Friend-making means both members and prospects act simply as themselves.

This chairman should be assisted by a committee of five to seven members (and pledges, if they are already around), a mix of classes and groups of the Chapter. This Membership (not Rush!) Committee has three functions:

- 1. to plan membership recruitment
- 2. to keep records
- 3. to *motivate* the chapter to carry out the friend making process.

Planning. As its first duty, the committee should plan the friend-making program, and this plan should include goals (such as each Brother getting to know X number of prospects by such

and such a date), a schedule and a budget. This plan, like all committee plans, should be presented to the Chapter for debate and approval. The committee then oversees the execution of the plan.

Record Keeping. You'll be meeting (hopefully!) dozens of prospects, so you'll need a system for keeping them straight. Putting names and dates on 3 x 5 index cards has been found to be a good system, and high tech Chapters with computers can keep the data in that

Emphasize one-on-one and two-on-two situations.

format. You'll want to note the prospect's address and telephone number, home town, who knows him and what the connection is, and what his interests are. It should be noted each time he is contacted and what his response was.


Motivation. Recruitment should be a year-round affair, so the committee needs to use creative tactics to keep the Brothers interested and involved. Contests for number of prospects genuinely met, fun (but small!) social encounters and so on may be used to keep the Brothers out there on the front lines making friends.

Who does the actual friend-making? The Membership Chairman? No way! He does not have the time to be out there getting to know scores of prospects. He is supposed to be a full-time student, and he is only one man, so it must be the committee. Most Chapters have their Membership Committees handle all the contact with prospects and recruitment for the Chapter. Wrong again! The committee itself is too small, and friend-making is not a responsibility reserved for the committee alone.

Who is it then? Every brother in the Chapter. Yes, every single member ought to have some role in friend-making recruitment, be it calling prospects, socializing with them, keeping records or stuffing envelopes. A burden shared is lightly borne, and the task of membership recruitment to perpetuate the Chapter is a mighty one indeed.

So, experience has proven, to increase your membership and obtain Brothers who will stick with you, give up rushing and turn to friend-making. Be yourselves, and you'll be surprised at the results.





Endowment Fund News



Ruddick C. Lawrence, Washington '31, one of Phi Psi's 1988 Distinguished Alumni, has announced his resignation as chairman and trustee of the Endowment Fund, thereby completing 28 years of service to Phi Psi's educational foundation.

"I shall miss the stimulation and challenge of working with the undergraduates and so

many other dedicated and talented Phi Psis," said Lawrence.

Prior to his resignation, Lawrence made a \$30,000 gift to the Endowment Fund, which will create the Ruddick C. Lawrence Awards for Public Service.

Commenting on Lawrence's gift, Phi Psi President J. Robert Meserve said, "It's certainly fitting that this gift will create the Ruddick C. Lawrence Awards for Public Service since he is the epitome of a Brother who has devoted a lifetime to improving our Fraternity."

In 1953, Lawrence became vice president of the New York Stock Exchange, where he was responsible for public relations and investor services. He directed the Exchange's programs for broadening share ownership and institutional investing, as well as its education and market development activities.

He was hired by the Continental Oil Company (Conoco) in 1968 as vice president of public relations and public affairs, and was

promoted to vice president of corporate activities in 1974. He retired from the Company on February 1, 1977.

On February 1, 1977, he created Lawrence Associates, a New York-based company which provides consultation and management services for public affairs, film distribution and trade relations in the United States and Middle East.

Lawrence serves on the board of managers of the New York Botanical Garden, and is honorary president and director of the New York Board of Trade. He is a director of the International Film Foundation; governor of the Invest-In-America National Council Inc.; and director of the New York State Festival.

He is honorary president of the U.S.-Arab Chamber of Commerce. A trustee of Sarah Lawrence College for 12 years, Lawrence was chairman of the college's board from 1964 to 1969. He also served six years on the Bronxville, N.Y., School Board.

Endowment Fund Marks 75th Anniversary

Phi Kappa Psi is a Fraternity steeped in tradition, as well as a Fraternity of innovation. The 75th anniversary of one Phi Psi innovation is being celebrated in 1989 the diamond anniversary of the Fraternity's educational foundation, The Endowment Fund of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, Inc. the first such fund in the interfraternity world.

At the 1912 Grand Arch Council, Brother Dan Gardener Swannell, Michigan 1893, presented a plan to help worthy, but needy Phi Psis complete their studies. At a time when only a few scholarships were available at American colleges and universities, and banks seldom lent money to students, Brother Swannell's proposal was truly a pioneering initiative.

Since its founding in 1914, the purpose and scope of the Endowment Fund have evolved considerably. The trustees continue to make emergency loans to students for educational purposes, but they consider the Fund a lender of last resort. Because loans are readily

available from banks and other agencies, the Trustees have increasingly preferred to give money in the form of outright scholarships, fellowships, grants and awards, rather than become involved in loans.

The Endowment Fund has also been increasingly supportive in funding educational activities of the Fraternity, as well as projects that can be of benefit to the American college fraternity movement as a whole and the higher education system in general.

Of course, the Endowment Fund would be unable to carry out any of its many programs without the generous support of Phi Psis since its inception. From the early subscribers to today's donors of annual and planned gifts, the Endowment Fund has benefited from the loyalty and interest of thousands of Brothers.

As John L. Porter, Allegheny 1886, said in an appeal for the Endowment Fund in its founding year, "It is a foregone conclusion, and a perfectly natural one, that for what we love the most, we will sacrifice something for."

Graves Awarded Leadership Award

Eric S. Graves, *Penn State '84*, received the first Endowment Fund Leadership Award in November 1988. The award included a \$2,000 scholarship.

Graves, a recent graduate of Penn State, earned degrees in science and marketing. He is working for a Philadelphia pharmaceutical firm, and will eventually pursue an MBA.

He served Pennsylvania Lambda as president, "Phi Psi 500" chairman, academic chairman and messenger. Graves also served as president and community relations chairman of the Penn State Interfraternity Council.

Graves was chairman of U.S. Congressman Bill Clinger's student liaison committee; chairman of the Penn State president's student advisory council; and an emergency room volunteer at Centre Community Hospital.

The Results Are In!

n the Summer '88 issue of THE SHIELD, a pull-out survey was included to obtain reader response to a number of Fraternity concerns, namely THE SHIELD itself. In the last six months, 216 loyal Brothers (196 alumni and 20 undergraduates) invested a little time, some ink and a postage stamp to let us know their thoughts on the various questions posed by the survey.

When asked what section of *THE SHIELD* the respondents found themselves reading with the greatest interest, the overwhelming favorite was the Chapter newsletter section, chosen by 72 percent. Fourteen percent said they were most interested in the feature articles, while six percent chose the Alumni Association newsletters. From Here and There (five percent), In Chapter Eternal (two percent) and From The Road (one percent) followed.

We asked what types of Fraternity items our readers would like to see offered in the Phi Psi Buyer's Guide in the future. The responses were quite varied with sweatshirts, rugby shirts, jewelry and other general Fraternity items being the most popular. Of those respondents with a preference, 13 percent said they do not like the Buyer's Guide.

Some of Phi Psi's interfraternity contemporaries charge for their magazine, finding it difficult to keep up with skyrocketing postage and printing costs. We posed the question "if the Fraternity charged \$10 per year for THE SHIELD would you most likely to keep your subscription current?" Fifty-six percent re-

sponded positively.

In relation to the rising costs of printing THE SHIELD, the Fraternity has begun including national advertisements in the magazine in conjunction with nine other national fraternities. Of those stating a preference, 80 percent thought the advertising should continue while 57 percent thought the number of ads should be increased. Many respondents added they would like to see advertising increased in deference to paying a subscription fee.

Concerning general information, the survey results showed that alumni hear from their undergraduate Chapter twice a year, on the average. Of those responding from inactive Chapters, 73 percent indicated they would like to see their Chapters rechartered. Forty-one percent said they have an interest in getting involved in an Alumni Association while 27 percent expressed interest in giving assistance at the Chapter level. Eighteen percent of the respondents were already involved in either or both.

The section of the survey dealing with attitudes toward Phi Kappa Psi showed incredibly positive responses. When asked their general feelings toward Phi Psi, the response was 91 percent positive with eight percent expressing neutral feelings. Only one percent said they had a negative attitude toward the Fraternity.

Taking the whole Phi Psi experience into account, 94 percent felt the Fraternity had a positive influence on their lives. Five percent said the Fraternity had no influence and, again, one percent

said the influence of Phi Kappa Psi was negative.

The final multiple choice question asked if the reader felt Phi Kappa Psi should remain an all-male institution. The respondents answered with a land-slide in the affirmative; 98 percent said yes while only two percent felt the Fraternity should allow female members.

The response to the questions asking the reader to tell what he enjoys most about his Phi Psi experience today, his biggest complaint about today's Phi Kappa Psi and what programs could the Fraternity develop that he would personally support were wide and varied, but were generally very constructive. One underlying theme seemed to be the desire of the alumni to be kept better informed by their undergraduate Chapters and asked to participate in more activities. Better grades and community service were also emphasized.

Special thanks to all Brothers who participated in the Phi Psi Survey. Your thoughtful remarks and suggestions are certainly appreciated and will help to improve our educational journal and our beloved Phi Kappa Psi as we head into the next decade.



The 1988 Report



PHI KAPPA PSI FRATERNITY

The Endowment Fund is a public fund and is the only Phi Psi fund able to receive tax deductible contributions. It is also the first and oldest fraternity foundation. Because of the generous support of generations of Phi Psis, our Endowment Fund is one of the largest, most active and successful in the fraternity world. In fact, for the number of Chapters, the Phi Psi Endowment Fund contributes more funds than the foundation of any other fraternity.

When the Endowment Fund was founded in 1914, Phi Psi pioneered the idea of making loans to needy undergraduates. Over the years, the Endowment Fund has invested in more than 1.000 Phi Psis.

I say "invested" because we not only get the money back with interest but we receive rich rewards in helping Phi Psis complete their education.

Today, we have only 29 loans outstanding to 23 Phi Psis. The amount with interest is about \$32,000 and only four or five are delinquent—a good record.

In the past few years, governments have moved into the loan and grant business and that has enabled the Endowment Fund to change its focus to concentrate on other urgent needs.

Our goal today is to recognize, encourage and reward scholarship and leadership and to support the Fraternity's educational programs. We want Phi Psis to feel equipped intellectually, morally and spiritually to enjoy productive and satisfying lives and to be leaders in their communities.

We are acutely aware that if Phi Psi is to survive on the college campus, our Fraternity must contribute to—and certainly not distract from—the university's educational goals.

The past two years have been the most eventful in the Endowment's Fund 74-year history. Here are some of the major events:

- Made direct grants of \$94,031 to promote and reward Phi Psi leadership and scholarship.
- Contributed \$342,041 in support of the Fraternity's educational programs.
- Survived the market crash of October 1987, with a loss of under 11 percent in our investment portfolio (versus a 22 percent loss for equity markets)—a performance ranking the Fund among the top third of similar foundations.
- Received alumni gifts and bequests of \$289,113 not including the annual Alumni Support Program.
- Created a Development Council of some 20 prominent Phi Psis to advise

- and support the Endowment Fund.
- Hired the Endowment Fund's first full-time administrator.
- Merged the Fraternity's Alumni Support Program into the Endowment Fund to consolidate fund raising efforts and to make alumni gifts to the Annual Alumni Support Program tax deductible.
- Combined the giving records of the Endowment Fund and the Alumni Support Program.
- Agreed to receive into the Endowment Fund the Fraternity's physical assets including the headquarters building, townhouse and parking area.
- Started a program to assist house corporations with fund raising proiects.
- Surveyed 1,600 Phi Psis who have received scholarships from the Endowment Fund and found that they give a strong endorsement of the role of Phi Psi in their college education. We also learned that they are fulfilling their early promise by serving successfully in business, professions and community service.
- Initiated other projects, including a planned giving program, hosting a series of Phi Psi alumni nights in several cities, and planning a recognition display for Heritage Hall.

Two years ago the trustees decided to invest in the future. The educational needs of the Endowment Fund and the Fraternity were growing rapidly. We planned to give substantially more support to the Fraternity and at the same time to gear up for the first fund raising effort ever undertaken by the Endowment Fund. It is an ambitious and expensive program, but we believe it will pay substantial dividends in years to come.

We hired our first full time administrator, and established the Development Council of prominent Phi Psi's alumni.

Bob Marchesani held a series of meetings with Phi Psis in a number of cities and tested their interest in fund raising.

We agreed to take over the annual Alumni Support Program including its computer and software.

As the Fraternity has expanded and greatly strengthened its educational and training programs, it has drawn heavily on the Endowment Fund.

At the same time, the Endowment Fund this past year experienced declining revenues from investments and contributions have not yet picked up.

In spite of this difficult environment, we are happy to report that the Endowment Fund's assets still exceed \$1 million

In addition to contributions over the two years totaling \$289,113, we received gifts of nearly \$40,000 from the Summerfield Foundation. Another check for more than \$36,000 was recorded in this fiscal year.

Interest and dividends exceeded \$100,000 and our gain on the sale of investments was \$16,000 more than the decrease in market value of our securities.

The big item on the expense side is the contribution to the Fraternity of \$342,000. The Fraternity used these funds for such projects as consultant travel and visitation, the Educational Leadership Consultant Program; maintaining the Headquarters Museum; Executive Council visitation; THE SHIELD; and Fraternity conferences. These are all projects that qualify, of course, as educational and serve the goals of the Endowment Fund, as well as the Fraternity.

The transfer of the annual Alumni Support Program will allow funds received by the Endowment Fund to be returned to the Fraternity for approved educational work.

About 85 percent of all of our expenditures go to educational projects for undergraduates.

Over the past seven years, Merchants Investment Counseling has handled our investment portfolio. They are affiliated with Merchants National Bank of Indianapolis, which has a Phi Psi as its president. This has been a difficult and volatile period in financial markets, but we think they have done a good job.

Our guidelines to them limit our investment in equities to 60 percent. This conservative policy has served us well and over the two years has resulted in an investment return of more than \$66,000. At the time of the October crash, we were only 40-50 percent in equities and 40% in fixed income securities. As Merchants puts it, we continue today to be "moderately cautious" with 48 percent in equities, 40 percent in fixed income and 12 percent reserved in cash equivalents.

One of the ways we stimulate and reward scholastic achievement, leadership and service is through our extensive awards program. To name a few:

- Summerfield awards for scholarship and leadership. The winner from each Chapter is announced in THE SHIELD and in hometown papers. He also receives \$100.
- Outstanding Summerfield Scholars.
 These three awards have been increased to \$3,000, \$2,500 and \$2,000
 —some of the largest in the fraternity system.
- Founders Fellowships for professional or graduate study. These grants for \$2,000 each are named for six of Phi Psis greats.
- Mary Pickford Rogers Scholarship
 —for a student in the arts.
- Ben King Scholarship—for engineering.
- George Hofman Scholarship—for a member of New York Alpha.
- Maurice Warnock Scholarship—for a member of Oregon Alpha.

The Tutor-in-Residence Program is for graduate students who can give academic support to Phi Psi chapters. They receive up to \$2,000 plus the host chapter and House Corporation supply board and room. This program can be of great help to graduate students, as well as the Fraternity. If you are planning graduate study, I urge you to look into it.

For Chapters or Colonies, the Endowment Fund has special challenges—

- The Griffing-Tate Fraternity Education award of \$1,000 for the Chapter with the most effective program.
- The Community Service Award of \$1,000 to the Chapter or Colony for the best program.
- The Woodrow Wilson Achievement Awards for the Chapters or Colonies which attain top academic ranking among fraternities on campus.

Other programs of the Endowment Fund are:

 Loans and grants to help Chapters purchase computer hardware for ed-

- ucational use.
- Sponsoring two participants at the week-long Interfraternity Institute.
- Contributing to the Center for the Study of the College Fraternity.
- Membership in serving the Foundations Section of the National Interfraternity Conference.
- Supporting the Museum at the Fraternity's Headquarters.
- Paying for speakers to attend special Fraternity events, such as District Councils, Leadership Schools, Founders Day, etc. . .

The entire list of contributions to the Endowment Fund is published regularly in THE SHIELD and we are grateful to all donors for each of them—large and small.



Planned Gifts Yield Big Benefits For Donors and Phi Psi

Anne Johnson was knitting in the passenger seat, but her mind was thousands of miles away on a cruise ship. Her husband Roger's mind was also focused outside the car, calculating how much interest they would save by paying their condo mortgage early. As the Johnsons drove home from their accountant's office, they were already enjoying the \$58,000 tax reduction they would get that year.

Scattered in three states, their children didn't know yet that their parents had donated \$250,000 to the Phi Psi Endowment Fund without shrinking their estate at all. But back home, Anne and Roger know that their gift had endowed one-half of the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School and that they had increased their own current year cash flow by \$58,000.

How is all this possible?

Quite simply, actually. First, the Johnsons gave \$250,000 to the Endowment Fund. Then, they took out a \$250,000 survivorship life insurance policy, paying a one-time premium out of their income tax savings, leaving 60% of the tax reduction for other uses. The flow of transactions is shown in Figure I.



Under another scenario, a couple could make a large donation, receive a tax reduction and *increase* their estate in the process.

For example (refer to Figure II), let's say [1] Bro. John Brown and his wife Janet donate \$127,500 to the Endowment Fund. This gift is put in the Endowment's [2] Pooled Income Fund, meaning the Browns will receive an annual income based on the Fund's investment results.

Pooled income funds are popular giving vehicles because they provide the donor continued income from his principal, secure an immediate tax reduction and make a major contribution to his favorite charity. The deduction is equal to the difference between the amount contributed and the present value of the retained income interest.

Assuming the fund pays 9%, the Browns will receive a check [3] each year for \$11,475. After taxes [4], they would net \$7,000* [5]. This is more than sufficient to pay the premium on a \$250,000



survivorship life policy [6]. This policy effectively replaces the Brown's gift to Phi Psi and adds \$122,500 to their estate [7]. Finally, the Browns get a tax reduction [8] of over \$11,000.

The results are that: 1) Phi Psi gets a \$127,500 gift for its endowment; 2) the donors get an \$11,141 reduction of taxes@; 3) the donors get special recognition as Jefferson Society benefactors;


and 4) the donors' estate grows by \$122,500.

Both of these methods of making a major gift with wealth replacement are straightforward and fairly easy for a donor to execute. However, one should consult his/her tax advisor to ensure receipt of the maximum tax benefit.

David Boersma Kansas '84 Babes Part II

In my previous article I discussed picking up babes and the idea of change in the fraternity system. (Maybe I should change the order of that last sentence.) I'd like to continue along these same lines and discuss what questions we should be asking ourselves in planning for the future.

The past cannot be changed, but if we study the past, we can try to direct the course of events which lead us to the future. The way I see it there are two futures, or two sets of futures for which to plan: short-term and long-term. What is taking place this semester? Next semester? And what will be taking place several years down the road?

As you read this article, spring thaw is well under way, young men's fancies are turning toward love and everyone is thinking about finals. In case these topics aren't on your mind, here are a few subjects you may want to think about.

It's time to dust off those housing contracts, edit them and distribute them for perusal and a signature, then collect them before your undergraduate Brothers have a chance to lose them.

The finance chairman, his committee or the treasurer should be starting to prepare a budget for the next school year. This budget should also be voted on by the Chapter and shown to the House Corporation or Chapter Advisor for counsel.

What about the Chapter's rush program? The summer rush chairman should have a calendar of events for the summer, with details to be firmed up as the weeks go by. If the Chapter doesn't have a summer rush program, at least set some goals for fall rush. Also, you may want to require every Brother to come back with the names of two entering freshmen.

As far as long-term goals, the Chapter may wish to discuss how large they want to become. Also, look at the Chapter house and decide if any major projects need to be undertaken.

Finally, we should touch briefly on the issue of alcohol. With George Bush in the White House, our "kinder, gentler nation" will continue to have a twenty-one-year-old drinking age. Thus, colleges and universities will continue strengthening their alcohol policies. It is in your best interests to start changing your social habits now, as opposed to being rudely awakened at a later date.

We put a great deal of thought into planning our own lives. Why not put just as much thought into planning the future of our Fraternity. (Once again, I have proven you can fool some of the people some of the time and one sure way to get an undergraduate to read something thought-provoking is to put the word "babe" in the title.) Think about it!

M. Erik Hume Building a Purdue '84 Positive Image
The best way for a Phi Psi Chapter to improve its image is through the positive use of public relations. A positive attitude is essential for image building.

The first step to an improved image is identifying the publics that affect the Fraternity. University personnel, other Greek organizations, rushees and the community at large are important publics for our Chapters.

The second step is to reach these desired publics with the right message. Start a weekly formal dinner and invite guests. Contact the Dean of Students or the University President and invite them to make an after dinner speech. The local Police Chief or the Mayor are also possible candidates. The IFC, Panhellenic, and fraternity and sorority presidents would be flattered to be invited over for dinner. Invite a faculty member from the Journalism or English Department to speak with your public relations committee about how to draft a press release. Remember to always send a thank you note to anyone who helps your Chapter.

A certain way to improve the Chapter's public image is through service projects. The criterion for a service project should be community improvement. The projects do not have to be complicated. Visit a nursing home and visit with the elderly. Donate hours of community service to the Mayor. Visit the inner city and do home improvements or landscaping for someone who is unable. "Adopt" the street where the Chapter house is located and be responsible for its litter pickup and maintenance. Throw a spaghetti dinner in conjunction with the local volunteer Fire Department and donate the proceeds. This is an area that can offer great rewards and an improved

There are many ways to reach these publics with a message. One method to avoid, however, is leakage through the grapevine. Fraternity business should be discussed in the privacy of a Chapter meeting.

Another way to communicate is through the press. One Chapter spokes-

man, typically the GP, is all that should ever communicate with the press. Other Chapter members should never comment. Ask that all newspaper interviews be conducted in person. Also ask to see the quotes that will be attributed in writing. If there is concern about misrepresentation then "no comment" is always the best strategy.

Good luck improving the Chapter image and remember to keep a positive attitude when confronting any challenge!

Daniel P. O'Rourke Respect vs. Indiana '84 Consideration "Give me the respect I deserve." As a Fraternity member, how many times have you heard this? During one of my recent Chapter visits, the "Pledge Trainer" (an appropriate title in this particular instance) was dumbfounded because he felt the pledges did not respect him. When I asked him what he hoped to teach the pledges during their pledgeship, his only response was, "I am teaching them to respect the Brothers." Unfortunately, his methods were just as ridiculous as was his single goal.

Respect is not something that should be compromised or taught. Many initiated members feel they deserve respect because they completed a semester-long pledgeship and lived to tell about it. The truth of the matter is simple. People are entitled to only as much respect as they earn. Everybody, however, is entitled to consideration. Pledges owe Brothers consideration, just as Brothers owe pledges the same. Interestingly enough, it does not stop with relationships exclusively in Phi Kappa Psi. People owe others consideration no matter who they are, and it is through mutual consideration that true respect is born.

It seems that people use the term respect much too loosely. I recently attended a workshop on male/female relationships. The speaker, a woman, made reference to the old scenario where the woman asks the man, "Will you still respect me in the morning?" If she is getting ready to engage in a one night stand with some stranger, why would she think the man respects her right now? Who cares what he thinks a couple of hours after the fact!

Sincere respect, from somebody we care about, is a very precious thing. Once we have attained that respect, it is human nature to try and hold onto it. If you want to gain someone's respect, it is your responsibility to give that person a reason to do so. As undergraduates, keep this in mind when you feel the need to exercise some of that "brotherly" authority over a pledge, or when you stumble upon "the woman of your dreams" after a long evening at a local campus watering hole. And finally, it is

most important to maintain the highest level of mutual consideration for each other, in order to preserve the brotherly respect that is an inherent essential part of our beloved Fraternity, Phi Kappa Psi.

Andrew G. Roush Wabash '85 Swords, and Pistols Yesterday I spoke with a university official who lauded Phi Kappa Psi for being the most gentlemanly fraternity on his campus. Of course, I complimented him on his keen perception of the obvious, but wondered what he had really meant by "gentlemanly."

For a long time, being a gentleman only meant that my parents had gathered the courage to take me into public, and in return I was expected to act as innocuously as possible. With adolescence, the benefits of gentle behavior became obvious; I learned to open doors under the guise of gentlemanly conduct, and gave many female acquaintances the impression that I really cared. I even succeeded in selecting a college where the only written rule of conduct charged me to act as a gentleman at all times, and while I did manage to graduate, my concept of the gentleman was not made much clearer.

Of course, being a gentleman means very different things to different people. To the British, "gentleman" connotes a noble birth belonging to the landed gentry, who generally find themselves subsumed by snobbish dispositions and a paralyzing fear of embarrassment. The idea of being a gentleman is really obfuscated by several flashy periodicals, where being a gentleman means wearing garish, unaffordable clothes and wet hair, while holding a contorted, leeward pose.

Not surprisingly, gentility was once better understood and taken more seriously than now. To the 16th century Italians no phase of gentility was more fundamental than honor, taken to mean of good character and reputation. And if we consider Aristotle's view of honor as the premium or prize of virtue, then, perhaps, a gentleman is merely someone disposed to being virtuous. What elements might compose a virtuous life? Aristotle's list reads like a combination of the Scout Law and the fruits of the Spirit, offering neither revelation nor lucid understanding of what it is to be as a gentleman.

Those of the Victorian Age approached the question much more pragmatically. To some, a pleasing manner came naturally, but to others the natural advantages were few, and the opportunities to polish deportment were limited. Still, proper etiquette was of utmost importance, and many books existed to instruct a man in topics of living as

disparate as writing someone you love, whether or not you know her, to breeding consonant manners in your horse, dog, or child and thereby saving all from an unfavorable reputation.

But etiquette, manners, and lofty locution about moral purpose and the place of honor do not offer an understanding of gentle behavior which can easily be practiced. Emily Post and Amy Vanderbilt might disagree, but I believe it is possible to gather the significant facets of gentlemanly conduct into the following aphorism: gentleman, first and foremost, are considerate of others. As members of the Fraternity, we may not be of the landed gentry, and we may not be of an elevated social position, but we are by association, armigerous, bearing the shield of Phi Kappa Psi, as gentlemen.



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


Dean Witter. He began his career with Dean Witter in 1966 as the thenyoungest stockbroker ever hired by that company. His career has been spent entirely in northern California.

EARL EHRHART, Georgia '78, was re-



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
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
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Message From the President



Dear Brothers:

You might be interested in some of the results of a personal poll I recently took of both the voting and non-voting members of the Executive Council. This was really to "pick the brains" of our leadership group and assist me in guiding the course of our beloved Fraternity. I asked each of the Brothers what they perceive as the most important program or objective in the administration of the Fraternity in this biennium. The Archons would give some insight to the view of the undergraduates. I advised that if desired, I would keep the source confidential, and two or three made this request.

The responses of the Executive Council members were very illuminating and surprisingly frank. Not surprising was the most popular response in number, and that was Fraternity finances. Accounts receivable from the Chapters has grown to alarming proportions, but I am pleased to report that more stringent collection efforts have shown some positive results. However, a lot more needs to be done, and we may possibly lose Chapters in this process.

For various reasons, the responses of the majority of the Archonate clearly indicated they felt somewhat confused in their role as national officers. One Archon stated: "We have no definition of our position. At least no working definition. I believe we should redefine the position of Archon." At the recent Executive Council meeting held April 1st, the Board members responded and I appointed a committee consisting of all of the present sitting Archons with the President of the Fraternity as Chairman. The Committee will function at an early date and come back to the Executive Council prior to the District Councils to be held this coming August with a modern definition of the position of Archon.

Most naturally, alcohol abuse and other associated disciplinary problems were mentioned in the responses, but in my mind the answer to many, if not most, of our problems (shared by other Greeks) can come from the work of the Phi Psi Commission on Values, Ethics, and Standards ably chaired by our immediate Past President, Dave Hull. Our Mystagogue, Kent Owen, agrees and in response to my question posed to the Executive Council states:

"I think that the work of the Commission on Values, Ethics, and Standards, is our most vital initiative—if the result can be presented as a program for thought and action at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School in August and then directly introduced to all our Chapters and Colonies as a whole at the start of the 1989–90 academic year. I see whatever form the program eventually takes as involving our alumni in a series of regular panel discussions and dinner meetings—what the Fraternity has historically meant by 'symposium'—with undergraduates."

I hope this message will tease your interest to come and share your thoughts at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School and District Councils to be held this coming August 3rd-6th at Indianapolis.

With a superb group of dedicated Phi Psi volunteers backed up by the very best staff in the fraternity world, it's fun to be your President. It's always great to be a Phi Psi. Fraternally,

Introduction

The Lady, or the Tiger?

any of us remember reading as a child, the story filled with mystery and intrigue of a young man's dangerous journey in an attempt to save his beloved from a tragic death. This allegory is vibrant with images of both much that is wonderful in life, and much that is not, but is most memorable because it allows the reader to "end" the story himself—which door does the young man pick; that which leads to the lady, thus we assume to "happiness"; or that which leads to the tiger, and therefore to an untimely death?

In attempting to encapsulate an Annual Report for today's Phi Kappa Psi, in some ways I am empathetic with the young man challenged with two doors; there is much in Phi Kappa Psi of which we all can take great pride, and yet, fraternities in general are facing extreme challenges to their very existence because of behavior problems by our *own* members. How ironic that the American fraternity system has withstood two centuries of legislation, university bans, and community action designed to "end" college fraternities, and now are we to be undone by actions of our *own* members? The irony is *too* great!

Let's start with some good news . . . of the 93 Chapters on the roll as of February 19, 1989, 83 reported 1,613 initiates, the second highest in our 137 year history—this is good news! And, from the same number of Chapters, combined with 5 Colonies, 1,890 pledges/Colony members were reported, which also is the second highest in our history. These, too, are great tidings!

The "bad" news comes when we realize that our year of larger numbers, in both areas I might add, was just that reported to you last summer. So, you may ask, what happened?

What happened was that three very large Chapters, two of which were well over a century old, were closed; all three, for

behavior problems. In all three instances, your Fraternity leadership worked with university administrators in attempting to deal with situations remarkably similar. On all three campuses (Bucknell, Wittenberg, and the University of Rhode Island), we are fortunate to have excellent alumni House Corporation leadership, so future housing for our eventual return is secure.

To be sure, the participation by these three outstanding Chapters in counting Phi Psi "numbers" is sorely missed. But, it was Founder Letterman who said "men, not numbers" are to be worthy of wearing our Fraternity badge, and the undergraduates involved in those three Chapters did not qualify. When Fraternity and University standards are not being met, we have no choice but to close a Chapter, attempt to salvage housing where possible, and reorganize at a later date.

There is a message here to those who belive today's Phi Kappa Psi is not serious in keeping our great Fraternity free of hazing and alcohol abuse; read herewith, we are! Always, when problems arise, will we continue to try to deal with individual student Brothers whose individual conduct is the problem, and separate those offenders. However, when a vast majority of undergraduates prove time after time by their actions to be unworthy of our Fraternal trust, society demands that Chapters be closed, and closed they will be.

Phi Psi is very proud of the high caliber of student Brother, who combined with concerned alumni counsel, and informed university administrators, lead the typical Chapter on our campuses today. For by and large, most of our Chapters are healthy environments for their student members. However, the decade of the 90's will be a testing time for all Greek letter societies, and our prediction is that, by combining this student, alumnus, university and other Fraternity talent, Phi Kappa Psi will emerge all the better for surviving these tempering times.

So do we have problems? Yes, we do. But for 137 years, this great Fraternity has benefited from inspired leadership, dedicated alumni, and students of the highest integrity to plot a course of safe passage through the very roughest of waters. Fraternities are indeed in rough waters, and only the fittest will survive. Our job is to make sure the good ship Phi Psi is as well equipped as she can be to navigate into the 21st Century.

What will Phi Psi be like when we celebrate our sesquicentennial in the year 2002 (in only 13 years!)? Will our story end as we open the door to the lady, to many more decades of hope and promise? Or will our story end tragically as our door opens to twin tigers of hazing and alcohol abuse? Time, and only time, will tell, but let's continue working together to ensure that our Founders cry will be as relevant in 2002 as it was in 1852 when proudly they did proclaim "We live, and we shall flourish!"

Statistics

The "Average" Chapter

he average Chapter in Phi Kappa Psi experienced a good report year, representing activity from March 1, 1988-February 28, 1989. The model Chapter has the following statistics: 64 undergraduates, 21 of whom are pledges, of which 19 become initiated members. The typical undergraduate Chapter lives in a building owned by a Phi Psi alumni house-holding corporation; the property is, on average, 41 years old, with building, land and contents valued at over \$600,000.

The average Chapter had a net decrease of 7 men compared to last year, including members and pledges, although the range varied greatly from a 78 man *increase* (at newly chartered Kentucky Beta), to a 93 man *decrease* (at Rhode Island Beta, which was closed). The typical undergraduate Chapter has ini-

tiated 809 men over the years, and has celebrated their 64th anniversary of founding on their campus.

Membership

The year under review added 1,613 new initiates to Phi Psi's Grand Membership Roll, compared to 1,750 last year. The Chapters pledged an average of 21 men per Chapter, initiating 19 of them. The 1,890 pledges reported this year compares to 1,987 last year, and 1,847 the year before that.

Progress continues on decreasing our "lost" address list, and we now mail THE SHIELD to nearly 52,000 Phi Psis! Keeping track of the flock is a never ending project, so please, if you know of a Brother who does not currently receive Phi Psi mail, forward his name and address to: Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, 510 Lockerbie Street, Indianapolis, IN 46202.

New Chapters

Phi Psi added three new Chapters during this report year under review, March 1, 1988-February 28, 1989, when the red and green banner was planted firmly for the first time on the campuses of the University of Kentucky, Lexington, on April 23, 1988; Southern Methodist University in Dallas on April 30, 1988 (both of which were reported in last year's Annual Report); and the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, on December 10, 1988. Organized as a Colony by Fraternity staff on September 11, 1986, UMBC makes an outstanding addition to Phi Psi's membership roll, chartering with 29 new Brothers.

Colonies

The Fraternity operated a total of 7 Colonies during this report year, three of which were chartered (reported above); Kentucky Beta, at the University of Kentucky, on April 23, 1988; Texas Delta, at Southern Methodist University, on April 30, 1988; and Maryland Beta, at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, on December 10, 1988.

Other Colony activity included ongoing development of the District of Columbia Alpha Colony, at George Washington University, in an attempt to reclaim a Chapter charter first issued in 1868, and lost in 1899. This Colony was organized April 6, 1987. Another return to a Phi Psi campus listed previously as "inactive" took place on November 9, 1987, when the Fraternity organized the Wisconsin Alpha Colony, at the University of Wisconsin, in Madison. The old Wisconsin Alpha was chartered in 1875, closed in 1894, reopened in 1897, and closed again in 1939. A Colony making great progress this report year was organized by Fraternity staff on January 23, 1988, at Trenton State College, designated New Jersey Delta. And, just several weeks later, on March 11, 1988, the Massa-

chusetts Beta Colony was recognized, at Brandeis University, in the greater Boston area.

Shortly after this Annual Report year, on April 16, Phi Psi recognized North Carolina Beta, at East Carolina University, in Greenville. Organized by a transfer student Brother, North Carolina Beta, like all Phi Psi Colonies, would receive its Chapter charter only after meeting all ten of the Fraternity's installation requirements.

Four Chapters Closed

As reported above, the Chapters at Bucknell, Wittenberg and the University of Rhode Island all three were closed as a result of behavior problems. In the case of Penn Gamma and Ohio Beta, the Chapter charters still are intact, with final disposition yet to be determined. At Rhode Island Beta; the Chapter charter was suspended on December 12, 1988, where 601 members were initiated since the Chapter's founding on January 8, 1966. On all three campuses, alumni House Corporations are attempting to keep housing available for our eventual reorganization of these Chapters.

A fourth Chapter was closed this past report year, but for reasons not relating to student misconduct; on June 4, 1988, the Chapter charter of Alabama Beta, Auburn University, was suspended. Following years of membership decline, Alabama Beta was not able to adequately compete for new members. Founded on January 26, 1974, the Auburn Chapter initiated 108 men over the years.

Numbers in Chapters

Since each Annual Report stays strictly within the time limits of March 1 to the end of February, it is possible for some Chapters and Colonies to experience artificially high, or low, member numbers. For example, if a new initiate report is not received in Phi Psi's Headquarters until March or April (from a January or February initiation date) one year, but the following year the report comes in on time or early, the impact of two years' quantity of new members appears in one "report year," thus the total of new Brothers joining appears unrealistically high; the opposite reporting practice results in artificially low total member numbers. The overall, year to year figures Fraternity-wide do even out, but when viewing each Chapter alone, the picture given by any single report year may or may not accurately reflect exact member numbers.

Last year, 21 Chapters listed 100 or more men on their roster, and this year 15 are so on record. Leading the way again this year is Indiana Beta at Indiana University, with 159 men involved in the Chapter over the report year under review. Next comes the West Virginia University Chapter, West Virginia Alpha, with 152; followed closely by California Zeta, the Uni-

versity of California at Santa Barbara Chapter, with 150; Ohio Lambda, at Miami University, 138; the Valparaiso University Chapter, Indiana Epsilon, 134; Nebraska Beta at Creighton with 127; Oregon Alpha, the University of Oregon Chapter, 121; California Delta at the University of Southern California, and California Epsilon at U.C.L.A. tied with 118 each; Illinois Delta at the University of Illinois with 117, Stanford's California Beta Chapter with 115 men; Indiana Delta at Purdue University with 108 Brothers and pledges; Mississippi Alpha, the Ole Miss Chapter, and New York Beta at Syracuse, both at 107, and finishing the list with members in the 100's is Texas Alpha at the University of Texas with 104.

Only two Chapters reported membership in the 90's as of Founders Day 1989: Florida Alpha at Florida State University, with 99 Brothers and pledges; and the Johns Hopkins Chapter, Maryland Alpha, with 95 men.

Chapters in the 80's were Ohio Delta at Ohio State with 87; Pennsylvania Beta at Allegheny College and Virginia Beta, Washington and Lee, both reporting 86; the University of Missouri Chapter, Missouri Alpha, 83; Indiana Gamma at Wabash, 82; and four Chapters all reporting 81 men, Illinois Epsilon at Illinois State, Ohio Alpha at Ohio Wesleyan, Nebraska Alpha at the University of Nebraska, and Tennessee Delta at Vanderbilt.

Nine Chapters reported membership in the 70's, up from six last year: Indiana Alpha, DePauw; Kansas Alpha, Kansas; and Kentucky Beta at the University of Kentucky all reported 78 men; Pennsylvania Epsilon, Gettysburg (77); Georgia Alpha, Georgia (76); 75 were reported each by Arizona Beta at Arizona State and Pennsylvania Nu, Indiana University of Pennsylvania Pennsylvania Nu, Indiana University of Pennsylvania Pennsy

sylvania; Iowa Alpha, Iowa (74); and Delaware Alpha, Delaware (73).

There were 13 Chapters reporting membership in the 60's this year, up from eight last year: Alabama Alpha, Alabama (68); California Eta at Cal Poly (68); Oklahoma Alpha, Oklahoma, and Rhode Island Alpha at Brown reported 68 men; New York Alpha, Cornell (67); North Carolina Alpha, Duke (66); Pennsylvania Theta, Lafayette (66); Michigan Alpha, Michigan (64); Pennsylvania Lambda, Penn State (64); Illinois Alpha, Northwestern (63); Indiana Zeta, Butler (62); Colorado Alpha, Colorado, and Virginia Alpha at Virginia, both reported 61 men.

There were 8 Chapters reporting 50-59 members and pledges this year; 12 Chapters with a roster of 40-49 members and pledges recorded; and 10 Chapters with membership in the 30's. Refer to pages 128 and 129 for complete statistics on the membership of each Chapter and Colony.

District VI Has Largest Chapters

Phi Psi's far west District, comprised of 13 Chapters, recorded the largest average size this report year, with a 77 man average. Close behind came District III's 19 Chapters, at 75 men, followed by District I's 17 Chapters with 59 men; District's II and IV, 15 Chapters each, also with an average of 59 men; and District V, 14 Chapters, with a 57 man average.

2000 Club

Phi Psi's most exclusive membership grouping, honoring Chapters who have initiated 2,000 or more men over the years, the "2000 Club," still has but one member, Indiana Beta, who became eligible in 1983. Founded in 1869, the Indiana University Chapter has a total of 2,226 initiates as of Founders Day '89.

1500 Club

The "1500 Club," opened only to those Chapters claiming 1,500-1,999 initiates, gained one new member this year; Iowa Alpha, founded in 1867 at the University of Iowa. 1,507 men have joined Phi Psi at this outstanding Chapter over the years. That Chapter nearest to gaining membership in the "2000 Club" is Kansas Alpha, founded in 1876 at the University of Kansas, with 1,787 initiates. Kansas Alpha joined the "1500 Club" in 1976. Penn Gamma follows next, and has initiated 1,716 men since their founding at Bucknell in 1855, and joined the Club in 1981, as did West Virginia Alpha at West Virginia University, founded in 1890, now boasting 1,677 initiates. Ohio Alpha jumped 3 places since last report year, with 1,689 initiates total, having joined the Club in 1980. Ohio Alpha was founded in 1861 at Ohio Wesleyan University. The Ohio State Chapter, Ohio Delta, joined the Club in 1983, and has initiated 1,682 men since their 1880 founding. Two of Phi Psi's New York Chapters are next in the rankings, with New York Alpha leading New York Beta, 1,645 men having been initiated at Cornell, and 1,629 at Syracuse. New York Alpha was founded in 1869, and New York Beta in 1884. Indiana Delta, founded at Purdue in 1901, has initiated 1,627 men over the years. Texas Alpha has initiated 1,624 men since their founding at the University of Texas in 1904, and joined the Club in 1985, as did Illinois Alpha. Founded in 1864 at Northwestern University, the Illinois Alpha Chapter has brought 1,605 men into the Fraternity. Penn Beta, Phi Psi's Chapter with the longest continuous existence, founded in 1855, joined the Club in 1981, and has initiated 1,610 men at Allegheny College. The Indiana Alpha Chapter at DePauw joined the Club in 1987, was founded in 1865, and now lists 1,553 Brothers on their roll. Both California Delta and Illinois Delta joined the Club in

1988, now boasting 1,538 initiates at USC, and 1,521 initiates at the University of Illinois. Cal Delta was founded in 1927, and Illinois Delta in 1904.

1000 Club

There were no additions to the "1000 Club," honoring Chapters who have initiated 1,000-1,499 men, this year, although it's an amazing fact that, of Phi Psi's 93 active Chapters as of Founders Day 1989, 42 of them, nearly one-half, have initiated 1,000 or more men since founding.

Initiates

As reported above, 83 of our 93 Chapters reported 1,613 initiates and transfers during 1988–1989, down from our all-time record 1,750 reported last year. The Ohio Alpha Chapter at Ohio Wesleyan led the nation in new initiates, with 46 men reported new to the Phi Psi rolls this year. They were followed by Indiana Beta at Indiana University, with 42, tied by Washington Alpha at the University of Washington, followed closely by the new Kentucky Beta Chapter at the University of Kentucky.

This year's 1,613 initiates came from 83 Chapters reporting, for an average of 19.43 new members per Chapter. Last year, 1,750 initiates were reported from 88 Chapters, for an average of 19.89 men per Chapter, and the year before that averaged 18.36 men per Chapter, which totalled 1,469 new Brothers in Phi Kappa Psi.

Pledges

This year, 83 of the Fraternity's 93 Chapters, and 5 Colonies, reported 1,890 men. This averages 21.47 men per undergraduate group, which compares to 20.92 men last year. When last the Annual Report was issued, Phi Psi's Chapters and Colonies garnered 1,987 men, and 1,847 men the year before that. Fraternity law provides that pledgeship terminates: (1) upon initiation into the Fraternity; or (2) upon expiration of two academic semesters or three quarters grade reporting periods from date of pledging.

Housing

Once again we are pleased to report that Phi Psi housing is again this year adequately insured through year number six of the Phi Psi Insurance Program. Now totalling \$30,274,968 in property and contents value, this Program has proven quite successful. And, we are particularly pleased to announce that, for the first time in the Program's history, we were able to decrease premiums charged out to House Corporations. And, another benefit of the nationwide insurance program we are seeing is that more attention is being paid to Chapter housing. Through the ongoing investigation undertaken of all Phi Psi property, specific recommendations for physical plant improvements are being carried out. It is your Fraternity's plan that, through this effort, Chapter housing for Phi Kappa Psi will be the very best in the men's fraternity world.

If Phi Psi housing is going to improve, the work, of course, will be carried out only by well organized, dedicated House Corporations . . . the Fraternity simply could not survive without them. And alumni are only willing to serve in such an advisory capacity if adequate liability insurance coverages exist. So the Phi Psi's Insurance Program's liability coverage is designed to protect students, Chapters, House Corporations, Advisors, and general Fraternity volunteers and professionals as well. In the current report year, the liability premium was decreased for the first time in its history, and we hope to keep premiums in line again next year. As those readers of THE SHIELD who are attorneys, doctors and other professionals

can attest, liability insurance has become a very real burden; but, a large loss at any one Chapter without liability coverage would be devastating, and could result in bankrupting the Chapter and House Corporation out of existence.

Experience is showing that our insurance program is allowing for more extensive coverages not available to House Corporations if they were attempting to buy insurance on their own. In fact, we are told by interfraternity colleagues that, those fraternities without nationwide coverage, house corporations able to buy insurance on their own are paying 4 and 5 times what the typical Phi Psi House Corporation pays, for far less coverage.

And, in an effort to attempt to contain future escalating insurance premiums, Phi Psi has joined with a number of other fraternities in forming the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group. The FIPG has helped set underwriting standards and created a sophisticated program of risk management for Chapters and House Corporations, which should result in greater loss control, further reducing insurance premiums. This new interfraternity cooperative effort should help alleviate the insurance crunch in which Phi Psi and all other fraternities find themselves.

It is appropriate here to thank the several hundred Phi Psi alumni who volunteer their time as House Corporation officers and directors. Were it not for this dedicated crew, Phi Kappa

Top Ten Pledges

Psi simply could not exist on campuses where housing is not provided by the school itself . . . thank you, Brothers! All functioning House Corporations make it possible to provide safe, clean housing for our undergraduate Brothers, and we hope to achieve even greater heights in this area in the years to come.

Within today's Phi Kappa Psi, a total of 51 Chapter homes are owned by Phi Psi House Corporations, 20 Chapters occupy houses owned by a college or university, 13 rent privately, 3 are provided residence hall sections, and 3 occupy lodges.

Membership Shifts

Of the 93 Chapters represented in the Annual Report this year, 43 reported an increase in total undergraduate strength over last year, 46 reported a decrease in membership, while 4 listed a Chapter roster with numbers unchanged from last year. The greatest membership increase was experienced by the newly chartered Kentucky Beta Chapter at the University of Kentucky, while the largest membership losses were experienced by the 3 Chapters closed this report year due to behavior problems; at the University of Rhode Island, Wittenberg University, and Bucknell University.

If Fraternity undergraduate membership followed the general population demographic trends, we would expect the Sun Belt District IV and West Coast District VI Chapters to be edging up in the ranking of average student member listings. However, even as some decline in student enrollment continues, the more outstanding educational institutions will recruit undergraduates successfully nationwide, and are somewhat impervious to population trends in their immediate surroundings.

This year, the Fraternity student numbers followed a rather remarkable evening-out. Phi Psi's Far West District VI did lead


all others, whose 13 Chapters averaged 77 members and pledges. District III followed, whose 19 Chapters contained 75 men as an average. Districts I, II, and IV all averaged 59 men, with District V averaging 57 members and pledges for their 14 Chapters. District I is Phi Psi's far Northeast Chapters, District II surrounds Phi Psi's birthplace in Western Pennsylvania, District III could be called the Great Lake States Chapters, and District V the Grain Belt States. Our Fraternity's average Chapter size, at 64 Brothers and pledges this year, is considered quite strong in the interfraternity world.

Fraternity Headquarters

Heritage Hall

hi Psi's Headquarters and Museum at 510 Lockerbie celebrated her 11th anniversary June 1, 1989. Continuing to provide an outstanding home office from which to operate, in a neighborhood whose ongoing development of business and residential buildings surrounding, Phi Psi's permanent Headquarters and Museum has helped contain operating costs. This has allowed distribution of funds for other purposes.

We reported to you last year that Heritage Hall upgraded the Phi Psi computer to an IBM System 36, and this has proven to be most helpful as demands for more and varied types of information has increased as our Fraternity continues to grow and prosper. As a by-product of our computer work, the Fraternity has developed an attractive membership, fundraising, and financial software package suitable for any association which attempts to store information on and keep accurate addresses of its members. This software package is offered for lease, and is able to be modified easily and economically so it could serve the needs of most other membership organizations. Heritage Hall draws many visitors year in and year out, and all are most welcome! The unique combination of a modern central office in a Victorian museum setting is intriguing to all visitors, both Phi Psi and our many other friends. Heritage Hall has now hosted over 9,100 visitors since opening in 1978, and as a member of the American Museum Association, welcomes tour groups with advanced arrangements.

Staff Appointments

Phi Psi has been very fortunate over the years to attract competent, enthusiastic Brothers to our ranks as Educational

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Leadership Consultants. Originally called "Field Secretaries," and not too many years ago "Chapter Consultants," this band of dedicated Brothers is valuable by any name, and their current title more accurately reflects their role as educational adjuncts to the college experience. The Consultants traveling this academic year were: David T. Boersma, Kansas '84; Daniel P. O'Rourke, Indiana '84; M. Erik Hume, Purdue '85; and Andrew G. Roush, Wabash '85.

The Consultant position with Phi Psi's Headquarters team is a one year commitment, and often opportunities arise to serve a second year. We were particularly appreciative of Consultant Boersma's serving Phi Psi again this year in his second tour of duty, and following in this tradition, it is Erik Hume's plan to travel the red and green highway for the Fraternity again next academic year. We appreciate so much the hard work put in by Dan and Andy, who will likewise be missed.

Joining Consultant Hume will be 4 men new to the road crew at Heritage Hall: Victor J. Napolitano, Arizona State '84; Richard L. Weisberg, Stanford '87; Christopher A. Brown, Wabash '86; and Michael O. Pitt, Gettysburg '86. As you will notice upon careful addition, Phi Psi is very pleased to announce that we will man the road next year with 5 Educational Leadership Consultants, up from 4 for the last several years. There has been great demand put on this position, very important in Phi Kappa Psi, for Chapters and Colonies simply are requesting more help than we could heretofore supply. With these 5 enthusiastic road warriors, the Fraternity is fully prepared to service well the 93 Chapters and 5 Colonies this academic year upcoming, and to add additional Colonies as opportunities arise.

Another staff change made this calendar year, effective June 1, 1989, was the appointment of John M. Mead, *Tennessee '87*, to the Director of Publications job in Heritage Hall. In his new position, John will work with THE SHIELD, will assist in the publication of the 13th edition of the *Grand Catalogue*, and will review and revise other Phi Psi publications as necessary. We welcome Brother Mead to his new Heritage Hall post.

John Mead will serve as the successor to Terrence G. Harper, Oklahoma State '85, who served Psi Psi most recently as Director of Publications, appointed April 1, 1988, and prior to that as an Educational Leadership Consultant. Terry will now bring his expertise to Heritage Hall as the Director of Chapter Services and Risk Management, a position created in 1987 in direct response to student requests for additional inoffice Chapter services, and requests from House Corporations to assist in the complex challenge of risk management as Chapter advisory support groups. Terry began his new job with Phi Psi June 1, 1989.

Leaving as the immediate past Director of Chapter Services and Risk Management is Tane R. Abbott, California-Santa Barbara '82. Tane's work prior to serving in Phi Psi's management level was as an Educational Leadership Consultant, and before that was a charter member of Cal Zeta. Tane will be missed! Tane's employment with the Fraternity in his most recent role ended officially May 31, 1989.

Another Heritage Hall teamworker is switching careers, and that is Robert F. Marchesani Jr., *IUP '79*, who joined the Headquarters staff September 1, 1986 as the Endowment Fund Administrator. The activities of Phi Psi's educational foundation have increased significantly in recent years, and as the fund continues to grow through the generosity of Phi Psi giving, its scholarship and other programs likewise will increase as possible. Brother Marchesani ended this most recent position with Phi Kappa Psi on May 5, 1989.

A new Heritage Hall worker has signed on to help in the transition of the Endowment Fund positions, and that is H. R. "Mac" McLaughlin, Wabash '80. It is anticipated that the Endowment Fund will have working for its benefit a full time

Director of Development, and Mac will serve as that position's assistant.

Chapter Visits

During the 1988-1989 year, the Fraternity's Educational Leadership Consultants conducted 198 visits to Chapters and Colonies, ranging from 3-4 days on most campuses, to a total of 4 weeks on one campus where our Chapter was completely reorganized. In the academic year upcoming, plans are to spend considerable consultant time reorganizing 2 Chapters in great need, and visiting a number of other Chapters and Colonies more than one time.

The past academic year found Educational Leadership Consultants, and others, making a total of 12 extension prospecting visits on campuses with varying degrees of potential for Phi Psi growth. Two such visits resulted in recognition of Colonies at Brandeis University, now recognized as the Massachusetts Beta Colony, and North Carolina Beta Colony, at East Carolina University.

Meetings

In the year under review, March 1, 1988 through February 28, 1989, the Fraternity's most significant meeting occurred when the Grand Arch Council convened August 10-14, at the magnificent Fairmont Hotel, in New Orleans, Louisiana. The 64th biennial GAC draw more than 400 undergraduates, alumni and guests representing 86 Chapters, 4 Colonies and 31 Alumni Associations. (See the Winter 1989 issue of THE SHIELD, pages 4 through 15, for other details.)

The Executive Council, composed of the 4 alumni Executive Board members and 6 undergraduate Archons, serves as the chief governing body of the Fraternity between meetings of the Grand Arch Council. The Executive Council had 3 meetings this report year, with 2 coincident with the Grand Arch Council in New Orleans, on the first and last day, August 10 and August 14, in New Orleans. The other meeting this Annual Report year was also held at the Fairmont in New Orleans, on June 4, 1988, in preparation for the then upcoming Grand Arch Council. (After this report year, on April 1, 1989, the Executive Council conducted a meeting in Phi Psi's Headquarters, Heritage Hall, Indianapolis, Indiana.) Minutes of the Executive Council are available to any Phi Psi, through the Fraternity Headquarters, at a cost of \$5.00 to help defray photocopying and postage expense.

he loyal alumni of Phi Kappa Psi have once again proven their lifelong dedication to the Fraternity, by personally assisting Phi Psi financially. The 1988 Alumni Support Program reviewed following lists gifts received between March 1, 1988, through February 28, 1989. We are pleased to announce that this year's total dollar amount is the second greatest in the 36 years Phi Psi has asked for voluntary gifts...thank you Brothers!

The 1988 Honor Roll of Contributors lists 4,396 gifts, from 3,982 alumni Brothers. The total contributed this year was \$210,868, and compares to \$195,983 donated last year. The average gift for 1988 was \$52.96 per donor, up significantly from \$43.27 last year, and \$49.76 the year before. Our request for contributions went out this year to 52,950 alumni with good addresses, and the 7.52% participation rate is down from 8.76% last year, and 7.82% the year previous. In addition, we had 566 "first time" donors. We wish these Brothers a particularly hearty "welcome to the Club," and hope that we can look to them to continue the support of our beloved Phi Kappa Psi in future years.

1989 Alumni Support Program

The current 1989 Alumni Support Program began March 1,

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



I've spent a lot of time preaching about change and where the fraternity system is going. My thoughts and concerns were confirmed recently at the Western Regional Greek Conference. During the conference, a group of Greek professionals voiced the areas they are pinpointing as weak links in the Greek system. How many are surprised when I say these areas are alcohol use and haz-

ing? Well, you shouldn't be.

If we all take a hard look at what the Fraternity actually means and what our Ritual and Creed are telling us about ideals, ethics and morals, where does hazing come into the picture? In less than a year we will be entering the decade of the 90's. If we want to see fraternities enter the 21st century, we must start adapting to society's norms. Fraternities need to start practicing what they preach or we will soon go the way of the dinosaurs.

This change needs to come from the grassroots of the Chapter. If not a Chapter decision, then one person or an influential group from within needs to step forward and take the bull by the horns. If change is to be seen, someone must show some intestinal fortitude. A Chapter president may not be liked when he leaves office, but he should be respected for the job he performed. Part of this job is making tough decisions that benefit the Chapter in the long run.

All national organizations have statutes barring hazing. State legislators have upped the legal drinking age and passed legislation outlawing hazing. Universities have alcohol policies and hazing clauses. There are also strict guidelines handed down by our insurance company. We are all conscious of these documents and it is up to all of us

to adhere to them. If your Chapter's choice is to play with fire, you must be prepared to suffer the consequences.

Not a very positive or popular way to be remembered, but I'd rather have Phi Kappa Psi as an ongoing memory. As always, I am proud to be a Phi Psi. Take care, everyone.

M. Erik Hume How Do We Improve Purdue '85 Alumni Relations? I have been asked the same question at every Chapter visit: "How do we improve alumni relations?"

This is as difficult a challenge as undergraduates will face during their Fraternity experience. The road to improvement begins with successful alumni functions and thoughtful correspondence.

It is first important to understand what motivates alumni. They develop obvious new priorities once they graduate, such as a career and a family. The Chapter no longer has a direct, daily influence on their lives. Alumni want undergraduates to have the same opportunity to experience Phi Psi as they had and they want to keep in touch with Brothers of their own era.

When you begin planning an event, you need to remember that alumni must receive invitations at least six weeks in advance. It is not realistic to expect high attendance with only one or two weeks notice. Events should be planned at convenient times, such as homecoming and other university-sponsored alumni days. Founders Day is also an excellent time. Have alumni dinners each semester for local alumni, but try to avoid semiformal dances and parties if you can;. recent graduates enjoy them, but older alumni feel out of place and are often ignored. Think of alumni events as rush functions and plan your events with them in mind.

Correspondence is a successful ingredient to any program. A newsletter is an excellent way to reach Brothers and the ratio should be 80 percent alumnus news to 20 percent undergraduate news. Do not misunderstand, alumni want to know that the Chapter is doing well, but outside of that they are most interested in reading about their classmates and vice versa.

If your Chapter's alumni relations program is nonexistent, send out a survey asking what services a good program should provide and ask for recommendations on how to improve. Send a short, handwritten note to every Brothers who answers thanking him for his interest.

Send correspondence at proper times without asking for contributions. Wedding and job promotion congratulations, Christmas cards and other thoughtful notes will engratiate the Chapter to alumni.

Asking for contributions requires tact. Make it easy for alumni to contribute. Include a donation card with suggested contribution amounts in the newsletter mailer. Make it clear who the undergraduate contact is, preferably the GP or the alumni relations chairman. Recognize contributors in your newsletter and if your program is just getting started, a phone call will improve the Chapter's chances of receiving more support from that individual. Finally, every Brother should receive a short, handwritten note for his contribution. Good luck!

As I sit here in front of my trusty PC composing my final From the Road article, I am somewhat perplexed about exactly how to express what is going through my mind. The spring is always a time of great changes for so many of us. Secondly, a great deal of your time and money was invested in your educa-

tion. Don't let this go to waste. I have always felt that a strong undergraduate investment in Phi Kappa Psi would yield many positive returns when challenged with the task of succeeding in the "real world." Now is the time to begin reaping the rewards of your involvement during college. Incorporate the experience you gained from your Chapter affiliation as a selling point during interviews. Show perspective employers that you can offer more to them than just a high GPA. Phi Psi has provided you with a strong foundation upon which to build the rest of your life.

Finally, don't be intimidated by the fear of failure. It has happened to you in the past, and chances are you haven't seen the last of it. I recently had the privilege of attending a scholarship dinner at one of our Chapters. The guest of honor was a professor who spoke quite candidly about grades as a measure of success. He explained that students who get a C with effort typically get more from a class than students who make A's without trying. Challenge yourself by focusing your competitive spirit not on your peers, but on yourself. Don't allow yourself to get caught up in measuring how that first job stacks up in the eyes of those who surround you. Whatever career path you decide upon should be chosen by you, for you. So as you leave college to stake your claim in the real world, remember to love life, love yourself and love God for all of the ability, knowledge and opportunity that He has bestowed upon you.

In previous articles I've rambled about our derelict departure from our Founders' ideals; about mothers, acrimonious acronyms and poor diction; and even about our obligation and bent as Fraternity men to gentlemanly demeanor. But while these observations may have proved interesting, worthy of discussion, and God willing, true, they probably didn't do a damn thing to make the Fraternity better. And that's a problem. Because Fraternity discourse (and mine with it!) these days is almost incessantly anecdotal, we are forced to depend on digression to the day's most abhorrent incident to motivate our Brothers to be their best, rather than deriving change from ideas to which our Fraternal dialogue ascends.

Unfortunately, our Chapters are not immune from this insidious problem. I've met countless Brotherhoods that were drowning (or wallowing, as the case may be) in self-pity, consumed by the encompassing task of passionately de-

scribing and excusing the sordid details of their retarded performance. Believe me, the joules expended in offering excuses and explanations to Consultants are at best a heinous misallocation of valuable resources and at worst a serious detriment to Chapter programs.

Other Chapters have learned to handle this monster, and we could all take a lesson. Ostensibly, past predicaments don't matter and aren't worth mentioning, and present situations are noted only as benchmarks for measuring future success. These top Chapters reach a consensus on what is most important and then pursue the prize with a zealous pertinacity that readily spills onto every other facet of the Chapter's life. Whether the trophy is academic or athletic is irrelevant, the pride is contagious and self-perpetuating.

That management techniques of our successful Chapters can or should be considered in regard to the Fraternity as a whole is dubious, unless some shared fulcrum for change can be readily identified. In this case, I firmly believe that pride is, in a way, a pivotal point which should be shared by every entity of the Fraternity, alumni and undergraduate alike. Doubtless, the word "proud" crosses our lips with the same alacrity and almost as often as we utter "Phi Psi." But in this case, pride only affects positive change when its appetite is trained upon tomorrow's victory.

Thus, after 40,000 miles and 2000 handshakes on the road for the Fraternity, it seems that a good dose of honest pride is as close to a panacea as any remedy I've encountered. If we could go beyond a tacit affirmation of "Phi Psi pride" and commit to putting our pride into conspicuous practice by avidly pursuing excellence wherever the opportunity exists, we might find ourselves less ashamed or preoccupied by where we've recently been, and more productively absorbed by where we're headed!



MEMBERSHIP BLITZ FOR "ELITE EIGHT" IS ANNOUNCED

The Director of Membership, Byron W. Cain Jr., with the assistance of the Head-quarters staff, the Archons and volunteer alumni leaders, has completed a survey of the membership status of all Phi Psi Chapters. From this analysis, certain Chapters, dubbed the "Elite Eight," have been selected as recipients of a year-long aid campaign designed to increase their size.

The eight were selected after being screened through several criteria:

- they currently have 10 to 30 men, smaller than necessary to offer a broad fraternal experience
- they possess a core group of quality men who would be receptive and cooperative to outside assistance
- they have active alumni in their area who can be called upon to assist with the creation and implementation of the Membership Booster Plan
- they exist on campuses with reasonably healthy Greek systems.

The first major step of this program will be for representatives from the eight Chapters to meet at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School in Indianapolis in August. Undergraduates and their Chapter Advisors will join with the staff and alumni experts to examine the situations in the eight Chapters. A detailed *Membership Booster Plan* will be drawn up for each Chapter, complete with goals, a schedule and budget. How-to practice sessions will also be held to give undergraduates experience in contacting, talking with and bidding prospects.

An ad hoc committee for each Chapter will then be created to oversee the implementation of the Plan and to make appropriate mid-course corrections. It is anticipated that the Chapter Advisor, a House Corporation representative, the Archon, the visiting Educational Leadership Consultant, and other undergraduate and alumni leaders will serve on the committee.

LESLIE HYATT "PAT" EBY, Swarthmore '12, Birmingham, Mich., March 9, 1989. Born in Sheboygan, Wis., in 1892 and graduated from Swarthmore in 1917, he moved to Detroit in 1919 to work for Packard Motor Company in the advertising department. He formed his own ad agency in the 1920's and continued to work until he was in his mid-80's. Just prior to his death at age 96, he was re-elected to his 15th consecutive term as president of the United Homeowners of Bloomfield Township, an um-

brella organization for 90 subdivision associations. He was well known for cruising the streets of Birmingham in his golf cart and although he was ticketed three times the charges were dismissed after he promised to keep the cart off the streets. He began attending Grand Arch Councils in 1952 with the Centennial GAC in Pittsburgh and attended every one, 19 in all, through the 1988 convention in New Orleans. He was the

He became a member of the Ancient Order of S.C. in 1964.

HAROLD A. MOORE, Chicago '12, Wilmette, Ill, March 8, 1989. He was a director of Chicago Title and Trust Co. with whom he had been associated since 1931. He then joined the sales force of Trotwood Trailers Inc. and later assisted Opti-Gauge Inc. in their expansion. He served as president of both the Exchange Club and Miami Valley Country Club.

REV. WILLIAM MELCHIOR HORN,

Gettysburg '29, January 24, 1989. He graduated from the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia in 1935 and was then ordained by the United Synod of New York. He was a member of the Rotary Club in Palo Alto and a member of the Palo Alto Club, Commonwealth Club of California in San Francisco and American Field Service. 

MEMBERSHIP RECRUITMENT: BACK TO THE BASICS

At this point in the calendar, as we plan for the next school year, it is appropriate to remind ourselves of some of the most basic principles of membership recruitment. Although I prefer the terms "membership recruitment" or "friend making" to "rush," I'll use the latter since it describes to most people the process we are talking about.

WHAT IS RUSH??

Most obviously, it is the literal perpetuation of the Chapter. No rush, no pledges, no Fraternity.

You are choosing your "official" friends for four years; in many cases, even for life.

You are perpetuating ideals and traditions

You are mechanically sifting through, processing if you will, as many potential members as possible to find the ones you want for Brothers.

Keep it in perspective: You are choosing new members of a ritualistic, traditional college fraternity. You are not choosing your *only* group of friends and it is not as grandiose as judging a man's worth as a human being or looking into his soul.

On the other hand, it is not as casual as asking someone to dinner. You are selecting young men whose personalities and lifestyles are agreeable enough to you to want them for Brothers.

Rush creates the future success and failures of a Chapter much as athletic recruiting and the pro draft set the parameters for a team for the next few years. Rush creates the Chapter and everything that it is.

WHAT TYPE OF MEN SHOULD WE PLEDGE??

Pledge interesting, extraordinary, capable, talented men to be Phi Psis. Recruit the type you admire, the type you would be proud to call a Brother. Be discriminating.

The question is often asked, what about Brothers with scholastic problems or those who won't pay their bills or those who go "inactive." The answer goes back to rush. If you recruit well to begin with, those problems will be minimized. Pledge the man who will take his studies seriously, behave decently, bring talent and energy to the Chapter, be active all four years. Choose this type of

man in rush and you increase dramatically the potential for Chapter success.

It is important to develop the largest possible pool of rushees from which to select your pledges. The larger the pool of prospects, the more selective you can be. That means you—the Chapter collectively—should have as a goal to meet as many of the independent men—each of whom is a prospect—as you humanly can

TEN RUSH PRINCIPLES

- 1. Practice one-on-one rushing. This means getting to know the rushees as individuals and making friends with them. (See my article on rush as friend making in the Spring 1989 issue of The Shield.) Forget the group-on-group rush parties that in actuality are nothing more than entertainment for the Brothers and the occasion for a little incidental, superficial contact. If you want to recruit members instead of party, then invite small numbers of guests over to the house for dinner or to an athletic event or to see a movie, or wherever there is the opportunity to get to really know one another.
- 2. Every Brother has a role in rush. The Rush Chairman does not rush. The Rush Committee does not rush. The Chapter rushes. Every Brother has an obligation to help perpetuate the Chapter, be it making friends, maintaining records or keeping the pretzel bowls filled during formal rush rounds.
- 3. The Membership Committee leads the recruitment effort. As detailed in the last issue, the Committee and its Chairman have three primary functions:
 - to plan the year-long recruitment effort
 - to keep all the necessary records
 - to motivate all Brothers to contribute.
- 4. Rush all year. This dictum may be negated by individual school rules, but in general it can be said that a Chapter must make friends and recruit members all year long, not just during formal hunting season. You will find that some of the best prospects did not go through formal rush.
- 5. Use surrogate rushers. Canvas your *alumni* for recommendations. Ask them for help with event planning and budgeting.

Once your first *pledges* are obtained, immediately get them to rush as well. They can be some of your most enthusiastic and effective salesmen.

Obtain recommendations and assistance from *sororities*. They usually are more than glad to help.

- 6. Differentiate yourself. Rush is the marketing/sales aspect of a Chapter's operations, and the first law of marketing is to differentiate yourselves from the competition. At the pre-rush retreat your Chapter should have, the group should come to an understanding as to how you think you differ from the other fraternities on your campus. What is the different, unique product you are selling? Take an inventory of yourselves and your attributes. (Parenthetical thought: a mature, challenging, constructive Fraternity Education program will often offer a great distinction between you and the other fraternities.)
- 7. Be honest. Be yourselves; act naturally. Don't try to be something you are not. Relax, and that will encourage your prospects to as well. That way, both sides will know the true nature of the other and better choices will be made. On the factual level, be sure all the members know the exact, correct figures for such matters as the size of the Chapter, all Chapter and national fees. Chapter academic and IM standings, and other such numerical data. Also make sure the group is together on subjective matters such as Chapter goals. In short, everyone must talk the same game. And the game you play must be an honest, straightforward one.
- 8. Judge each prospect individually. Give each rushee the courtesy of a considered individual assessment. Take no package deals. Judge each one not only for what he is now, but also what he can become through involvement with Phi Kappa Psi. After all, none of us is ever a finished product. Fraternities, as instruments for the maturation and socialization of young men, would not be needed if we arrived already perfect. Keep your judgement process in perspective: to vote against someone is not condemning him to hell and offering a bid does not elevate him to sainthood. Also, do not become so haughty as to impose standards for rushees you yourself could not have met.

9. The structure of your rush program will predetermine the type of men you pledge. Base your rush around parties and you will get partiers. Take all your prospects to the library and you will pledge "study nerds." Recruit new members by making friends one-on-one with diverse, interesting, hard-working individuals and that is the type you will succeed in pledging. Show your rushees the wide range of activities involved in the fraternal experience.

10. Keep on selling after you pledge your class. In marketing there is a term

"post cognitive dissonance" which is a fancy phrase for having second thoughts. Having doubts after an important decision has been made is a natural human reaction. Know that every man you pledge will experience second thoughts about his decision, so it is up to you to reassure him that he has made the right choice. Take a survey of all your new pledges to find out exactly why they joined, what they expect to get out of it, what they liked about the rush at your Chapter and the other fraternities, and what they did not like. Ask for sugges-

tions as to what can be done better next time. Put the pledges on committees and get them working for the Chapter. Have them choose Big Brothers as soon as is practical. The worst thing you could do is to treat them like scum in an oldfashioned, neanderthal pledge training program.

Think about these principles as you plan your rush program over the summer. Remember, you are creating the future of your Chapter today!





Message From the President



Dear Brothers:

Did you ever wonder what your S.W.G.P. does on a typical day during his two year term? A review of my current files shows . . .

That very pleasant news is received, such as word from our Director of Advisors, John V. Ciccarelli, that the necessary loan has been secured to assure California Theta its first ever Chapter house. The Chapter Alumni under Chic's untiring direction worked day, night and week-ends on this project to assure the Chapter would have a place to hang its hat on the opening of the fall semester, and . . .

Also categorized as a pleasant message was word that after a few years of spade work, Phi Psi was selected from 18 petitioning fraternities to colonize on the University of California-Irvine campus beginning this fall. Brothers Gary Angstadt and Terry Harper conducted the hearing, assisted by our Sixth District Archon, representatives of nearby chapters and top flight local alumni. It was reported to me by UCI administration that this was the best presentation ever made at Irvine. Your President is extremely pleased as my office is only a couple of miles from the UCI campus, and I am active as a volunteer with the UCI Medical School. California Kappa here we come!

On the other hand, some of the matters are not so pleasant—as an example there was a recent phone call to head-quarters from an officer of a Chapter house corporation advising the corporation proposed to sell a magnificent million dollar Chapter house to the university for a ridiculously low price. The house is well located on the campus and not on university land. We are attempting to talk them out of this plan, but it appears this matter may have to be settled by the Courts. Within days of this problem, another "not so pleasant" item arrived—legal papers of a mortgage foreclosure action filed against one of our better Chapters by a financial institution that is in trouble with the regulatory agencies. Unfortunately and understandably, both the Chapter and the lender are located in the "oil patch."

Recently a letter arrived from a brother objecting to Phi Psi carrying a *Shield* advertisement of the National Guard on the grounds this was "imperialistic," but almost in the same mail was a nice letter from a Brother commending me for my President's Message in the same *Shield*.

Our very efficient Director of Alumni Affairs recently filed a very comprehensive and valuable option report surveying alumni activities. This will keep many Phi Psis busy in the months to come.

How did my predecessors handle SWGP duties so efficiently if they were not retired? Luckily, the managing partner of my firm is a Brother.

Please don't get the impression from this message that your President is responsible for the extraordinary achievements like securing a home for Cal Theta, or solves the problems like the one displayed by the mortgage foreclosure on a Chapter house. Foremost concerned with all phases of Phi Psi life is our able Executive Director with his 10 years of experience, Gary Angstadt, backed up by Terry Harper and now five Educational Leadership Consultants. Many problems are handled on the spot by the Consultants. But most important are the undergraduate and alumni volunteers, Chapter officers, Chapter and faculty advisors, house corporation officers, appointed members of the Executive Council who each have a special expertise in fraternity administration. And lastly the Archons and elected alumni Board Members who, because of their selection through the election process, share the ultimate responsibility for the smooth and proper operation of our beloved Fraternity.

OH DRY UP!

Move on to dry rush techniques for better membership recruitment

A 1986 survey by the National Interfraternity Conference found that about 60% of the nation's Greek systems were then under a "dry rush" format, meaning no alcohol allowed. The trend to dry rush is reportedly growing continuously, so we might surmise that ½ to ¾ of the Greek systems are now "dry."

Yet the regulations mandating dry rush too often apply only to formal rush rounds held certain specific weeks of the year. Alcohol use by fraternity members is still known to take place during non-regulated rush periods and at those campuses remaining under wet rules. As abuse of alcohol has for far too long been a negative in Greek life, both in reality and in its perception by the public, it is important to continue to address this problem.

But What's Wrong With Beer and Booze in Rush?

1. Basically, it is counter-productive to what you are trying to do, namely recruit new members. In this column in the last issue of The Shield, I said, "The structure of your rush program will predetermine the type of men you will pledge. Base your rush around parties, and you will get partiers." Reliance on beer and liquor at rush situations overemphasizes the social, partying aspects of fraternity life. Remember, rush is friend-making, not partying. Few of us go about making friends by taking strangers out drinking. Instead, we make friends by finding people with mutual interests, activities, organizations and values. Centering your rush on beer drinking partiers will attract only members interested in that element of chapter life. I recently was involved in the suspension of the charters of three chapters, where decades-old traditions of strong internal government, high scholarship and leadership on campus had been permitted to lapse. Instead, the membership had come to be drawn from those on campus who wanted a beer-drinking party club. Their rush events had become brew bust extravaganzas, and that drew in members who wanted to party and nothing else. When the work of the chapter had to be done, they were nowhere to be found. These chapters now face reorganization to get them back on the right track.

"Rush parties" are simply entertainment for the Brothers. You cannot rush well at a party so don't fool yourself into thinking they are rush events. If you want to party, party. If you want to rush, rush. But don't mix the two.

- 2. It's illegal under the laws of almost every state for persons under 21 to purchase or consume alcoholic beverages. Nationally, over 85% of Greek rushees are under 21. This makes many rush events illegal. In many instances you are serving alcohol to minors—a serious offense.
- 3. Abuse and illegal use of alcohol are against the precepts and ideals of Phi Kappa Psi.
- 4. Serving alcohol opens the chapter and its members up to enormous liability. Under the "dram shop" laws of most states, the provider of alcohol to one who later on has an accident is very much liable for the problem. A number of cases across the country have already found fraternity chapters liable when a rushee or brother has been a party to an accident while under the influence of fraternity-supplied liquor. The case involving Alpha Kappa Lambda at Northeast Missouri State is an example. The settlement for the parents was over \$180,000.

Advantages of Dry Rush

1. You will attract better members. Friend-making, not party-throwing, will enable you to showcase all the varying dimensions of a diverse chapter life. Take your prospects to ball games or cultural events; play sports with them. There are dozens of activities available to you where each side can get to know the other through personal conversation. This method will attract the doers, not the boozers, among the campus population. The genuinely sharp leaders among your prospects will see this and appreciate it.

After all, what is the product you all should be selling during rush? The fraternal experience. Brotherhood. Maturation. Growth in a social context. You should not be nor should you sell yourselves as a party club. You are a fraternity chapter. Sell yourselves as such.

- 2. Choices will be made more rationally. Some desperate chapters actually stoop to bidding prospects while they are under the influence of alcohol. You can imagine that they get the kind of pledges this behavior deserves. An invitation to membership in our Fraternity should be extended with dignity and class and should be given serious, thoughtful consideration by the rushee. Anything less demeans both parties and the chapter. To those of you who resort to this method to obtain pledges, I suggest you spare Phi Psi the honor of your presence and find another campus activity. We do not need pledges waking up the morning after wondering what they have done.
- 3. You will achieve a better reputation among your peers and the public. The people around you whose opinions count—the campus student leaders, the faculty and staff, your alumni, the national fraternity, your parents—will applaud and respect your behavior. Fraternities should be leaders in the area of responsible use of alcohol, not the worst offenders and abusers. Be out in front of the rabble!
- 4. It will cost you a lot less money. You can reduce your rush budget significantly by eliminating expensive, non-productive beer-filled parties. Save the money altogether and reduce dues, or put it toward house improvements, a new video or CD player, a basketball court, a weight machine or—heaven for-bid—a philanthropy or alumni relations.
- 5. You will increase chapter involvement. Remember, every Brother has a role in rush. When rush is simply parties, which are just entertainment for the actives, many members fade into the background. When all the actives realize each has a responsibility to recruit new members through friend-making, a higher degree of involvement is achieved.

How To Sell Dry Rush To Your Members

Sell them on the benefits and then prepare them for it.

To recruit members by making friends instead of handing them a beer, your members will have to learn to talk, converse, communicate. They will have to learn to articulate the benefits of fraternity membership and describe the goals and plans you have for the future. They

will have to practice small talk and the social graces. These are all attributes that mature, well-spoken leaders possess, attributes that we, as a molder of young men, claim to teach; right?

Have a retreat at the start of each semester and give your actives the facts and figures they need to sell your chapter. Have them stand up and role play a variety of situations, such as calling up a rushee cold on the phone, chit-chatting at a stiff formal rush round, talking casually over dinner, and so on. Your members may be shy at first about doing this, but make it fun, and the practice will be invaluable. After all, we are supposed to be teaching skills that will be needed in later life. Your school's counseling center or student life department will have materials and advice available on retreat planning and role playing.

Resistance

I can already hear some of you out there laughing and saying, there is no way we would voluntarily give up beer in rush and become known as teetotaling goodygoodies. We would lose many prospects and pledges.


Good! You do not want brothers who join because of your parties or because you plied them with beer all summer. If that is the way you recruit members, you will end up like those three chapters who sank to where they only had brothers who showed up at parties but not to anything else. If you lose a prospect to the beer-busting barf house down the row, fine. You haven't lost anything. Let him go. If a rushee doesn't come by your house because you do not serve beer, great. That saves you the trouble of cutting him off the list. Believe it or not, many rushees will appreciate nonalcoholic rush. When the University of Utah banned liquor from rush rounds, the advisor to fraternities said, "Several rushees stopped the central rush team to thank them for the dry rush and for removing the peer pressure that previously existed." This is a typical reaction when Greek systems go from wet to dry.

Again, you want the type of young man who is looking for the complete fraternity experience, which a sound Phi Psi Chapter can offer. You want the campus leader who asks about your pledge program, about your alumni contacts, about your participation in campus organizations. You do not want the rushee whose first question is, "Where's the beer?"

Be a leader by example in the responsible use of alcohol! Don't be part of the problem by participating in wet rush. It's illegal, non-productive and wrong. Switch to a better, more productive method of membership recruitment.

Much Ado About Pledging

Editor's Note: The National Interfraternity Conference is currently re-examining the role and mission of the pledge system. All member organizations of the conference are directed to study the problems and report their positions on this issue to the NIC convention in November.

If Phi Kappa Psi abolishes pledgeship, will it eliminate hazing? If you love controversy, then this is the topic to debate. The problem is hazing, and it continues to erode the framework of the Fraternity. The positions on this issue are polarized and deserve debate at the Chapter level.

The Zeta Beta Tau Fraternity Supreme Council abolished pledging in September 1988. "The Council wanted to launch a major assault against hazing," said Jim Greer, executive vice president. According to Greer, the Supreme Council had tried everything it could to eradicate hazing, and nothing seemed to work. "The Council realized that something had to be done, and abolishing pledgeship had not been tried."

Not everyone in the interfraternity world agrees with the position taken by Zeta Beta Tau. "Abolishing pledgeship attacks structure rather than attitude," says Bud Richey, director of Greek affairs at Louisiana State University.

The rationale of abandoning pledging is that if there are no pledges, then there will be no hazing. Rushees would be ini-

tiated into the fraternity immediately following rush. The Zeta Beta Tau program has six levels of Brotherhood. They feel that fraternity education should last the length of the undergraduate experience. The program is designed to have brothers reach their plateau during the senior year.

Will Chapters still haze their lowest level members? Are these first level members just pledges by another name? What happens if a newly initiated Brothers is unhappy with his fraternity choice yet has been initiated and is unable to join another one (most NIC fraternities have clauses forbidding the transfer of membership once someone has experienced the ritual)? Pledgeship does offer the Chapter and the neophyte the opportunity of a grace period to see if the right decision has been made. "There are times when fraternities make mistakes. It is better to walk away as friends rather than go through a resignation or expulsion," says Richey. He also added that foremost, the fit must be good between pledge and fraternity. Fraternities should exemplify and teach responsibility. "A pledge deserves to find out if his ideals and morals are planar with the Chapter," Richey added.

How will undergraduates adapt if such a decision is mandated? "Zeta Beta Tau has experienced ten months of shock, anger and denial after we unveiled the brotherhood program. At this stage, the undergraduates have accepted the reality that chance is necessary."

Both men do agree that this action should be voluntarily decided upon by each Fraternity. "This decision has been a success for Zeta Beta Tau, however, each national fraternity should choose their own path and continue to vigorously eradicate hazing." Richey concurred that individual fraternities, rather than the FEA (Fraternity Executives Association), need to make their own decisions.

Phi Kappa Psi polled her Brothers on just this topic at the recent Woodrow Wilson Leadership School. The informal survey was designed to measure attitude. Ouestion one was: "Do you believe that eliminating the pledge period would alleviate many of the problems facing fraternities (hazing, alcohol abuse, etc.)?" Eighty percent of the respondents (Alumni, Chapter members and pledges, Colony members and pledges and guests) either disagreed or strongly disagreed with the statement. Ten percent either agreed or strongly agreed. Question two was: "Would you support a movement to abolish the pledge period?" Only 1 percent answered definitely yes while 82 percent responded absolutely not. Question three asked: "Do you believe your Chapter would support a movement to abolish the pledge period?" Again, 1 percent said definitely yes while 88 percent responded absolutely not.

This issue promises controversy and longevity. How do you feel about it?



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

Dallas. A founder at Texas Delta, he is also an Administrative Resident working with the administrative team to assist them in ongoing projects and to gain experience in hospital operations.

RAY LOUSTEAU, Southern Methodist '88, played the wheel—and won. Lousteau and two other students at SMU participated in Wheel of Fortune's College Week and defeated teams from Harvard, Pennsylvania and Southern California and won more than \$90,000 in cash and prizes for themselves and the university. Lousteau, the corresponding secretary at Texas Delta, won over \$30,000 for himself.

Who, me? Study?

We never seem to have enough time to study. Or further, we never have time to study enough. As students and faculty, we talk a lot about studies and studying, but have you ever really thought about what that is and how to do it efficiently?

From the many definitions offered in the dictionary, I have selected a few to share and discuss: 1) application of the mind to the acquisition of knowledge, as by reading, investigation or reflection; 2) zealous endeavor or assiduous effort; 3) deep thought, reverie or a state of abstraction; 4) a room, in a house or other building, set apart for private study, reading, writing or the like; 5) -vi to think deeply, reflect or consider; 6) -vt to read carefully or intently; 7) to think out, as the result of careful consideration or devising.

The key elements of these are the words study, consider, reflect and weigh. These are the steps we have to take to study effectively. In reading the definitions, you should have gotten the feeling that study involves more than a brief review of material. It is necessary that you take an in-depth look at the material, consider what you have read, look back on it reflectively and weigh the result.

Now we all see that as a lot to do in a short time. Once again, let us look at things we can do to make it easy. In my last article for *The Shield* I wrote of reading the first and last sentences of a paragraph since they contain the idea the author wants to express, either presented or summarized. That same principle can be expanded and revised to help understand the contents of a book or course. Here are the simple steps to learn what you are expected to learn, and how to go about it.

- 1. Read the table of contents in your text. It is here that the author tells you not only what you are going to be expected to know but the order in which you should go about learning it. Material presented early in the book is usually a base for the work coming later. The salient points to be covered are generally itemized. If something does not appear in the contents, it probably does not carry as much weight in the mind of the author as things that do appear there.
- 2. Read your syllabus or class schedule. Your professor may wish to introduce material in a different order than that used in the text. He probably has a

- reason for doing that, and you might try to be a detective and discover his purpose. The simple question, "I notice you have skipped the section on widgets until later in the course. Should I disregard them at this time?", will elicit either a sarcastic comment about following his schedule or an explanation of the change of order. Most faculty will be happy to explain their reasons for diverging from the order of a text. That will allow you to better understand the approach to the material the professor is taking.
- 3. Determine what you want out of your study session. Experiments show that studying early in your active day results in longer retention of the material. Studying late at night is good only for very short term retention or refreshment of previously learned material. In addition, if you get it done early there is lots of time left to do other things. That approach to learning and productivity is strongly documented. The pharmaceutical giant, Eli Lilly, begins its work day at 7:30 a.m. People who work there say it was a bit hard to get used to at first, but after they were there a while they found they get more done and enjoy the freedom it lends to the evening.
- 4. Try to establish regular times and places of study. These should not be connected with other activities, ie, eating. When you regularly connect eating and studying then you will, in time, find that you can do neither comfortably without the other. The end result will either be an obese scholar or a thin dunce. (One can always find exceptions, but, speaking as one who is 50 pounds overweight and struggling, do not plan on being the exception.)
- 5. Find a comfortable place, free of distractions and confusion, to settle in and study for moderate lengths of time. Take breaks whenever you find your mind wandering. Go to your study place often and regularly, at the same hours. Habit will increase your readiness to concentrate. Practice closing out the world around you. We have all seen people who, when spoken to, seem to jump back to the present from some far off, disassociated place. Learn to disassociate yourself from your surroundings and escape into your world of consideration and reflection.
- 6. After you have digested the material you are trying to learn, think back on the points you read. Try to mentally reconstruct the outline of the material that you think the author or professor had in mind when he formed the chapter or lec-

- ture. Consider other approaches to the material and whether they would have made it clearer to you. Form your own hypothesis of the conclusions, and, if they differ from the prof, ask him about them in class or during his office hours. Be willing to risk error in the search for clarity. The fact that you have reasoned and thought about the material will not be wasted on the prof.
- 7. When you have studied, considered, reflected and weighed the material, leave it. Find relaxation and escape. Force yourself from the chair or terminal and get some physical activity. Your mind will be brighter and sharper for the effort. Most recent studies show that we require physical stimulation to keep our minds in good working order. The ancient Greeks were not wrong when they espoused the motto "mens sana in corpore sano," (Juvenal, Satire 10, 1,356), "a sound mind and a sound body," which we find inscribed above many gymnasium doors.
- 8. Do not overstudy. When you know the material, it is yours and cannot be forgotten. While we may, at times, have recall problems, we never have retention problems. All that you have truly learned, and much that you have not, will be with you forever. Stored in that marvelous computer that you carry inside your head. Do not erect blocks to recall through fear or exhaustion. Have confidence in your good efforts to study and face the next step with anticipation. Tests are, in reality, just an opportunity to demonstrate the efficiency of your personal computer which holds all the answers and can provide you with all the facts that you require to form conclusions and solutions for problems presented. All you need to have done is to load the data-base.





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Hoosier Stories

Struggles become Steve Tesich's subjects

Steve Tesich's 1982 novel, Summer Crossing, opens with a scene in which the protagonist, on the verge of winning the Indiana state wrestling championship, gives up and accepts defeat.

Twenty-eight years ago, Tesich actually lived that moment when he wrestled for East Chicago's Roosevelt High School.

"It's a horrible thing to quit, to actually be defeated by yourself," Tesich says now. "It's a horrendous precedent, if you allow it to become that."

Tesich instead made his defeat a precedent for change and struggled to become a writer. His credits now include the 1979 Academy Award-winning screenplay Breaking Away, about the annual Little 500 bicycle race at Indiana University, as well as screenplays for The World According to Garp, Eyewitness, Four Friends, Eleni and American Flyers.

Now he's back in the news with a new play, The Speed of Darkness, which premiered April 24 at the Goodman Theater in Chicago. Like his previous works, which are described as showing a concern for "the archetypes of the American experience," Tesich's most recent work explores corners of American life. The Speed of Darkness is set in a small town in South Dakota, where Joe, a successful building contractor, is living the good life until a Vietnam buddy stirs up memories he has tried to forget.

Much of Tesich's writing is about the struggle of taking responsibility for one's life or succumbing to authority, of hoping and caring or accepting limitations and giving up.

In Summer Crossing, for example, he describes the lives of three East Chicago High School graduates making the transition to manhood, each trying to avoid the stunted lives of their families and hometown.

Tesich immigrated to East Chicago from Yugoslavia at age 14. He got a partial wrestling scholarship to IU, where he competed in the Little 500 and graduated with honors in 1965 with a degree in Russian literature.

As he finished his master's degree at Columbia University, he felt compelled to write, to retrace his life and release the stored up memories of a young immigrant.

"It seems that just about everything I write somehow is associated with the people I met and the friends I made (in northwestern Indiana)," Tesich said.

He said residents of the Calumet Region of Indiana are very open and generous, and he admires their resilience.

"I can't write about people who play games because I don't know who they are. But people in the Region, you can rely on," he said.

He also found a submissiveness, "a hopelessness of beliefs, a feeling that you really can't change the big picture. What your life is about is taking care of the smaller picture—family, friends, the basketball team."

When Tesich was growing up, the area's economy was strong.

"The steel mills were part of the landscape, just like the Rockies (in Colorado)."

When the mills started closing, "the shock of it was too much for people. It further robbed them of the spirit that you can overcome anything," he said.

In Four Friends, a movie filmed in Whiting and East Chicago, recruiters from the military and the steel mills spoke to the high school seniors, just like they did at Tesich's East Chicago Roosevelt High in 1961.

"Those were our alternatives. There was nobody else up there telling us there were other directions. The school had become a farm team for the mills. The way the education system was tied into the corporate structure and the military was overwhelming. I remember being silently helpless and impotent, because I didn't have the courage to say anything or do anything."

But Tesich and his buddies realized they had some control over their lives. They read books and tested each other and got good enough grades to go on to college.

"It wasn't anything anybody told us to do. It just grew out of this thing—I don't want to end up there—that somehow you have to think of your life as moving, that life can be one way or another."

Tesich saw college as a postponement of the inevitable: working for the steel mills. But he began to enjoy thinking and reading and writing. His possibilities expanded; he took responsibility for

his life

His best friend went with him to IU and was terrified by the new world. Tesich, who had immigrated only five years earlier, tried to convince him that the first three months are the hardest. But his friend yearned for northwest Indiana, returned there and later died in Vietnam.

"He was brilliant," Tesich said. "He was a kid who had it in him . . . but there is something that holds people in place, even if they are smart."

That wrestling match 27 years ago lives on in Tesich's life and work.

"I quit once in my life, when I had a chance," he said. "Once, maybe, you can kid yourself, that it is an abnormal situation. But twice, that's a way of life . . . as hard as I tried, the truth wouldn't let me alone. It served me well, that defeat."

Christopher A. Brown Wabash '86 And the Good News Is . . .

I happened to be listening to one of the more popular radio stations in Indianapolis recently when the song "Dirty Laundry" by Don Henley came on the air. The tune is a criticism—and a fairly scathing one, at that-particularly of the news media and more generally of the public's appetite for bad news. As an example, Henley sings about a news anchor reporting an airplane disaster "with a gleam in her eye" and goes on to say, "It's interesting when people die " It's a morbid sentiment, but unfortunately, it happens to be an accurate representation of the American mind-set.

But then, I don't believe I have to persuade anyone knowledgeable about fraternities of that. Most of the press fraternities receive is not flattering, to say the least. A list of recent stories appearing in newspapers, magazines and other periodicals might read like a resume for a police inspector. There's no arguing the fact that individuals and chapters make mistakes; sometimes those mistakes are enormous and merit the attention of the public. Yet it is absurd that the image of Phi Kappa Psi or any other fraternity should be built on such bad news, instead of on the values up-

There is a proverb which declares that the best deeds are done in secret and seen by nobody. In many instances, I might agree. However, when it comes to the image that Chapters and Brothers of Phi Kappa Psi convey, it becomes necessary to do some discreet and tactful back-patting when projects are completed or goals are met.

Good publicity for the Chapter is not hard to find. Beneficial exposure can be found in something as big as a special charity project for a locally well-known organization, or something as small as helping out at an Easter Egg hunt. The actual job does not have to be mindbending (although for publicity's sake, the bigger, the better). Look around the campus and the surrounding town or city for opportunities to prove the worth of your Fraternity.

Another approach is to combat the popular image of fraternity directly. The National Interfraternity Council (NIC) is currently assembling a series of advertisements to be published in *The Chronicle of Higher Education* aimed at informing the public of policies on hazing, alcohol abuse, racism and sexual abuse. Of course, it isn't feasible for an individual Chapter to undertake such a

task. But it can make known to the campus and the community its positions on and what it is doing to solve those problems.

Brothers, we know that Phi Kappa Psi is more than the unfortunate actions that come to the public's mind when the word "fraternity" is mentioned. It is our responsibility to inform them that we are much more. And the best way to do that is to live up to the ideals of service to others given to us by the Founders and then to let people know about it . . . tactfully.

M. Erik Hume Tips For Fall Rush Purdue '85

Whether a Chapter is the largest fraternity on campus or one with only a few members, each must recognize that rush is the life blood of the Chapter. I have included tips that will help your Chapter or Colony.

A realistic vision during rush will help a smaller Chapter. Do not plan any other activities during rush to avoid spreading yourselves too thin. One-hundred percent brother participation is a requisite for excellence. Tension results from some brothers working harder than others.

Understand what benefits a small fraternity offers. Membership in a small fraternity presents an opportunity for immediate leadership and impact. Freshmen can directly affect and build a fraternity. Many motivated men feel that building and creating a fraternity is more rewarding than maintaining one.

Do not imitate large Chapters during rush. Small Chapters must be realistic. Rush functions with ninety men are more impressive than identical ones with fifteen men. Informal and personal rush with sensible spending will differentiate the Chapter without blowing the budget. Try positive incentives for brothers who get rushees to functions (e.g. dues deduction or public recognition).

Rush Chairmen at larger Chapters must be organized. The role of the chairman should be to facilitate functions with maximum attendance by brothers and rushees. The time commitment becomes burdensome when a chairman additionally attempts to rush and select the pledge class.

Prepare a rush worksheet that reviews important information. Every brother must know the following about the

Chapter: cost of membership; time requirements and length of pledgeship; Chapter gpa and scholarship programs; awards, hobbies and interests of brothers; National Fraternity and local Chapter history and the rush event schedule.

The organization of rush teams will assist in individual brother accountability. Teams are responsible for an assigned group of rushees. That responsibility includes phone solicitation, transportation and evaluation of the rushees. Rush teams of three to five members work well at events such as an open house. Match shy brothers with outgoing ones and new initiates with graduation candidates. Award the team that encouraged the most rushees to pledge.

Demand 100 percent attendance at functions (similar to smaller Chapters). Remember that there are three requirements that every Phi Psi undergraduate must honor: 1.) participation in rush; 2.) prompt payment of financial obligations and 3.) attendance at all Chapter meetings.

Good luck this fall during rush!

Required reading for members of Phi Kappa Psi should be The Book of Rituals and Ceremonies, "An Introduction to the Ritual," "What and Why is our Ritual," "Religion and the

Ritual" and "The Ritual of Silence."

Although the Headquarters has an abundance of knowledge to share with her chapters, you should seek additional information to use in conjunction with current fraternity operations. Possible resources available throughout your college community may include the Office of Student Life, Greek Advisors, various counselors, other fraternities and especially sororities. How about that—a justifiable reason to interact with your Greek counterparts.

Documenting all of the officer and committee activities will keep future members from repeating the same mistakes. Documentation will also allow the Chapter to evaluate and improve upon its existing programs. The use of committee reports and minutes will provide the Chapter with an accurate history of events and activities. Taking a step in the right direction when planning the course of the Chapter will not only reward the current body of members but many groups to come.

In early July 1863, Union and Confederate troops converged on a small town in Pennsylvania called Gettysburg. For three bloody days, the two armies engaged in a struggle that would later be recognized as the most important battle of the Civil War.

Recently, another war has broken out, and once again Gettysburg finds itself involved in the struggle. Yet this is not a war between brothers with rifles and cannons as the weapons. No, this war is being waged against Brothers, and the weapons being used are words such as hazing, alcohol abuse, racism and sexism. The Risk Management guidelines are a good measure of a Chapter's activities in this area. If your Chapter is following these guidelines, then you should be well defended against any anti-Greek attack.

Yet remaining in a defensive posture will not assure a victory. We must go on the offensive by promoting Greek life on our campuses. Make sure your Chapter is constructively involved in all areas of campus life. By participating in the campus community, not only will you be promoting Greek life, but you will also be improving the Chapter's relations with the faculty and administration. And these are the people we want as allies, not enemies.

Most of the responsibility rests in the hands of you, the undergraduates. While alumni support and guidance are crucial to the success of a Chapter, the undergraduates are the ones in the spotlight. You, the undergraduates, must make the choice. Will you uphold and defend the Fraternity just as the young men from the 20th Maine bravely defended Little Round Top at Gettysburg? Or will you sit back and let the opponents of Greek life continue their assault unopposed? The choice is yours.

Often, however, the undergraduates are unaware of or unclear about that role. No, it is not to lend his name for leasing Winnebagos on the road trip (an all too common misconception); rather, as the name suggests, it is to advise the chapter and its members in ALL areas of brotherhood, from morality and Fraternity to Chapter reports and house management.

Do you know your Chapter advisor? Have you met him and spoken with him, or is he just that older guy whom you bumped into once in your kitchen near the spam and felt embarrassed over not knowing each others' name. The role is a two-way street. Chapter advisors offer a


great deal. They have already faced your many challenges (whether active Brother, pledge or potential member) and usually can guide you and your Chapter well around any difficulties. Nobody becomes an advisor if he does not care (he could earn more money wrapping toothpicks for a living). He must be knowledgeable, patient and enthusiastic. Do not let these qualities go to waste.

Granted, an occasional advisor may come along who cares about the chapter like he cares about a mangled paper clip. You should get to know him and utilize his aid in all aspects of college as well, especially your academics and other dealings with the institution.

The moral: go to your advisors for advice (novel concept, huh?). These peo-

ple have volunteered to meet with the pledges and Brothers, to suggest ideas about Rush, Scholarship or Alumni Relations and to serve as the central liaison between the Chapter, the college administration and the community. Your advisor can help with the Ritual, Financial Operations and personal matters of dispute. He can do a hundred things or more, and he will want to do these things, if you let him. Go to him and show him that you understand his role and wish to reap its benefits. The rewards will be great. Oh, and remember. an ounce of thanks is worth a ton of free party t-shirts.



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
