



The Toughest Job Prepares for a New World in the '90s

capture in a relatively short space what it has been like to direct the Peace Corps of the United States during the revolutionary years of 1989 to 1991. Events of this period have been so extraordinary that the most appropriate description comes not from historians, but from singer/composer Paul Simon in lyrics proclaiming these

t is difficult to

"days of miracle and wonder."

Even in stodgy newspapers, the headlines have been breathtaking: "The Wall Tumbles;" "Leningrad to Again Become St.

Petersburg;" "Walesa Elected President;" "Albania — A Prison Nation Opens Its Gates;" "A New Flag Rises Proudly in Namibia." So rapidly and decidedly has the world changed, however, that the most stirring words fail to capture the drama that has engulfed nations and their peoples.

So too have these been years of dramatic change for Peace Corps. Just three years ago, none of us could have imagined reaching agreements with nations such as Namibia, which were so new that the documents we signed had to be written on plain paper because no official letterhead existed. Nor could we have envisioned sending volunteers to nations such as Hungary, where change came so rapidly that government officials hurriedly scratched through part of the nation's old name, "the People's Republic," on stationery left over from the previous regime.

As the winds of change have blown across the entire face of the world, Peace Corps has responded enthusiastically to requests for

assistance. In the first two years of this decade, we have reached out to 25 nations, bringing to nearly 90 the total number of countries in which Peace Corps Volunteers are currently working. In many of these nations, Peace Corps extended our country's first helping hand.

As might be expected, not all events during these tumultuous times have been supportive of our mission. Removing our Volunteers from harm's way — in the Philippines, Liberia, Yemen, Tunisia, Morocco, Pakistan, Mauritania and Tanzania - required us to suspend temporarily our programs in those countries. Fortunately, these rather dramatic and historic evacuations were all handled with no harm coming to any volunteers or staff, and we are now in the process of returning to all of these nations except Liberia. Having just returned from North Africa, I am reminded of the sincere and moving query from a Tunisian woman whose child was in a special education program: "When will the

American come back?" I am pleased that our answer is, "Soon."

While Peace Corps has always been charged through its Third Goal to bring knowledge of the world home to America, this goal has acquired new urgency in this, the last decade of the 20th century. Through our World Wise Schools program, which links volunteers serving overseas with elementary and secondary schools in this country, Peace Corps is promoting geographic and international knowledge, as well as a spirit of volunteerism. Likewise, through Fellows/USA, in partnership with public schools, businesses and universities, we are bringing knowledge volunteers gain overseas back to help with tough problems and challenges in this country.

As we look toward the remainder of this decade and this century, we know that the world will continue to change rapidly and dramatically. We know that the majority of people seeking Peace Corps' help will soon live in the world's great urban areas, rather than in the small towns and villages in which our volunteers have served so well. We know that increasing demands for Peace Corps will put strains on our resources. Because we are planning for the future, and because we have implemented a new Integrated Planning and Budget System (IBPS), a new Programming and Training System (PATS), and a new system of Institutional Memory (IM), we hope to be ready for all of these changes.

In summary, getting Peace Corps ready for the 1990s has meant getting ready to respond to an ever increasing number of countries that want to participate in the great Peace Corps partnership. It has meant getting ready for a new century by bringing the knowledge our volunteers gain overseas back to the United States. It has meant keeping the agency shipshape and ready to serve.

Being director of the Peace Corps during these years of revolution has been an exhilarating challenge. It has been a period of reinvigoration and growth — a renaissance of the volunteer spirit. As Peace Corps' 30th anniversary year comes to a close, we look back on the past with pride, but we are focusing our energies on the future — to new challenges at home and abroad; to reaching and passing the 10,000 volunteer goal set by Congress; to making new friends in all corners of the world. After all, that is what Peace Corps has always been about — the future.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 6

I work for the Institute of Foreign Languages in Ulaanbaatar, the capital of Mongolia, teaching English language courses. Today, we were invited to a celebration. The celebration began with a wrestling exhibition — a Mongolian wrestling exhibition, which is a bit different from the wrestling practiced in America. The main objective is to get your opponent on the floor from a stand-up position. Just before a match begins the contestants imitate the flight of an imaginary and legendary bird. Following the match, the winner repeats this "dance."

The celebration ended with a trip to the countryside for traditional Mongolian khorhog: a mixture of goat meat, water, onions and salt layered alternately with scalding hot rocks in a large metal container - the container functions like a pressure cooker. I found the "barbecue" delicious.

Before we left, we also drank plenty of airag, a drink made from fermented mare's milk. Airag tastes a little like buttermilk champagne - a little.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 8

This morning I taught two classes at the Institute. The first class was a group of teachers from Hovsgol, a city in the northwest of Mongolia. Previously, they were Russian language teachers, but now they have been assigned to study English for a year in order to teach English in the secondary schools in Hovsgol next year. My second class was a first-level section of English students who are studying to be English language instructors.

Virtually everyone in this country seems to want to learn English. Sometimes it can be rather difficult to develop meaningful friendships, simply because some Mongolians see Americans and British as keys to English language instruction and perhaps Western currency.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 9

I taught the same classes at the Institute this morning as I did yesterday. Following my classes, I had a meeting with Batnafch, the head of the English Department. The Foreign Language Institute, as such, has existed for only three years. Formerly it was the Russian Language Institute dedicated to Russian language instruction exclusively. Because the English department is so young, curriculum development and departmental objectives have yet to be clearly defined; some fourth and fifth level courses are being taught for the first time this year. Books are a major problem, as barely enough texts are available for the instructors; none are readily available for the students.

Following the meeting, I went shopping for rations. Mongolia is currently on a very rigid rationing of many food-stuffs: meat, flour, butter, sugar, cooking oil, tea, rice and vodka. This time cooking oil and tea were

> available for the first time in many months. Since I arrived in July, many items have disappeared from store shelves, while other items have suddenly appeared,

only to be gone within minutes of being put on the shelves.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 10

This afternoon Erdenhoyig came to visit. He was very excited because he had found Mongolian beer in a Mongolian store — a rare find these days - and he wanted to share it with me. Previously, Mongolia had depended on the Soviet Union for spare parts in all of its factories. Now that the Soviet Union is having its own difficulties and ties with that country are changing, many factories, including beer factories, are closing as equipment breaks down. There is some worry that even the heating and electric plants may shut down or reduce output for

lack of spare parts -a frightening thought to say the least. Highs in January are supposed to average minus two degrees Fahrenheit.

This evening, Erdenhoyig and I went to the Ulaanbaatar Hotel for dinner. The doorman didn't want to let Erdenhoyig in at the front door, as Mongolians are supposed to enter from a side entrance and dine in a separate facility. Concealing my anger as best as possible, I told the doorman - in Mongolian - that he was my friend, and he was to

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 11

After classes, I went to check my mail, wandered around a fairly new "mall" and went home for

lunch. Usually I eat at the Institute's cafe, but today the power had gone out at the Institute, so I made some soup at my apartment.

My apartment is located in the center of town and has two rooms and a kitchen. So far, the heat and hot water have been regular. Most people in Ulaanbaatar live in apartment blocks; a sizeable minority live in gers on the outskirts of town. A ger is a round felt tent that the Mongolians have used for centuries. Currently, no one owns private homes or apartments, but privatization of housing will supposedly begin soon.

Today was my mother's birthday, so this afternoon I called home for the first time since I've been here. Phoning the States can be a tricky proposition; sometimes connections are terrible, and the wait at the post office for the connection to be made can take hours. Most homes in Mongolia, including mine, have private phones, but telecommunication options in general are quite poor. I reached my parents by phone at about six in the morning, their time. How good it was to hear familiar voices and tell my mother "happy birthday" in person! As I walked home, I realized how much we take for granted in America. Never before have I considered a telephone call a luxury.

If my experience is any indication, a volunteer's life is not always romantic and packed with adventure. Often I spend my days poring over books, planning lessons and shopping. For me, the adventure is simply being here: learning the language, meeting friends, teaching and understanding a new culture - not as a privileged tourist, but as a resident of Mongolia.

Peace Corps Dial

eace Corps — the toughest job you'll ever love drifts through my mind as I wake up with the roosters at 5:30 a.m. on a chilly Honduran morning. I open my wood shutters letting the sun flow into my adobe house and onto my dirt floor. I fire up my kerosene stove to put water to boil — a daily ritual as all water here must be boiled before drinking.

I'm a Peace Corps volunteer serving in a small village in the rugged mountains of southeast Honduras near the El Salvador

border. Honduras is the poorest country in Central America with an average yearly income of \$200 U.S. Even though this is the tropics, I'm up more that 6,400 feet, so it's windy and cold in the mornings and blistering hot during the day. It's September now, the dry season is almost over, and soon the rains will come. Everyone is waiting for the rains so they can plant their corn and beans for another year's food. I'm waiting for the rains as well; I'm a hillside Agriculture Extensionist, and my job is basically soil conservation and organic soil improvements.

Today, I'm heading to Cofradia, a small, isolated community of less than 100 people even higher in the mountains. After a bowl of lumpy oatmeal and hard corn bread, I start up the winding trail. I'll be meeting with a small group I've formed there, and we'll be talking about *barreras vivas* (live barriers) today. I carry a small bag of the seeds with me that I got from Recursos Naturales, the

Honduran natural resources station in the city. We work closely together as a team — they provide support, and I do the actual field work. We both have the same goal: to stop the devastating slash-and-burn agriculture the campesino farmers practice by providing an alternative, sustainable system with fields protected by soil conservation.

I reach a small outcropping and pause to catch my breath. I look back over the valley and see a fire raging off in the distance. The campesinos burn thousands of acres of precious forests every year. The population pressure doesn't allow the land to

regenerate, and hundreds of acres are utterly destroyed and will grow no more corn. My farmers do not burn their fields anymore.

Together, we've seen the

benefits of incorporating the debris from a cleared field. By doing so, we add nutrients and compost to the soil, which improves their corn yields. But most importantly, we dig hundreds of feet of trenches to contain the water flow down the mountain, which keeps the soil and nutrients in place. Some of my farmers are growing corn and sorghum on slopes of more than 50 percent.

I reach the thatched-roof mud hut of my friend Don Francisco, and I whistle quickly to get his attention from within. There are no doorbells and sometimes no doors, and whistling is a way of announcing yourself.

"Hola," he says, stepping out and donning his straw hat. "Que vamos a hacer hoy?"

"We're going to plant zacate limon today," I answer in Spanish. Before my service, Peace Corps trained me in language and culture. I came in with very little Spanish ability; now I can carry on extended conversations with anyone. My class today will be

in Spanish because no one here in Cofradia speaks English.

We reach the plot, and as everyone arrives, we go about learning live barriers. I usually start off by asking a few questions to get the ball rolling. Then for a half hour or so, they talk and come to conclusions on their own. We decide where we want the barrier and how it is used. I explain that it is used just like a dead barrier — fallen logs, rock walls, etc. — except that it doesn't have to be built up periodically like dead barriers when soil runoff reaches the top of the structure. The plants continue to grow higher than the piling up soil, and eventually we have a flat spot like a terrace behind the row of plants.

Then we spend several hours in the hot tropical sun planting the seeds along the contour of the hillside with crude wooden tools. By 3:00, it's time for me to head home as it's a long walk and I'm already tired. Don Francisco walks part of the way with me, and we talk of Honduras, the way it used to be and about things I don't know yet.


Peace Corps is a two way street - I learn just as much from my service here as I hope they do from me. I've only been here a year, but I feel as if it is part of my home. I'm only one person in a small cluster of communities not much impact on a national level. I doubt I'll make the evening news tonight, but as I eat a hearty meal of beans and tortillas and eggs and sit down at my table to write a letter or two before bed, I feel satisfied. I will have made a difference in this small corner of the world, and I will have made friends for life. And when I go back, I'll be able to share my experiences with people here so they can better appreciate and understand the diversity and lifestyles of other countries and cultures.

Schlegel takes the helm at University of San Francisco

ven as the Fraternity prepares to converge on San Francisco for the 66th Grand Arch Council this summer, that city has accepted one of our own to lead students into the future.



Phi Kappa Psi is certainly proud of her Bay Area leader in higher education — John P. Schlegel, S.J., Creighton '79, new president of the University of San Francisco.

An expert in international and comparative politics, the Oxford-educated Schlegel

has served in both faculty and administrative positions at John Carroll University of Cleveland, Ohio, and three other Jesuit universities — Creighton, Rockhurst and Marquette. He is a career teacher and scholar, equally at home in the classroom or conducting field research. He has published two books and numerous articles on international relations and third-world development.

Schlegel replaced the Rev. John Lo Schiavo, USF's president for the past 14 years.

As president, Schlegel sets his number one goal on "continuing USF's progress toward becoming a model Jesuit urban educational experience — a truly global institution that takes full advantage of San Francisco's position as gateway to the Pacific Rim.

"I plan to concentrate on the business of education," he said, and leave the fund raising to other able hands.

Melvin Swig, chairman of the University of San Francisco Board of Trustees, said, "We are extremely excited about Father Schlegel's appointment. He's a proven leader, a highly-regarded academician and the strong administrator USF needs to help lead us into the 1990s."

In its 1992 guide to American colleges, U.S. News & World Report describes the challenges facing Schlegel and other leaders in higher education.

"This is not the most opportune moment to be an Amderican college president," the article stated. "In fact, so encyclopedic are the financial, ethical, legal, governmental, political, public relations and, on occasion, the personal problems distracting the leaders of higher education that the contents of their in-baskets could be mistaken for casebooks in Advanced Crisis Management."

"You spend so much time putting out fires or dealing with rumors that you lose both your perspective and concentration on the big issues," lamented Robert Corrigan, president of San Francisco State prominent research institutions; the controversy over "intellectual intimidation" by those who fancy themselves "politically correct"; the federation legislation that requires colleges and universities to compile and make public data on campus crime and graduation rates of student-athletes; and the complaints that professors devote too much time to research and too little time to their classrooms.

Broader challenges facing the leaders in higher education include balancing spiraling operating costs with lower revenues by raising tuition; answering the demands for diversity, both in the student body and in the faculty; attracting outstanding faculty to a profession that is more and more losing its gilded edge; and anticipating the future to prepare students for that which will be.

In keeping with national trends, Schlegel said enhancing faculty-administration relations and further diversifying USF's student body are his initial priorities.

The University of San Francisco's hilltop campus is on Fulton Street between Parker and Masonic near Golden Gate Park

Academic representatives from more

than 225 national and international universities, including Oxford University where Schlegel received his doctorate, attended his inauguration on October 26.

Attendees included the Most Reverend John R. Quinn, Archbishop of San Francisco and the Most Reverend Carlos Sevilla, S.J., Auxiliary Bishop; the Very Reverend Paul Belcher, S.J., provincial of the Jesuits in California; Rabbi Mark Schiftan, associate

rabbi of Temple Emanu-El; and former San Francisco Mayor Art Agnos.

Schlegel has served Phi Kappa Psi as the Executive Council's Coordinator of Faculty Advisors and on the Executive Board Nominating Committee.

hi Kappa Psi's government is unique in the interfraternity world in that undergraduates hold a majority among voting members of the Executive Council. This may not seem remarkable at first blush, but when one considers the responsibility that is placed in their hands, it is clear that Phi Kappa Psi places great trust in the hands of her undergraduates.

Since 1886, Archons have represented the several Districts of the Fraternity. The Archons for 1991-1993 are:

JEFFREY H. MORGAN, Rhode Island '91, represents District I. Jeff is a junior at URI, majoring in secondary education with an eye toward eventually attending law school or entering government service. A member of the newly reorganized Rhode Island Beta Chapter, Jeff has served as alumni relations chairman, fraternity educator and vice president as well as being involved in the URI Blood Drive and orchestrating the chapter's Bounce-a-Thon philanthropy.

"I see my role as an Archon involving my skills as a good communicator and motivator. I have studied the Fraternity and believe I have good ideas on chapter management, extension and risk management, among other topics. Really, the best talent I bring to the job is my organizational skill."

District I comprises 16 chapters and one colony ranging from Massachusetts south to Pennsylvania.

DANIEL J. ISAAC, Akron '87, is Archon of District II, which comprises 17 chapters and one colony centered around the birthplace of Phi Psi in Western Pennsylvania. Dan is a fifth-year senior majoring in secondary education with his eye on attending law school and entering politics. Dan has served Ohio Iota as president, fraternity educator and as chairman of the social, philanthropy and alumni/PR committees. He also has been involved with IFC as chief justice of the judicial board and with student government. Dan's brother, Matthew, is a 1990 initiate of Ohio Iota.

"I feel it is my job to be educated on the issues of our Fraternity and the interfraternity world. I feel that I bring an objective view of the undergraduate position. I also bring a strong desire to advance Phi Kappa Psi to the greatest heights possible."

JOSEPH S. LOCKETT, Miami '90, represents District III. Joe is a junior at Miami University majoring in finance and decision sciences. Upon graduation, he hopes to enter a sales position, eventually obtaining a position as a stockbroker. For Ohio Lambda, Joe has served as rush chairman, assistant treasurer, housing corporation representative and house manager. On campus, he is involved in fund raising for the Greek Week Committee.

"I hope to bring clear, unbiased judgment to the Executive Council. When making decisions, I will attempt to represent the views of undergraduates and those chapters in my district in all discussions."

The Phi Psi from Lockerbie Street

A Story that Hasn't Ended

he great Hoosier poet, James Whitcomb Riley, penned the words in the poem below in the summer of 1880. His inspiration was, of course, the lovely little street in Indianapolis. Perhaps it is by design that our national headquarters is on this very street, right next door to the beautiful Victorian preservation that was Mr. Riley's home

from 1893 until his death in 1916. You see, James Whitcomb Riley, who gave America such treasures as When the Frost is on the Punkin, Little Orphant Annie and The Raggedy Man, was a member of Phi Kappa Psi. He was inducted as an honorary member of the Indiana Alpha Chapter at DePauw University (then called Asbury College) on March 3, 1883. In fact, a handsome plaque commemorating his membership is on display in his Lockerbie Street home.

This would be an interesting story if it ended here, but there is more. Today, there exists a remarkable connection between Mr. Riley and the Fraternity, a connection that goes far beyond the fact that we are neighbors on Lockerbie Street.

On the evening of July 22, 1916, James Whitcomb Riley died in the Lockerbie Street home that he loved so. It was a Saturday, and his funeral was held the following Tuesday. He was only a poet; he held no office; yet, such was the affection in which he was held that his body lay in state in the rotunda of the Indiana Capitol, and over 30,000 people filed past to say farewell. Just after the services, a group of his friends and admirers met to decide upon a fitting memorial to him. They discussed several alternatives — statues, arches and obelisks — but, fortunately, decided that Riley's memorial ought to be more than another roost for the pigeons. Then, someone at those early meetings reminded the others that James Whitcomb Riley had composed some of the most

compelling and enduring poetry for children ever written. And it was the realization that led his friends and admirers to the decision to build, as his memorial, a hospital for children. They officially organized themselves as the James Whitcomb Riley Memorial Association on April 9, 1921. The Association raised the money, almost \$2 million initially, in a statewide campaign; built the hospital; and dedicated in on October 7, 1924, the 75th anniversary of Riley's birth. Since that day almost 70 years ago, the Riley Memorial Association has


continued to raise funds (over \$100 million) to support the hospital's growth and development. Today, the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children is one of the nation's leading centers for advanced pediatric medicine in the fields of clinical care, education and research. The hospital has pioneered numerous advances in pediatrics and is the only children's hospital in America that operates entirely on a referral basis, treating children whose illnesses and injuries are too serious for local care.

The Association also operates Camp James Whitcomb Riley for Youth with Physical Disabilities. Opened in 1955 on 2,300 acres of woods and lakes, it is today the country's largest and most advanced outdoor camp for the disabled.

Finally, the Association owns and maintains the house at 528 Lockerbie Street.

Now, here's the clincher...

You see, a Phi Psi, yours truly, has, since 1975, been privileged to serve as president of the Riley Memorial Association, the third person to hold this office since 1921. Thus, our Fraternity, our honorary Brother James Whitcomb Riley, and the great and beneficial memorials to him remain intertwined. Is this all a coincidence? Maybe... and then again, maybe not.

EDWARD W. BOEHM JR., Chicago '33, Inverness, Ill., Oct. 6, 1991. He was president of E.W. Boehm Co., which for many years was the Chicago distributor for A.B. Dick duplicating products. He later was owner and operator of Blakely's Department Store in Taylorville, Ill. He was past president of Sales Marketing Executives Club of Chicago and Rotary One of Chicago and served on the boards of directors for ITT/Chicago, Kent College of Law, Oak Brook National Bank and was on the advisory board of the Certified Professional Secretaries Association.

Kansas Alpha's Grand Re-Opening

On October 19, 1991, the Kansas Alpha Chapter dedicated its recently renovated and greatly expanded chapter house in Lawrence, Kansas. The dedication ceremony was the culmination of over six years of fund raising, architectural planning and construction.

Hundreds of alumni and family returned to Lawrence for Homecoming and a tour of the beautiful new facility. While renewing old ties, the brothers were amazed at the transformation of the house. In addition to completely redoing the previous chapter house, an additional two-story wing was added, connected to the existing structure by a one-story dining room and gathering hall, which opens onto an enclosed patio.

The completed facility is approximately 32,000 square feet in area and is the largest fraternity structure at the University of Kansas. The house is now home to 88 undergraduates, housed in 44 two-man studying rooms. The goal of the project planners was to end the cramped living of four men per room, in order to provide a better and safer place to live and study.

In addition to the new dining room, the expanded house includes a state of the art kitchen, a computer room and two libraries. In place of the old dining room, now are study rooms for various disciplines such as journalism, art and engineering. The basement remodeling also includes an office for chapter officers, a bicycle storage room, a weight room and laundry room. Other amenities include a University computer connection and telephone connection for each occupant as well as parking for everyone. A complete fire alarm and sprinkler system throughout the house ensures the safety of the men. After spending the past year in University apartments, the undergraduate chapter was thrilled to move into this beautiful facility.

At the dedication ceremony, Larry Winn Jr., Kansas '38, a former United States Congressman and one of the driving forces of the project from its inception, spoke of the incredible effort and generosity that went into completing the fraternity house. Congressman Winn acknowledged the donations or pledges from 430 Kansas Alpha alumni. He singled out for special recognition the outstanding generosity of four special brothers — Clarence W. Coleman, Kansas '29, \$500,000, John P. Ward II, Kansas '59, \$500,000, Paul K.



Brooker, Kansas '28, \$400,000, and William H. Ellis, Kansas '42, \$200,000. In addition to his generosity, John Ward received recognition for his years of fund raising and involvement in the planning and construction as one of the project managers, along with Congressman Winn. Ward, Winn and former national President John K. Boyd III, Kansas '59, spearheaded the years of fund raising necessary to complete this \$2.4 million project.

Special recognition was given to Richard A. Davenport, Kansas '56, for his interior design work, which transformed the house into a show-case, and James Kerwin, Iowa '64, a Kansas City restaurateur who assisted in designing the new kitchen. Thanks were also extended to the Kansas Alpha Endowment Association and House Corporation members for their years of work, and the Phi Psi Mothers Club, a valuable organization that contributed time and money to making the project and the dedication ceremony a reality. In attendance was Phi Psi Executive Director Terry Harper, Oklahoma State '85, who called the new chapter house the most beautiful in Phi Psi.

Congressman Winn noted that although Kansas Alpha has reached its goal by providing for the undergraduate members a safe environment, conducive to personal health and scholastic achievement for now and into the 21st century, he stated that the project was not completely done. There remains an outstanding bank loan of \$350,000, which was necessary to complete construction and

to furnish the new house. Continued and additional financial support from Kansas Alphans is needed. There were many alumni who have not yet been heard from, Winn said. The Kansas Alpha Endowment Association and House Corporation remain dedicated to collecting the unpaid pledges and further raising funds to retire the bank loan and establish a permanent maintenance and scholarship fund to ensure the long term protection of the property and the continuation of the long and illustrious history of Kansas Alpha.

Founded December 18, 1891, in the same year as Stanford University, Cal Beta was colonized by brothers from California Alpha at the University of the Pacific. Unfortunately, the exodus of brothers from the older university signaled the death of the chapter there.

Throughout its 100 year history, Cal Beta has had its ups and downs. In the early 1970s, the Phi Psi house, a huge wooden structure overlooking the Stanford campus, was deeded back to the University due to the chapter's financial and membership problems. Cal Beta was inactive for a short time, then it was revived through the efforts of Carlos Hernandez, **Stanford '78**, and others.

In light of the chapter's extensive history, it seemed only fitting that the centennial anniversary be marked



East Carolina Chartering

n October 26, 1991, the culmination of two and a half years of hard work and determination came to an end as the men of North Carolina Beta received their charter and became part of the proud heritage of Phi Kappa Psi.

The History of East Carolina University

East Carolina University, North Carolina's third largest institution of higher learning, was founded in 1907 as a state supported teacher training school before becoming a liberal arts college in 1941. More than 16,500 students at East Carolina have a total of 104 program tracks that offer bachelor's degrees, 87 in master's degrees, six in doctoral work in basic medical science and one doctoral program in the School of Education. With 85 buildings on a 460-acre campus, the school has physical assets over \$350 million.

The History of North Carolina Beta

The history of North Carolina Beta is one that reads like a success story. It all began in February 1989, when a group of men came together to form a fraternity. A name for this fraternity was not yet known, until one of the members noticed an advertisement in the school newspaper that asked for men interested in starting a Phi Kappa Psi chapter at East Carolina University. Transfer student Thomas Herdelin, **Temple '87**, who placed the advertisement, was contacted by the group of men, and so began the making of North Carolina Beta at East Carolina.

Our colony status was obtained on April 12, 1989, and we were recognized as a fraternity on campus. The original 17 members set

While other Greek organizations settled down from member recruitment, North Carolina Beta Colony continued to bring in strong members throughout the school year. For four consecutive semesters, we have maintained the highest GPA on campus for a Greek organization. We have contributed to various charity organizations through car washes and our annual "Kool Aid" party, which marks our Founders Day.

A Weekend To Be Remembered!

On October 24, 36 candidates for initiation were given the national colony exam. The test was administered by Executive Director Terry Harper, Oklahoma State '85, Director of Chapter Services Ron Richard, Minnesota '84, and Director of Publications John Mead, Tennessee '87.

The next afternoon, the colony received the national officers and guests in the university student center. With honored guests such as Fraternity President Robert Lazzell, West Virginia '42, and Mrs. Lazzell, Vice President J. Smith Harrison Jr., South Carolina '73, Mystagogue Kent Owen, Indiana '58, "Mr. Phi Psi" Dud Daniel, Arizona '47, Assistant Chaplain Bob Bird, West Virginia '73, and Director of Planning John D. Watt III, Duke '75, a festive time was had by all. Also joining us were Chapter Advisor Larry Obsorne, Duke '73, and Faculty Don Guy, Chicago '58.

The following morning, 36 men arrived in black tie for the installation ceremony at Jarvis Memorial Church. We offer special thanks to the brothers who travelled far to participate in the ceremony: Thomas

I believe that the quality of the undergraduate experience is the payback to the individual member and the Fraternity through enthusiasm or guilt. High quality fraternity image demands high standards of student performance coupled with the resources to provide leadership training and suitable incentive rewards. These must motivate young brothers to achieve their greatest potential as scholars and leaders while in school and later in their life's work and in society, thus serving the needs of all members of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity.

We are off to a good start in getting ready for the 21st century, and we still have a long, tough road ahead. It can be a fun experience for all if we but continue willingly to meet the challenges.



Reunion of '50s Phi Psis Proves There Is Much to Life After College



hat was life like back in the '50s? Bobby sox, Mr. B. collars, cashmere sweaters and light gray flannel suits. Frankie (Laine or Sinatra), 3-D movies, Ike and Mamie, geodesic domes, drive-ins, big bands, Jack Kerouac, Senator Mc-Carthy, Elvis, the Crew Cuts, Steve Allen, Marlon Brando and aluminum foil Christmas trees. Sputnik, Inchon, Spike Jones, Marilyn (the real dual Hollywoods?), Milton Berle and Your Hit Parade. Yes, it really was the Fabulous Fifties, but we just didn't know it at the time. New York Theta RIT Enrolls in Phi Psi

n April 25, New York Theta Colony at the Rochester Institute of Technology graciously accepted Phi Kappa Psi's greatest honor, the granting of the Fraternity's charter. Two years of hard work and dedication culminated with the initiation of 56 new Phi Psi brothers who will wear the badge of the Fraternity with reverence and dignity.

The installation weekend began on Thursday, April 23, with Director of Chapter Services Ron Richard, Minnesota '84, administering the national colony examination. The colony as a whole displayed its confidence and excitement by performing exceptionally well on the exam.

Friday marked the arrival of distinguished guests from the National Fraternity as well as parents, alumni and faculty. All of the guests met at a reception in the Fireside Lounge in the Student-Alumni Union Building. It was enjoyable to meet all of the distinguished officers of the Fraternity and talk with them on a more personal level.

The long-awaited day finally came on Saturday, April 25. The Brighton Presbyterian Church graciously offered its facilities to accommodate the initiation ceremony. All of the brothers were awed by the Ritual, in which we have waited so long to take part. It was gratifying finally

to be a part of the traditions of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity.

That evening, the celebration began. The Installation Banquet was held at the Holidome in Henrietta. The presence of Fraternity President Robert E. Lazzell, West Virginia '42; Secretary David L. Woodrum, West Virginia '61; Mystagogue Kent C. Owen, Indiana '58; and Executive Director Emeritus Dud Daniel, Arizona '47, was the highlight of the evening as the brothers met the men who uphold the beloved traditions of Phi Kappa Psi.

Our faculty advisors, Dr. Timothy Engstrom and Dr. John Helmuth, have inspired our intellect, helping us to have one of the highest grade point averages of all Greek organizations

on campus. Finally, not enough praise can be given for the support, inspiration and dedication that Chapter Advisor Chet Osadchey, Cornell '85, has offered to the chapter. We would like to give a very well earned thank you to all who have supported New York Theta throughout its quest to attain its charter.

The History of Rochester Institute of Technology

RIT was founded in 1829 as the Athenaeum by such revered men as the founder of the city, Nathaniel Rochester. It was started by area businessmen, looking to spur cultural activity in the city. The Athenaeum was a growing association, merging with several other organizations, including the Mechanics Institute. The Mechanics Institute was started by Henry Lomb (of the Bausch & Lomb optical company) in 1885 to fill the void for technical education and to attract many prominent men to the growing city.

In 1891, the two organizations merged to form the Rochester Athenaeum and Mechanics Institute. The school's success continued to build with land and money donations from such wealthy area businessmen as George Eastman of Eastman-Kodak.

Today, Rochester Institute of Technology occupies 1,300 acres in suburban Rochester, the third largest city in New York. The Institute offers over 200 different program for 11,000 undergraduate and 1,500 graduate students. RIT also houses programs for the School of American Craftsmen and The National Technical Institute for the Deaf.

The co-operative education program is the fourth oldest and fifth largest in the world that offers work experience for more than 3,000 students with over 1,300 firms coast to coast and abroad.

RIT has provided quality, careeroriented programs for over 160 years. It is a university held in high esteem for graduating men and women that make an extremely positive impact on society in many ways.

SWGP Robert Lazzell, West Virginia '42, presents the chapter charter for New York Theta to President Nate Rochester King, Institute of Technology '92. The chapter, born out of a local society called the League of Knights, was installed on April 25, 1992.



History of the New York Theta Colony

On March 17, 1990, Phi Kappa Psi established a colony of dedicated men whose goal was to become the New York Theta Chapter at RIT. However, this goal was not a new concept for these men. Instead, the idea had been conceived a year and a half prior to the colonization in the form of a small social group called the League of Knights.

The League of Knights was founded primarily to satisfy the needs of these men that could not be met by the fraternities already on the RIT campus. They were in search of a fraternity that would uphold their morals and ideals, allow them to maintain their high academic standards, be socially and athletically active, and to be philanthropically involved in the Rochester community. The League of Knights began to interview several national fraternities in January 1990. The group was unanimous in its choice of Phi Kappa Psi because of its reputation as a gentleman's fraternity and its espousal of high ideals similar to those of the League of Knights. The L.O.K. became a colony of Phi Kappa Psi in the spring of 1990, but to the new colony, this was only one step toward the ultimate goal.

During the next two years, the colony took the RIT campus with vigor and enthusiasm. The group prospered, and Phi Kappa Psi recruited its first pledges in the fall of 1990 and has been pledging diversely talented men ever since. The academic standards have never fallen as Phi Kappa Psi remains at the top scholastically. The

Rochester community has been affected by the Fraternity's active social work repeatedly in the past. Phi Kappa Psi has taken an active part of the RIT campus and is well known by the independents as well as the Greeks.

Early in 1992, the colony began to take its last steps toward becoming a chapter. An ad hoc committee was appointed, and the petition was written and sent to the Fraternity Headquarters. On March 28, 1992, the Executive Council voted unanimously that New York Theta would be the newest addition to the Fraternity's 140-year tradition of excellence. As we look ahead to the future, the brothers see many challenges that are ready to be met with the same vigor that has brought them where they are today.

PETER BOYD WELLS JR., **Texas '33**. Beaumont, Texas, Sept. 16, 1991. He graduated from Texas in 1936 and from Harvard Law School in 1940. He was a

decorated veteran of World War II, reaching the rank of major in the Army. Afterwards, he practiced law in Beaumont where he formed and headed a prominent and highly respected firm. Widely travelled, he was very active in legal, civic and historical organizations. His brothers Tom and John and several cousins were also initiates of Texas Alpha.

EARL F. ARNETT, **Texas '34**, Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 14, 1992. He was retired from the General Electric Co. and the Department of Aging for the State of Ohio. He was active in the Columbus Alumni Association and was a member of the Indianola Presbyterian Church.

PAUL K. BRESEE, **Illinois '34**. Champaign, Ill., April 21, 1992. A longtime business leader and supporter of both the Univer-

sity of Illinois and the Illinois Delta Chapter, he and his brother were known as the "Voice of the Illini" during their 40 years as public address announcers for football and basketball games. He was instrumental in establishing Illinois Delta's C.F. "Dab" Williams Fund and was active in house corporation activities. Also, he served Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity as national president, having joined the organization when it was an agricultural honor society, before it became a general fraternity.

JOHN W. DREYER, Wittenberg '35, Fort Collins, Colo., Dec. 3, 1991. He was a chief petty officer in the Navy during World War II, serving in the Solomon Islands. After attending the University of Illinois, he taught social studies in Elgin, Ill., until his retirement in 1976.

EDWARD C. STRIEBICH JR., Allegheny '36, Daphne, Ala., Dec. 20, 1991. He graduated from Allegheny College in 1939. He lived in Daphne since his retirement from Chevron Oil Corp. in 1976.

ELLIS A. WUNSCH, Michigan '37, Traverse City, Mich., Dec. 25, 1991. He was a co-founder of Northwestern Michigan College in 1951. In 1962, he earned his doctorate in English literature from the University of Michigan. He was an associate professor at Michigan when he retired in 1980.

L. GORDON LEECH JR., Washington & Jefferson '38, Mayo, Md., Nov. 8, 1991. A Presbyterian minister, he served churches throughout Indiana for 35 years, including 15 years at First Meridian Heights Presbyterian Church in Indianapolis. Upon his retirement, he served as minister of visitation for First Presbyterian Church in Annapolis, Md.

C. SAMUEL DALEY, Gettysburg '40, Beverly Hills, Fla., Nov. 21, 1991. He retired from the American Water Works Service Corporation in Florida after 38 years of service as a financial advisor and certified public accountant. He was an active member of several community groups, including the Masons, the Elks and the Rotary Club.

FRANK EDWIN SIMS, Kansas '42, Tulsa, Okla., Jan. 19, 1992. He was president of Ortiz Mines, Inc., a New Mexico gold mining operation, and a former B-17 pilot in World War II. He was a noted petroleum engineer with expertise in secondary recovery of crude oil, working throughout the U.S. and in South America. He and his

wife of 42 years, Lois Anne, a member of Delta Delta Delta and Phi Beta Kappa from the University of Tulsa, were killed instantly when their car struck a concrete pillar beneath an expressway overpass.

CHARLES E. WILLIAMS, Northwestern '44, Houston, Texas, Dec. 12, 1991. He was a retired grocer and restaurateur. He was a veteran of World War II in the Navy, a member of the Masonic Lodge, Terre Haute Scottish Rite and the Bloomfield VFW.

WALTER F. TITUS, Amherst '46, Schenectady, N.Y., June 5, 1991. After earning his doctorate in physics from Harvard, he worked as a physicist for the National Bureau of Standards and taught the same subject at Dartmouth College and Union College, where he chaired the physics department from 1980 to 1984. He also dabbled in restoring bikes and in building model railroads.

JAMES I. MICHAEL, Lafayette '47, Houston, Texas, Jan. 31, 1992. He was a graduate of Lafayette College and the University of Colorado School of Law. He worked with Shell Oil Company for over 30 years. He was a combat veteran of World War II, earning the Bronze Star and the Combat Infantry Badge.

THOMAS W. LYMAN JR., Illinois 48, Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 6, 1992. Achieving fame as a model in the 1950s and 1960s as the epitome of a gentleman with his debonair deportment, he was frequently featured in advertisements in magazines such as *Playboy*. But his true calling was in art. After receiving his doctorate from Chicago, he joined the faculty at Emory University in Atlanta. In his 25 years at Emory, he taught thousands of students and took hundreds of them to Europe to study.

ROBERT W. THEOBALD, **Purdue '48**, Sarasota, Fla., April 2, 1992. He owned Theobald Manufacturing Co. in Naperville, Ill., and Automated Systems in Sarasota. He retired from Dow Chemical and retired as president of Fairmont Chemical in Newark, N.J. He volunteered as a counselor to inmates at Rahway State Prison in New Jersey and was a deacon of the Presbyterian Church in Westfield.

TED J. MARRIOTT, Missouri '50, Gadsden, Ala., Nov. 6, 1991. During his 35-year career, he served as personnel manager for TRW, Kellwood, Chesebrough

Ponds and Health-Tex. He was a veteran, having served during the Korean conflict.

ROBERT P. ASHLOCK, Missouri '55, Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 27, 1992. He was president and CEO of Assurex International and a member of the Upper Arlington Lutheran Church.

RONALD F. ESCHENBURG, Michigan '55, Grosse Pointe Park, Mich., Jan. 20, 1992. He worked for 20 years with Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Co. in Detroit, where he was senior regional pension director. In 1986, he became owner of Detroit Renaissance American Speedy Printing in Detroit. He served on the board of directors of the Downtown Detroit Lions Club and was a member of the Grosse Pointe Park Civic Commission.

LOUIS G. TITUS, Nebraska '59, Holdrege, Neb., Oct. 7, 1991. He began working full time at the First National Bank of Holdrege in 1962, was elected an officer and director in 1964 and became vice president in 1967. In 1978, he was elected president, succeeding his father as the fourth generation of the Titus family to head the banking institution, which is the third largest agricultural lending institution in Nebraska.

ROBERT M. PESHEK, Nebraska '62, Grand Island, Neb., May 20, 1991. In 1977, he became owner and manager of the Hoppe Lumber Co. in Grand Island and developed himself as both a business and civic leader. He served on the board of directors of Overland National Bank and the Grand Island Area Chamber of Commerce and as president of St. Francis Medical Center Board of Directors.

ROBERT KENNETH WHITFILL JR., Southwest Texas '75, Houston, Texas, March 13, 1992. He was a financial consultant with Shearson Lehman Brothers in Houston. He also served as president of the Sharpstown, Texas Little League and was an active member of the Houston Central Lions Club.

ANDREW W. ROTELLI III, West Virginia '91, Cranston, R.I., Dec. 28, 1991. He was a sophomore studying sports physiology at West Virginia, planning to transfer to the University of Rhode Island. At WVU, he was an honors student and played intramural basketball and football. He was killed in a house fire in Narragansett, R.I.

Ohio Lambda Hosts Leadership Conferences

he old adage states that if you build a better mousetrap, the world will beat a path to your door. As the Ohio Lambda Chapter has discovered, if you sponsor a regional leadership workshop, the same thing will happen.



"The regional conference allows undergraduates to meet and exchange ideas on a semesterly basis and gives the leaders of these chapters some positive feedback to improve their operations. I wish we had 100 strong chapters, but we don't. The particular makeup of the conference allows the stronger chapters to help the weaker ones through interaction and idea sharing."

Another strength, according to Goldman, is the low cost. The \$10-\$12

registration fee covers materials and lunch on Saturday. Participants are encouraged to bring sleeping bags and bedding to take advantage of the floor space of the Ohio Lambda Chapter house. "Or they can rent a hotel room if they wish," Goldman adds.

According to attendees and planners alike, the major benefit of low cost is that more representatives from a single chapter are able to attend, and therefore, more students are returning to their chapters with new ideas and new energy to improve their operations and programming.

With attendance topping 100 undergraduates and special workshops for chapter advisors, the Ohio Lambda Chapter has tapped into fertile territory, indeed. In fact, Goldman plans on continuing the workshops for Districts II and III at Miami and to add regional workshops next fall for Districts I and IV. District VI is also planning a workshop for the fall, to be held on October 10 on the campus of Cal State Northridge.

Each workshop is a joint effort between Goldman and two under-

graduate planning chairmen. Jim Kessler, Miami '91, and Rob Evans, Miami '91, served as the local point men for the February conference. Goldman also credits input from the Archons of Districts II and III, Dan Isaac, Akron '87, and Joe Lockett, Miami '90.

According to Kessler, planning started at the end of November and ran to February. He and Evans were responsible for contacting and inviting chapters in Districts and for contacting speakers.


Speakers at the conferences have included Goldman, Executive Director Terry Harper, Fraternity President Bob Lazzell, Coordinator of Chapter and Faculty Advisors John Ciccarelli, Ohio Zeta Chapter Advisor Dallas Horvath, Director of Chapter Services Ron Richard and Ohio Lambda alumni. Special guest speakers at the February conference were John Green, executive director of Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity, who spoke on the Fu-

On February 22, 1992, the Ohio Lambda Chapter at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, hosted Phi Psi chapters from Districts II and III for a weekend of leadership development. The workshop was the fourth such undertaking the chapter has hosted in the past two years.

Chapter Advisor Bob Goldman, **Miami '72**, says the purpose of the workshop is to fill a perceived need of today's undergraduate leaders — the need to be able to cope with the complexities of operating a fraternity chapter and to share information informally among groups in similar situations.

"We needed to develop our leaders every year rather than every other year," Goldman said. "The Woodrow Wilson Leadership School meets every two years — this is often the only time our undergraduates are privy to learning leadership skills and how to deal with the problems they may face.

ture of the Greek System, and Randy Walker, head football coach at Miami University, who spoke on motivation.

"I think the entire project is worthwhile if each person takes back one idea to strengthen both his chapter and Phi Psi as a whole," Kessler said. "I think in helping to plan this conference I gained a certain amount of personal development. It was great to have guys from different chapters come and exchange ideas and meet different brothers."

Topics run the range of chapter concerns and operations, including rush, fraternity education, alumni relations, risk management and motivation. "We take the hands-on approach," Goldman said, "no script, and we offer real world experience."

Mike Carey, **York '92**, gave the conference high marks, despite the 8-hour drive. Eight members from this southeastern Pennsylvania school travelled over 400 miles to attend the conference.

"It was certainly worth the trip, particularly from the view of a colony," Carey said. "I think the smaller regional workshop is a good idea. Its low cost allows for high attendance by individual chapters and provides great exposure to the bigger picture of Phi Psi as a national organization.

"We learned practical knowledge on risk management, real concrete information. The alumni relations and brotherhood seminars were also good for ideas."

From Fraternity Colony to Advertising Empire

t his graduation in 1967, Jack Balousek, Creighton '65, was awarded the Spirit of Creighton Award, which is presented to the senior best showing the ideals of Creighton in his life. Twenty-five years later, sitting atop an advertising empire, he credits

the values of fraternity membership with his success.

Balousek is president and chief operating officer of Foote, Cone & Belding, the sixth largest advertising agency in the world, responsible for accounts as varied as Lifesavers, Kraft, Coors, the California Dancing Raisins, Levi's and Pillsbury. Like an American success story, he worked his way to the top, spending seven years in brand management for Procter & Gamble. He later joined Foote, Cone & Belding/San Francisco on the Clorox account, and his accomplishments in the advertising agency industry began.

In 1986, he became executive vice president and general manager of the San Francisco office. He was elected a member of the Board of Directors of FCB Communications, Inc. in 1989, and in 1990, he was named president of FCB/West. Balousek was appointed to his current position as president and chief operating officer of FCB Communications, Inc. in 1991.

But before the raisins ever "doo-wopped" across the screen, Balousek developed a steady foundation for his later success as a Founding Father of the Nebraska Beta Chapter. "There's no question that my Phi Psi experience has aided me in my business career," Balousek says, "however, not in a traditional 'networking' sense. Instead the Fraternity gave me much more valuable and lasting gifts.

"As an undergraduate, I was going away from home for the first time, on my own in a grown-up world, and I needed some kind of anchor for myself. Phi Psi turned out to be the perfect anchor.

"I sensed that I needed a support system in all of the traditional campus areas — social, academic, political, athletic. The Nebraska Beta Chapter was very active in each one of these areas, and I knew that I could draw from and contribute to the group in these areas."

As an undergraduate, Balousek served the chapter and the university in many ways, including Homecoming Chairman, Rush Chair-

man, President of Student Board of Governors, Commander of Army ROTC and Senior Fund Drive Chairman. And he received his share of honors; among them the Summerfield Scholarship, the Spirit of Creighton Award and election to Alpha Sigma Nu Jesuit Honor Society.

But Phi Kappa Psi influenced Balousek's undergraduate and later life in other ways, as well. At Creighton, the Phi Psis lent a helping hand to freshmen during registration.

"I stepped up to help out one particularly perplexed freshman woman," Balousek recalls. "Her name was Kathi, and to make a long story short, we began dating that night, married four years later when she and I had both finished school, and have been married ever since. So, in a way, I am reminded of my wonderful Phi Psi experience every day of my life. And I have the Fraternity to thank for this."

A few years ago, Balousek dropped by the Cal Epsilon Chapter house to do some preliminary inquiring about the UCLA campus housing situation. His son's lottery number for university housing was so high, he had little chance of getting into a residence hall. He asked several of the Cal Ep brothers for advice regarding how to approach the apartment hunting issue. Later, he returned home to San Francisco to find a four-page letter from Dave Junta, UCLA '86, which included street maps, rental rates, addresses, telephone numbers and specific questions to ask landlords in that particular rental market. Perhaps by coincidence, his son, Jon, was initiated into Phi Kappa Psi by California Epsilon in 1988.

Balousek attended his son's initiation, sitting next to him throughout the ceremony. "As I sat there and the initiation unfolded," he recalls, "I realized that not a single word had changed in the 20-some years since I myself had been initiated and had initiated brothers at Creighton who followed me.

"Talk about anchors! Where in our society do we find that kind of consistency and stability these days? The whole experience was one of the most touching in my life, and I'm so grateful to have had it."

Balousek places high value on his Phi Psi membership, not only to Nebraska Beta but to the entire organization. "My plans to attend the Grand Arch Council in San Francisco this summer are reflections of the continuing role that Phi Psi plays in my life."


Maryland-Baltimore County



Wabash



"It's been stunning," says Jim Boyle, past Archon of District VI who served this spring as alumnus Fraternity Education Counselor to Washington Alpha. The chapter has mastered a financial turn-around. Our Husky Phi Psi's recent history, plagued with high accounts receivable among its members, surpassed \$10,000 in the red. "Brothers would move away and not pay. There were usually 2 or 3 gross offenders," adds Boyle.

ashington Alpha Chapter Treasurer Cory Coyle, a business and accounting student, made a big difference by taking a "more professional approach." Coyle implemented signed contracts with members who live out of the chapter house as well as those who live in. House bills had not been increased for three years, so they were bumped up twice over a two-year period and yet still remain in the lower third on campus. With 23 pledges living in the house last September, occupancy totaled 61 men, which was "a little bit crowded." The chapter house had been under capacity so the change in revenue was significant. Chapter leaders examined previously unchecked kitchen and social expenses. "We just spent the money," explains Boyle. Budgets were not prepared or reviewed. Today, the cook has guidelines, and the social chairman proposes expenses for planned activities. The chapter did not have fund raisers, but concentrated on management. The brothers turned the place around. Increasing membership was an important factor. Getting house bills more in line with actual costs made a difference. "I think any chapter can put forth the effort," says Boyle, "if it's not just a few people, each member is willing to do his part." Coyle has been recruited to serve as financial advisor after his graduation from the University.

The Washington Alpha Chapter house is one the oldest on campus, and the members are constantly trying to improve it, and maintain the image of having the "Cleanest House on Campus."



The Summerfield Scholar program was created through a trust bequest by the late Solon E. Summerfield, Kansas 1899. At the time, Brother Summerfield's donation was the largest ever made to an American college fraternity.

Summerfield was the

founder and former head of the Gotham Gold Stripe Hosiery Company of New York. Endowment Fund Scholarships

1992 Ralph D. Daniel Leadership Award



This \$4,000 award is made in honor of Mr. Phi Psi, Dud Daniel, who has faithfully served the Fraternity since his initiation at the University of Arizona in 1947. A charter member of Arizona Alpha, Brother Daniel was recruited right out of college to join the Fraternity Executive Offices as assistant to Phi Psi's first executive, Dab Williams, Illinois '06. He went on to become the second executive director, the editor of

The Shield and a trustee of the Endowment Fund. Beyond Phi Psi, Brother Daniel has served in all offices, including president, of the Fraternity Executives Association and other interfraternal organizations.

Brother Daniel's theory of fraternity is simple: "Let us be what we say we are — a fraternity, not a club; run by men, not boys; and based on ideals, not expediency."

The grant is made through the generosity of an anonymous donor who values the leadership skills he developed through opportunities in the Fratermity. The grant is made to an undergraduate brother who has displayed outstanding leadership skills in his Phi Psi chapter, on his campus and in his community.



The 1992 recipient of the Ralph D. Daniel Leadership Award is M.A. Williams, **Texas '89**. An honors program major, Williams graduated from the University of Texas this spring and plans to attend medical school in the fall.

He served the Texas Alpha Chapter as president, vice president, IFC representative and finance committee chairman. He represented Phi Kappa Psi to the larger campus community by serving

on the Student Involvement Committee, the IFC Judicial Board and the programming committee of the Greek Leadership Conference. Williams also worked with third graders as a tutor and performed volunteer work for the Brackenridge City Hospital.

During his tenure as an officer of Texas Alpha, Williams worked diligently with other chapter officers to return the chapter to fiscal health, reducing its outstanding debt by over \$40,000. Also, he worked closely with the university administration to regain recognition for Texas Alpha as a student organization.

1992 Maurice J. Warnock Scholarship



This grant honors Maurice J. Warnock, Oregon '23, the former chairman of Armstrong World Industries. A charter member of the Oregon Alpha Chapter, he started with what was then called the Armstrong Cork Company in sales after graduation and rose through the ranks.

Brother Warnock has also displayed his commitment to higher education. He served as a Trustee of the Endowment Fund from 1970 to 1976 and has lent his

assistance to the University of Oregon, Denison University and Franklin and Marshall College. In 1968, he was the first man designated a Distinguished Alumnus of the University of Oregon.

When named Phi Psi's Outstanding Alumnus at the 1986 Grand Arch Council, Brother Warnock attributed the vibrance of the Fraternity to the commitment of its members. "The reason Phi Psi has flourished for so long and remains the great fraternity it is today is that for 134 years, each generation of brothers has not only passed on to their brothers of the next generation their devotion to Phi Psi's ideals and objectives but has also made a life-long commitment to continue their own active interest and support."

The \$1,500 grant is made possible through Brother Warnock's gifts to the Endowment Fund and is awarded to a member of the Oregon Alpha Chapter based on financial need, academic achievement, leadership skills and high character.



The 1992 winner is John Michael Goodman, Oregon '90. A political science major, John expects to graduate in 1993, after which he plans to enter law school. He has been active in both student government and the Interfraternity Council and has volunteered for the marine biology annual Whale Watch, the Christmas Basket Delivery and the Adopt-a-Family Christmas Charity. He has served Oregon Alpha as house

manager, fraternity education chairman, rush chairman and on the public relations and governing committees.

Brother Goodman also founded a golf tournament to raise money for college scholarships for local students. In its first year, the tournament raised \$1,100.

Building a Solid Foundation

York College Installation

hroughout the 140-year history of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity, 131 charters have been granted to undergraduates at institutions of higher education across the country. Each installation is a cause for celebration — a celebration of the birth of a new legacy and a celebration of the perpetuation of the ideals of Founders Moore and Letterman.

Phi Kappa Psi was first introduced to York College because of Brad Jewitt's friendship with a brother from Pennsylvania Pi, Brian Conallen, **Temple '88**. After being disgruntled with the Greek system at York, he spoke to Brian about Phi Psi and was inspired to start a Colony. Within a short time, Brad had recruited 16 men.

On October 6, 1990, the Pennsylvania Rho Colony was born. Brothers from the Pennsylvania Eta Chapter at Franklin and Marshall College in nearby Lancaster assisted with the colony initiation ceremonies. Ironically, the 17th chapter of Phi Kappa Psi in its mother state blossomed from an original 17 men. Within a little more than a year, all of the colony requirements for a charter were met. Our leather-bound petition, dubbed *The Rhoan History*, was delivered to and accepted by the Executive Council in late March 1992.

This young chapter at York College in the state of Phi Psi's birth has benefitted greatly from advice and interaction with other chapters, inlcuding Pennsylvania Eta, Pennsylvania Pi, Pennsylvania Epsilon and Maryland Beta to name just a few. Pennsylvania Rho was organized as a local fraternity, affiliated with Phi Kappa Psi as a colony and, on May 2, 1992, installed as the 131st chapter of the Fraternity.





York College of Pennsylvania History
York College traces its institutional
lineage to the York Academy (founded in

1787) and the York Collegiate Institute (founded in 1873). In 1941, these two institutions became York Junior College. Then, in 1968, it became York College of Pennsylvania. Currently, the college hosts 4,500 students and has 19 Greek-letter organizations. There are now five national fraternities, five local fraternities, six national sororities and three local sororities at York.

Installation

The installation of a colony is a threeday process, following months of planning and preparation. Ours began on April 30 with the arrival of Executive Director Terry Harper, Oklahoma State '85, and Director of Chapter Services Ron Richard, Minnesota '84, to administer the colony exam.

The chartering celebration began on May 1 with a welcoming reception hosted by the colony. FIPG Risk Management Policy

The Risk Management Policy of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group includes the provisions that follow and shall apply to all fraternity entities and all levels of fraternity membership.

Alcohol And Drugs

The possession, use and/or consumption of ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, while on Chapter premises, during an official fraternity event, or in any situation sponsored or endorsed by the chapter, must be in compliance with any and all applicable laws of the state, province, county, city and university.

No alcoholic beverages may be purchased through the chapter treasury nor may the purchase of same for members or guests be undertaken or coordinated by any member in the name of or on behalf of the chapter. The purchase and/or use of a bulk quantity of such alcoholic beverage, e.g., kegs, is prohibited.

No chapter members, collectively or individually, shall purchase for, serve to, or sell alcoholic beverages to any minor (i.e. those under legal "drinking age").

The possession, sale and/or use of any illegal drugs or controlled substances at any chapter house, sponsored event or at any event that an observer would associate with the fraternity, is strictly prohibited.

No chapter may co-sponsor an event with an alcohol distributor, charitable organization or tavern (tavern defined as an establishment generating more than half of annual gross sales from alcohol) where alcohol is given away, sold or otherwise provided to those present.

No chapter may co-sponsor or co-finance a function where alcohol is purchased by any of the host chapters, groups or organizations.

All rush activities associated with any chapter will be dry rush functions.

Open parties where alcohol is present, meaning those with unrestricted access by non-members of the fraternity, without specific invitation, shall be prohibited.

No member shall permit, tolerate, encourage or participate in "drinking games."

No alcohol shall be present at any pledge/associate member/novice program or activity of the chapter.

Hazing

No chapter shall conduct hazing activities. Hazing activities are defined as:

"Any action taken or situation created, intentionally, whether on or off fraternity premises, to produce mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, harassment or ridicule. Such activities may include but are not limited to the following: use of alcohol; paddling in any form; creation of excessive fatigue; physical and psychological shocks; quests, treasure hunts, scavenger hunts, road trips or any other such activities carried on outside or inside of the confines of the chapter house; wearing of public apparel which is conspicuous and not normally in good taste; engaging in public stunts and buffoonery; morally degrading or humiliating games and activities; and any other activities which are not consistent with fraternal law, ritual or policy or the regulations and policies of the educational institution."

Sexual Abuse

The Fraternity will not tolerate or condone any form of sexually abusive behavior on the part of its members, whether physical, mental or emotional. This is to include any actions that are demeaning to women, including but not limited to date rape, gang rape or verbal harassment.

Fire, Health And Safety

All chapter houses shall, prior to, during and following occupancy, meet all local fire and health codes and standards.

All chapters must have emergency numbers for fire, police and ambulance posted by common phones. Also, all chapters must have evacuation routes from chapter house common areas posted in these areas and on the back of the door of each sleeping room.

All chapters shall comply with engineering recommendations as reported by the insurance company.

The possession and/or use of firearms or explosive devices of any kind within the confines and premises of the chapter house is expressly forbidden.

Education

Each student member, associate member and pledge shall be instructed annually on the Risk Management Policy of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group.



Annual Report

Introduction

Last year, Phi Kappa Psi was introspective, looking within to identify strengths and move forward toward the 21st century. Now, in 1992, we are taking some bold strides in that direction, securing the future of our beloved Fraternity.

Under the leadership of the Executive Council, Phi Kappa Psi conducted a major planning summit earlier this year, bringing together nearly 50 of Phi Psi's best and brightest minds, both undergraduate and alumnus, to take a good, hard look at where we are and how we should position ourselves to be the premier American college fraternity. Other sessions are in the works with smaller focus groups.

Another major step forward was the Executive Council's launching of a \$7 million capital campaign on behalf of the Endowment Fund to financially support such exciting programs as the building and renovation of chapter houses, the continuation of leadership and scholarship awards, and the development a state-of-the-art Phi Psi computer network. At the 1992 Grand Arch Council in San Francisco, Campaign Chairman W. Robert Goldman, Jr., Miami '72 (Washington & Jefferson '64) introduced the campaign to the general membership with the news that \$3.8 million had already been pledged! You'll be hearing a lot more about this campaign throughout the next year.

This annual report is different than those you have seen in the past. The decision was made this year to begin tallying membership data according the Fraternity's fiscal year, June 1 through May 31, rather than Founders Day to Founders Day. In this transitional report, therefore, you will be reviewing 15 months' worth of data. Please bear

that in mind as you read.

You'll also be pleased to see the consolidated financial statements of the Fraternity and the Endowment Fund with prior year comparisons. Both corporations are financially sound and stable. In fact, both organizations posted impressive gains as of May 31, 1992.

Phi Kappa Psi is a fraternity on the move. Don't stand by and watch; get in the game! You can start by visiting your chapter this fall for homecoming; the dates are listed on the back cover. 1993 and beyond holds great promise for our "Noble Fraternity!"

Chapter Services

"What does the National Fraternity do for me?" It's an interesting question heard from many undergraduate members of our Fraternity. The most visible form of aid from Phi Kappa Psi to its chapters is the Educational Leadership Consultant program. Recent graduates are professionally trained to serve Phi Psi chapters and colonies as on-site facilitators, presenters, fraternity experts, and peer-counselors.

Typical visits include meetings with undergraduate officers and committees, as well as chapter advisors, university administrators, interfraternity leaders, and house corporation officers. Over the past year, Phi Kappa Psi provided each undergraduate chapter with at least one three-night visit and each colony with at least two three-night visits. During the 15-month reporting period, there were 128 chapter visits and 11 colony visits provided by the Fraternity staff. Additionally, the chapter services department spent a total of ten weeks recruiting and reorganizing two chapters.

Phi Kappa Psi remains committed to providing quality service to its chapters and colonies, alumni advisors, and alumni organizations. This commitment begins, however, with developing the leadership skills of our undergraduate members.

Undergraduate Membership

Phi Kappa Psi realized an overall gain in its average chapter size during the reporting year. An "average" Phi



Psi chapter now has 53 members; chapters and colonies generally pledge 21 men and initiate 20 of them. These statistics are skewed by the longer reporting period and by the Fraternity staff's efforts to reconcile the Grand Membership Roll with chapter rolls. Fraternity records rely upon the undergraduate chapter reports which have fallen behind over time. The Fraternity has also welcomed a larger number of new chapters during this reporting period and a number of smaller chapters have closed in these 15 months.

Our chapters at Cal State Northridge, Butler, and Allegheny all ranked first among the fraternities on their campuses

Chapter Installations

The Executive Council granted five chapter charters during the preceding 15 months, and all five campuses are new to the rolls of Phi Kappa Psi. The California Kappa Chapter at the University of California at Irvine and the Massachusetts Beta Chapter at Brandeis University were reported in the 1990-91 Annual Report.

The fall semester of 1991 brought the initiation of 36 East Carolina University students into the mysteries of Phi Kappa Psi. A transfer student from Temple University began the North Carolina Beta Colony in February, 1989. The chapter received its charter on October 26, 1991.

A local fraternity at the Rochester Institute of Technology, the League of Knights, chose to affiliate with Phi Psi during the spring of 1990 as the Fraternity's New York Theta Colony. Two years later, 56 eager gentlemen were initiated into Phi Kappa Psi as the New York Theta Chapter assumed its place as the 130th chapter on the Fraternity's roll.

Seventeen men began the Pennsylvania Rho Colony at York College in the fall of 1990. After the Executive Council perused their impressive petition, titled *Rhoan History*, our youngest

chapter was granted its charter and 37 new initiates received the badge.

Revived Chapters

The Pennsylvania Gamma chapter returned to Bucknell University with the initiation of 19 men. The chapter now occupies the completely refurbished Georgian Manor, now owned by the university.

Although another grand piece of Phi Psi property was sold there, the Ohio Beta Chapter is back in full force at Wittenberg University. Ohio Beta now has 38 undergraduate members and is occupying the former Alpha Xi Delta chapter house.

Scholarship

Phi Kappa Psi stresses academic achievement by requiring each chapter to beat the higher of the campus allmen's average or 2.5 on a 4.0 scale. Additionally, each chapter and colony officer is required to set an example within the organization by personally achieving that average. Our chapters at Cal State Northridge, Butler, and Allegheny ranked first among the fraternities on their campuses.

Expansion

Phi Kappa Psi adopted a new Expansion Policy during the report year. These guidelines for establishing new chapters outlines criteria by which potential campuses and interest groups will be selected. There are currently two colonies of Phi Kappa Psi.

The Louisiana Gamma Colony began in the spring of 1990 with a recruitment effort by Fraternity staff members at Loyola University in New Orleans. Twenty-five men were inducted into the colony.

Our youngest group is at DePaul University in Chicago. A local interest group became the Illinois Zeta Colony in April of 1991. These men are earnestly working toward a Phi Kappa Psi charter.

Phi Kappa Psi has been selected to recruit and organize a new chapter at San Diego State University during the 1993 academic year. We have been con-

tacted by a local fraternity at Dartmouth and expansion proposals have been sent to Duquesne University, Boston University, the University of New Hampshire, and Old Dominion University. The Eastern Oklahoma Alumni Association is investigating expansion possibilities at the University of Tulsa.

Alumni Relations


"Lifetime commitment? What does that mean?" With 95 undergraduate chapters and colonies, Phi Kappa Psi relies heavily upon its alumni members to guide today's students. Last year's annual report introduced the Chapter Advisory Committee concept. This year, Phi Psi boasts such groups at Alabama, Arizona State, Bowling Green, Butler, UC Davis, UCLA, Cal State Northridge, Colorado, Creighton, DePaul, DePauw, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana State, Kansas, Missouri, Rhode Island, Southern Methodist, Stanford, Tennessee, Toledo, Trenton State, Valparaiso, Vanderbilt, Washington, West Virginia, and Wittenberg.


These chapters enjoy contact with several alumni counselors who provide guidance in such areas as fraternity education, rush, finance, and scholarship. The days of jack-of-all-trades advisors are ending as a team of advisors, expert in specific areas of chapter operations, replace them. Six chapters, however, are without any advisors: Akron, Allegheny, Cornell, Michigan, Minnesota, and Oregon.

The national Chapter Advisor Steering Committee has been working diligently to draft a resource guide for all advisors. This loose-leaf publication will contain job descriptions, workshop outlines, news articles, and other resources for advisors and counselors to use with their chapters and colonies. Coordinator of Chapter and Faculty Advisors John Ciccarelli organized two more and executed very successful Advisors' Seminars at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School and the 66th Grand Arch Council. In addition to the seminars and The Roundtable, a new publication for advisors, the Executive Council has authorized the hiring of a new Fraternity staff member who will work with alumni relations, house corporations, and the insurance program. Through these methods, and others, the Fraternity is making significant commitments to its alumni.

Phi Kappa Psi also provides other ways to be involved as an alumnus. There is a house corporation board for each chapter, and several such boards are in need of assistance. Management of chapter assets and direction of long-term maintenance projects require dedi-





cated, caring alumni directors. Several chapter houses have been remodeled this report year; Arizona State, Bucknell, Gettysburg, Iowa State, Johns Hopkins, Kansas, Lafayette, Miami, Nebraska, Northwestern, Ohio Wesleyan, Purdue, and Valparaiso have completed major renovations or are near completion. UCLA, Illinois, Indiana, and Washington are planning future renovations and Alabama is picking up and moving its house across and down the street!

New homes were acquired during the reporting period for Akron, Case

Western, Illinois State, Southern Methodist, Temple, and Toledo while Florida State and Louisiana State hope to purchase their homes soon. Finally, UCDavis and Wittenberg plan to build new homes in the near future. Thirteen chapters currently have no organized house corporation boards, and there are plenty of other projects that rely upon alumni involvement as well.

Four new alumni associations were added to Phi Psi's roll this year. Hearty welcomes were extended to the Golden Circle Alumni Association, the Sacramento Alumni Association, the Smokey Mountain Alumni Association, and the Southern Michigan Alumni Association.

The creation of new alumni associations, and rejuvenation of existing associations that now lie dormant, is a primary goal of Phi Kappa Psi during the next biennium.

Publications

The Fraternity continues to believe that communication with all its members is of the highest priority. As the issues facing Phi Psi become more complex, however, we need more specialized publications to best meet the needs of our various constituencies. The Shield of Phi Kappa Psi remains the Fraternity's primary vehicle of communication with alumni, but it continues to be supplemented with additional publications focusing specifically on the concerns of chapter officers, the ramifications of risk management, and the importance of chapter and faculty advisors, among others.

Publication of *The Shield* changed from quarterly to three-times-a-year and then changed back again during the reporting period, resulting in issues being mailed in the summer and fall of 1991 and winter of 1992 with no spring 1992 issue. We are now back on a four-times-a-year schedule, beginning with the most-recent summer issue. We have also chosen official vendors of fraternity sportswear and other paraphenalia. Look for ads from those groups in upcoming mailings.

This year promises much action on the publications front as many long-outdated resources are reviewed and recreated. Chapters have requested more pre-prepared materials for rush, fraternity education, and philanthropic events, and we plan to oblige. We will also continue our push to make each of the Fraternity's many publications more consistent and immediately identifiable, while at the same time increasing readability and style.

Fraternity Headquarters

Phi Psi's Headquarters and Museum has been located at 510 Lockerbie Street in downtown Indianapolis since June,

1978. Prior to that, the Fraternity was headquartered in Cleveland, Ohio. We established a central office in 1930.

The Fraternity manages its information with an IBM System/36 minicomputer. While the hardware itself is not state-of-the-art, the system adequately provides for all of Phi Psi's data processing and information management needs. The software is quickly and easily modified to accommodate changing requirements.

Behind the scenes, a dedicated staff of professionals keeps the Fraternity on course. Terry Harper, Oklahoma State '85, is beginning his third year as Phi Psi's Executive Director. Terry has served on the Fraternity staff for six years, spending two years on the road as an Educational Leadership Consultant and one-year stints each as Director of Publications and Director of Chapter Services and Risk Management. Serving with the Executive Director has been Ron Richard, Minnesota '84. Ron also travelled for Phi Psi as an ELC during the 1986-1988 biennium before rejoining the staff in 1990. John Mead, Tennessee '87, completed his third year on staff as Director of Publications. Joining the staff in mid-April was Sandi Leddy, a graduate of Purdue University, as the Fraternity's Staff Accountant.

Serving Phi Psi's chapters and colonies during the 1991–92 academic year were Douglas Pszczolkowski, *Allegheny* '87, completing his second year, and first-year man Jamie Acton, *Valparaiso* '88.

The support staff of Ellen King, Mary Ellen Agee, Joy Bump, Susan Moriarty, and Edward Hale round out the Head-quarters team.

The staff changed again after May 31 as Ron Richard and John Mead departed to pursue other careers. Douglas Pszczolkowski was named Director of Chapter Services on August 1, while David Murray, *Bucknell '91*, began as Director of Publications on August 10. Joining Jamie Acton as Educational Leadership Consultants for 1992–93 are Marc Bruffett, *Buffalo '89*, and Jim Boyle, *Washington '88*.

As mentioned earlier, the Executive

Council approved the creation of a new staff position to address the needs of alumni and house corporations. A target date of December 1 has been set to fill the new post. Interested brothers can find out more about the position by sending a résumé to the Executive Director by November 1.

Finances

Financially speaking, fiscal year 1992 was a banner year for Phi Kappa Psi. Although the Fraternity's income was down 5% from 1991 to \$1,445,510, the Fraternity's asset base increased by more than 6% to \$3,348,264. The de-

crease in income was due primarily to a reduction in the grant the Fraternity receives from the Endowment Fund for educational programs and a one-time contribution from the Endowment Fund in 1991 in connection with the purchase of certain real estate from the Fraternity. Overall, though, the Fraternity's financial outlook is healthy and strong.

General Fund

General Fund revenues exceeded expenses by \$98,257 in 1991–92. General Fund revenues were down nearly 18% primarily because of the aforementioned reduction in the Endowment Fund grant and the out-of-the-ordinary contribution of the Endowment Fund in 1991. Likewise, General Fund expenses were reduced 32% from the prior year. Revenue from undergraduate sources accounted for nearly two-thirds of total General Fund revenue for 1992.

Permanent Fund

The assets of the Permanent, Scholastic, Educational, Charitable, and Fraternal Fund, better known simply as "The Permanent Fund," consist of investments in marketable securities and some fixed assets.

Investment income from the Permanent Fund is used to supplement the educational programs of the Fraternity. These include the Educational Leadership Consultant program and the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School, to name but a few. The Permanent Fund's investment account balance grew 4% after expenses and grants to the Fraternity.

Phi Kappa Psi was the very first fraternity to create a national insurance program in the early 1980s.

Harris Investment Management of Chicago, Illinois, has professionally managed the investments of the Permanent Fund since July 1, 1938. The Board of Trustees of the Permanent Fund carefully monitors the performance of the investment manager and reports to the Executive Council. The Trustees are three Phi Psi alumni appointed by the President to oversee the investments of the Permanent Fund. These alumni generously give of their time and professional expertise to assist the Fraternity in achieving its financial goals and objectives. Currently serving as Trustees are John R. Donnell Jr., Case Western Reserve '59, W. M. Batten, Ohio State '29, and Dr. John W. Oswald, DePauw 35.

Total assets of the Permanent Fund at May 31, 1992, increased to \$2,289,732 from \$2,199,659 last year.


Insurance Fund

The Insurance Fund was created by the Executive Council to account for the insurance and risk management programs of the Fraternity. Excess insurance revenues over expenses are designated to fund risk management programs at the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School, a portion of the Educational Leadership Consultant program, self-insured retentions (deductibles), chapter house safety inspections and general program administration.

Insurance program revenues for the year ending May 31, 1992, were \$590,172, a 13.2% increase over 1991. The fund had an operating surplus of \$125,371 during the year under review, increasing the Insurance Fund balance to \$268,675. The purpose of the fund balance is to set aside adequate funds to cover our deductible amount and offset any sudden and dramatic premium increases.

Insurance and Risk Management

Phi Kappa Psi was the very first fraternity to create a national insurance program in the early 1980s. The goal of the national insurance and risk man-




agement program is to prevent losses from occurring and reduce the risk associated with running a chapter. The health and safety of our members is of the utmost importance. The program also protects the loyal volunteers supporting the Fraternity and its undergraduate chapters while they are acting within the scope of their duties.

Participation in the insurance program is mandatory for all chapters and house corporations. Only through 100% participation can we guarantee the best coverage at the lowest cost. Currently, the property program insures over \$30 million of Phi Kappa Psi–owned land, improvements, and belongings.

Some highlights of the 1991–92 program include:

- Liability coverage was provided through Mt. Hawley Insurance Company, a subsidiary of RLI Corp.
- Available were liability limits of \$1 million per location per year and excess coverage of \$1 million per location per year.
- For the first time in Fraternity history, we self-insured the main policy's \$100,000 per year deductible.
- Liability premiums paid by undergraduates remained at \$75 per man per year, last year's rate.
- Property coverage was underwritten by Ætna Life and Casualty.
- Each housed chapter received a combined property and liability inspection this spring with recommendations for improvement currently being implemented.
- Risk management seminars were presented to chapters and colonies during each Educational Leadership Consultant visit.
- Phi Psi's risk management newsletter, The Sentry, was published for the second year. It was hailed by the Greek community as an outstanding risk management resource.

Phi Kappa Psi remains a member of the Fraternity Insurance Purchasing Group (FIPG), a consortium of 35 men's and women's fraternities whose primary goal now is risk management education and policy enforcement at the chapter level.

Brothers helping Brothers: The philosophy of the Endowment Fund of Phi Kappa Psi, Inc. since its inception in 1914 and its incorporation in the state of Illinois in 1922. The Endowment Fund was established and continues to exist for the benefit of the Fraternity by promoting academic excellence, leadership, and moral responsibility among our members.

The assets of the Endowment Fund now total \$1,109,915. They are primarily cash, marketable securities, and real estate. The Endowment Fund is the owner of Heritage Hall, the Fraternity's Headquarters and Museum, and collects rent from the Fraternity which occupies the office space within.

1991—92 was a year of improvement for the Endowment Fund.

Fund Management

The affairs of the Endowment Fund are managed by three Trustees, each serving a six-year term. One Trustee is elected at the biennial meeting of the Endowment Fund held concurrently with each Grand Arch Council. James W. Emison III, *DePauw '49*, is Chairman. His term runs through 1998. Jerry Nelson, *UCLA '48*, is Vice Chairman and serves through 1996. John F. Buck, *Indiana '75*, is Secretary/Treasurer and serves through 1994. Like the Permanent Fund Trustees, these alumni generously donate their time and talents for the betterment of the Fraternity.

During the first half of the year under review, the Endowment Fund employed a professional staff led by Kent H. Buell, *Northwestern '54*. In January, the Trustees decided to contract instead with the Fraternity for administrative and support services.

Fund Allocation

Over the years, the Endowment Fund has used its income to make student loans, provide scholarships and grants to deserving students, and make grants to chapters for the purchase of computers for educational purposes. The Endowment Fund also supplements the Fraternity's educational programs by making a grant to the Fraternity each year in support of those activities.

Gifts to the Endowment Fund are currently deductible to the extent that the law permits for those filing a U. S. tax return. The Endowment Fund is recognized under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization that operates exclusively for charitable and educational purposes.

In 1952, the Fraternity's centennial year, Phi Kappa Psi began the Alumni Support Program to provide alumni the opportunity to continue their support of the Fraternity beyond their college days. In 1988, the program came under the auspices of the Endowment Fund to allow donors the opportunity to take tax deductions for their gifts. Giving trends remained fairly stable through the 1950s and gradually began to increase in the early 1970s. 1977 saw the first six-figure giving year and, in 1984, the program topped \$200,000! Numbers have been down slightly in recent years due to the recession, among other things.

During the 1991 giving year that ended February 29, 1992, 3,677 gifts totalling \$170,908 were made to the Endowment Fund through the Alumni Support Program. The names of those generous benefactors were listed in the Summer 1992 issue of *The Shield*.

1991–92 was a year of improvement for the Endowment Fund. Net assets (assets minus liabilities) improved slightly over last year to \$1,089,563. This includes \$386,840 held in funds the income of which is restricted by the donor for specific uses.
