Brothers,

Please find below all members who have declared candidacy for the 2019 – 2021 District Archon positions. Each position will be elected at the 2019 Woodrow Wilson Leadership School and District Council Meetings in Indianapolis, Indiana.

This information is being sent to all Chapter Presidents and Alumni Association Presidents. A packet will be distributed to all registered participants of the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School prior to arrival. While the deadline for a member to have his information included in this packet is May 15, any eligible undergraduate member in good standing in attendance at the District Council Meeting may run for Archon.

Each eligible chapter and alumni association will have the opportunity to cast a vote for a candidate in your district. The following clauses in the Fraternity Constitution, Bylaws and Rules clarify qualifications to vote for Alumni Associations and Chapters. Colonies are not entitled to a vote.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATIONS

No alumni association shall be entitled to vote, or to representation at a Fraternity Council, unless it shall have paid for two consecutive years immediately preceding, to the Executive Director of the Fraternity on or before the first day of May of each year, the annual sum of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for the general uses of the Fraternity.

CHAPTERS

Any chapter which fails to pay any charges due the Fraternity, including, but not limited to those fees described in ARTICLE XIV, chapter service fees, conference fees, insurance premiums, or outstanding loans within 90 days after same shall be payable, shall, as an additional penalty, lose the right to vote upon any matter concerning the Fraternity.

ARCHON ROLE AND RESPONSIBILITIES

As with any large organization, performance of the governmental and managerial functions requires the participation of many people. In Phi Kappa Psi, these people are elected officers, appointed officers and employed staff. The hallmark of Phi Kappa Psi is its unique commitment to undergraduate control. Phi Kappa Psi is the ONLY men's or women's fraternity, which vests its governmental authority predominantly within its undergraduates.

Under this system, the Fraternity is organized into Chapters, Colonies, Alumni Associations and Clubs. These organizations are also grouped into Districts, which are established on the basis of geographical and administrative efficiency.

The Archon is the presiding officer of his district and serves for a term of two years. It is the Archon's duty to communicate with each chapter, alumni association, and alumni club within his district, so as to fully and fairly represent their interests to the Executive Council and to provide the Executive Council with accurate information regarding these organizations. He is also the custodian of the archives, records, and other property of the district.

The Executive Council is responsible for the decisions of the Fraternity during the intervals between meetings of the Grand Arch Council. It is composed of four alumni members — the President (SWGP), Vice President (SWVGP), Secretary (SWAG), and Treasurer (SWP) — and six undergraduate members — Archons — representing the six districts of the Fraternity.

REQUIREMENTS:

- Must be an undergraduate member at the time that he is elected to serve
- Must live/attend school within the district he is elected to represent
- Prohibited from receiving employment, and/or monetary compensation from Executive Council during their tenure.
- Attend Executive Council Meetings
- Submit Report for Executive Council Meeting and Quarterly Report
- Must have a 2.5 cumulative GPA or meet the all men's average for his campus, whichever is higher.

What does being a member of a national fraternity mean to you both as an individual and as a member of your chapter?

My first encounter with being a member of the national fraternity was my time at Pivot. I originally attended with the intention to learn what I could and boost my resume for when I ran for GP, but I quickly realized that the men I met were all as brotherly to me as my own chapter members. I was completely blown away that I could be such good friends with people I had only known for a week from a completely different background from me, and I quickly realized that for the most part, our chapters produce men we can all be proud to call brothers and members of Phi Kappa Psi. Since then I have attended GAC, PDC, and Pivot again as an intern this past spring break, and I have made friends with brothers from across the country who I still talk to on a regular basis. My time at these events is what has pushed me to run for Archon, my appreciation for the brotherhood at large and the countless brothers I have met has led me to a desire to serve as my district's representative on the executive council.

As a member of my chapter, and also a member of my district, my membership in the national fraternity is an obligation to not only fulfill duties and pay dues, but make sure that when forming opinions and thinking about decisions that are made by the national fraternity that I think about not just my chapter's needs, but Phi Kappa Psi's needs as a whole, whether that be the needs of other chapters or alumni



associations, or the future of the fraternity. It is crucial to have an understanding that not every chapter is the same, and many differ greatly from others. What may work well for one chapter certainly won't for another, and I think this is why communication between all parties involved is crucial to ensure no one gets the short end of the stick per say. While at the Grand Arch Council, I served on the Constitution committee, even submitting my own amendment to our current bylaws. At times, I felt I had to vote against amendments or vote in amendments that would maybe not benefit my chapter but would benefit the fraternity at large. Phi Kappa Psi is a large organization and has many different chapters from different places and of different sizes, and as a result not everything that comes to the floor will benefit your chapter. Being a member of the national fraternity is about respecting the difference between your chapter and others and remembering at the end of the day that we are all brothers and we are all striving towards the same goals at the end of the day, to make Phi Kappa Psi an experience like no other that makes us all the proud brothers we are.

The fourth stanza of the creed is incredibly important for all Phi Psi's, and the one I would like to delve into. I believe to all I meet, wherever I go, I represent not only Phi Kappa Psi, but indeed the spirit of all fraternities; is a crucial statement for any Phi Psi around the world, and especially those serving as Archon. It is important to remember that when we are out in the public eye and dealing with people, we represent the fraternity, and all Greek organizations. We share in part of the duty to improve and strengthen the image of fraternities as a brotherhood of gentleman, both through our actions and what we say. When down at different events for the fraternity, we often find ourselves in hotels and airports with people we may not know who know what organization we are apart of, or just that it is a Greek organization. It is crucial at these times to do our best to portray the best version of ourselves in order to ensure that we make a good impression. This is the same principal on campus, it is our job as fraternity men when on campus to represent our fraternity and IFC in the best way we can.

Thus I must ever conduct myself so as to bring respect and honor not to myself alone, but also to my Fraternity preaches the idea that we need to keep our respect and honor for ourselves and Phi Kappa Psi. We do this by following the previous stanzas, the creed is an excellent ethical guide to keeping our honor and earning the respect of others through the way we treat other people around us. The reason this stanza is so important to me is the fact that it ties together everything said previously, being courteous and cultured and giving aid to those in need along with the rest of what the creed calls us to do can be summed up by bringing respect and honor to you and your chapter. Follow the creed and be the man that makes our organization what it is, and the rest will follow. This is what makes us who we are, it is the embodiment of what we agree to at our initiation and how we strive to be as men of Phi Kappa Psi.

What do you want to accomplish in your role as an Archon?

It's easy to see that the fraternal system and Greek life in general is being assessed in ways that have caused major issues for chapters around the country. Hazing in our chapters has quite clearly lead to a plethora of issues that we need to deal with in a way that not only keeps undergraduates safe but preserve the values that make our organization what it is. As Archon, I hope to help steer this fraternity in the right direction with the board by being involved in making smart, calculated decisions that a



majority of undergraduates and alumni can agree on that doesn't compromise chapters and our new member process.

If elected Archon, I would hope to help the executive council preserve our chapters, grow, and uphold the values that make us Phi Kappa Psi. With every decision the fraternity makes, I feel it is important that they keep in mind the desires of not only the undergraduate brothers who are actively realizing the advantages that this brotherhood provides, but also the alumni who have already enjoyed those benefits. I think the National Fraternity has done a good job introducing programs that help undergraduates, with the introduction of health and wellness program in an age where many may experience a variety of wellness issues, and the introduction of the Professional Development Conference in 2017. Expanding these programs and providing resources to prepare undergraduates for the real world is one thing that will make our brotherhood an asset and make the fraternal system an invaluable asset for colleges and universities across the country. In addition, I believe we need to take a serious look at the trial run by the national fraternity and look at the results and make the necessary steps to cut out hazing while simultaneously not compromising our organization's values and ability to vet potential brothers.

More importantly, and on a broader scale, I want my kids to be able to have the same experience I did. This fraternity has given so much to me, and I cannot thank this brotherhood enough for the great things it has done for my future and my life. It pains me to see how the system is being dragged through the mud all because of the few when the majority are men I am proud to call brothers. I want to do whatever we can now to try to preserve this brotherhood and the great work it does for undergraduates and their futures. There is no support system in the world like this, nothing that can lead to the kinds of friendships and bonds that one gets out of this, and while I fully realize that one member of a ten person council can only do so much, I wouldn't be doing my due diligence if I didn't attempt to do whatever I can now to make sure that not only we keep chapters running, but running well and producing the same if not better experience than Phi Psi already produces.

Why do you feel you are qualified for the position of Archon? What strengths do you bring to this position?

With my experience in leadership positions in my chapter, I am confident I have what it takes to serve as Archon. I have served as Risk Management Chair, Treasurer, then along with Treasurer this past fall I served as Fraternity Education Chair, and this past December I was elected GP. In each of these positions

I feel as if I have not only fulfilled my responsibilities but helped to set new standards for the positions. My time as risk management chair was productive, as the committee and I introduced new ways of conducting ourselves at events and handle different situations, and as a result we had no risk violations during my tenure. As Treasurer, we had the first surplus in savings as a chapter due to budgeting and smart spending from the committees and have led to a steady growth in savings in order to reach a figure that would ensure we could still operate if we came under heavy fines or some other unusual circumstance that chapters sometimes face. When I took over as Fraternity Education chair, I created a new test and a new curriculum that focused not only on individual growth, but also a deeper understanding and teaching of the creed and history of our fraternity in order to ensure they are made



into worthy members of our great fraternity. Now, as President, I have made great strides in fulfilling our accreditation requirements, and we have had far more philanthropy events than ever before, in conjunction with not only with other Greek organizations but other student organizations as well.

Along with chapter positions, I have a wealth experience outside of just my chapter. Leadership-wise I am an Eagle Scout and have spent time at the Nelson Leadership Institute's Pivot program where I learned a great deal about what makes one a leader and how to live a successful life and even returned this spring as an intern. Between both the Professional Development Conference as well as the Grand Arch Council, I have now had the pleasure to attend 3 executive council meetings thus far in preparation for running for this position.

With my leadership qualities and work ethic, I feel I will have no problems tackling the challenges associated with the position of Archon. With every position I have served in thus far, I have tried to put all of my effort into making sure that I was accountable of myself and the brothers I worked with in order to ensure that the job got done well. If elected, I can promise every chapter that I will work hard to ensure that our brotherhood succeeds in all aspects, and I hope that I can help to the board to ensure the state of the fraternity improves over this next biennium and beyond.

Introduce yourself:

My name is Eric Nangle, and I am a brother from the Ohio Xi chapter at Capital University, and I was initiated in the Fall of 2017. Within my chapter, I am the current service chair, but I have been involved with our grievance committee, recruitment, fundraising, and I served as the previous Sergeant at Arms. I have been interested in becoming a District Archon since I attended the Grand Arch Council in the summer of 2018, where I had the opportunity to learn more about our national fraternity and how it functions. I was inspired to find a way I could contribute to our cause, so when I had a talk with the alumni from my school, they strongly recommended the position of District Archon. Since then, I have taken on positions on my campus that demand leadership, and outside of Phi Kappa Psi I have served as the leader for the publicity team within an on campus Christian organization known as Cru, and I lead a Greek life bible study across campus. Within Capital's student government, I am currently the Leadership and Management Senator and was previously the Natural Sciences Senator, as well as an active member of the academic affairs committee. I was aware that establishing leadership positions was most certainly not enough, so I reached out to current District II Archon, Hunter Music, and the two of us have met on multiple occasions and discussed the requirements of a proper District Archon, as well as advice for fulfilling the role to the best of my ability. I will cover that information in the other essay questions. Overall, I am very eager to learn more about this position, and I look forward to attending the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School in June.

What does being a member of a national fraternity mean to you both as an individual and as a member of your chapter?

Being a member of a national fraternity as an individual means a lot to me in the sense that it the fraternity has given me so much: loving brothers, opportunities to grow as an individual, and a large source of networking that will help me plan my future. As an individual, I believe it is my right to give back to my fraternity and being a member of the national fraternity as an undergrad would be a fantastic opportunity to do that. GAC marked my first national event and seeing how it operates on that level really did give me inspiration to give back, as I understood just how much work goes into each chapter. Most of all, it was truly incredible to see all the men who return time after time to the Grand Arch Council, as that level of dedication is something I want to have when I graduate. They come back and gladly pay the price every time, and that's because at the end of the day they know that those relationships they have developed with brothers from other chapters far outweigh the cost of the trip. Working for the national fraternity gives me a chance to grow as a leader and work to do what is best for my District, as that was one of the things Hunter kept highlighting when we would talk. You reach out to your chapters when a tough decision arises, so you can conclude what best suits your District. Regarding what this means to me as a member of my chapter, I believe it is a great way to inspire some



of my brothers who may need that right now. Our chapter has had a tough recruitment season the past two semesters, and I believe one thing that would really help us out is having someone within that organization that works on a national level, as to me that seems extremely professional and shows just how well that fraternity prepares you for the future. Phi Kappa Psi has helped me grow so much as a man, but that is something you can't simply convey to someone in five minutes during a tabling event. Rather, it's how the men present themselves, and the authenticity they give off when in conversation. I joined Phi Psi because they were the most professional looking group on campus, and I believe that becoming a District Archon will help our chapter reach that position again across campus. It will not solidify that, as one man cannot change a chapter, but I most certainly believe it will help us gain some inspiration.

One of my favorite sections of The Creed is located in the third stanza, which reads this way, I believe that I am honor bound to strengthen my character and deepen my integrity.

This section of The Creed has always stuck out to me considering that as a man, my reasoning behind joining our fraternity was to become a man that can inspire others, just like the older brothers inspired me. Strengthening one's character is no easy task, but I can honestly say I have experienced in my time with Phi Psi. Deepening your integrity is something most do not fully comprehend, as it really is a tough process. I learned this first hand during my spring semester freshman year, as a couple of seniors challenged me to get more involved on campus and become a leader. Since then, I have taken their advice, and I have become a man with far more integrity then when I first started at Capital. As a potential Archon, I find this section of the creed to be crucial, as someone in charge of multiple chapters needs to be a man with high moral standing, and the ability to do the right thing for their District. Not every aspect of being an Archon is easy, and that was something Hunter initially made clear to me. You will have instances that you need to discuss suspending a chapter, and conversations like that are not easy to have. It requires one to look at what is really best for the national fraternity, while at the same time keeping in mind the brothers at that chapter. You need to find a way to outweigh the pros and cons of each side, and that was something I experienced when I was involved in the grievance committee my freshman year. I learned about how tough decisions like that can be, but integrity and character help to make that process easier, and ultimately it bettered our chapter. I can honestly say that as a result of joining Phi Kappa Psi, I have indeed strengthened my character and deepened my integrity, but there are always opportunities to grow, and I certainly believe being a District Archon is one of those areas that would help.

What do you want to accomplish in your role as an Archon?

As a District Archon, I would love to have developed a relationship with at least one brother from each chapter within our District, as those relationships would be able to benefit both of us, as well as the national fraternity. I could rely on them when a tough decision arises while they would be able to get their voice out there, and the national fraternity would be getting a decision that truly expresses the interest of each chapter in our District. Networking is such a critical aspect to making an organization work, and many often overlook its value. It is great to know people have your back in decisions you must make and being able to represent them is an honor I would love to have. In addition to this, I would love



to attend as many initiation ceremonies for new chapters as I can, as well as attend chapters of nearby campuses at least once. I know it is tough for Archons to travel as a college student, and many do not attend all their chapters, but I certainly believe that going to nearby campuses is a realistic goal. I can honestly say that the other seven chapters in Ohio would be realistic to attend during my schoolyear, and perhaps others out of state would be possible during the summer. I would love to be an Archon that has met members in person from other chapters, aside from those who attend national events. As for my final goal, I plan to be an Archon that people feel comfortable reaching out to for their issues, whether it be alumni or students. Representing my District would require I stay in contact with other chapters in my District, but I want to go a step beyond that and assure them that I want to hear ways I can help them out. I have been told that District Archons should anticipate multiple calls each week from alumni who have questions or complaints, but I want to let my undergrad brothers know that they can still reach out to me for help, as I learned you are not always as likely to hear from them. It could just be something as simple as a weekly email I send, or something more formal like a phone call. I want to be an Archon people know they can reach out to, and I got that impression from Hunter the first time I asked him to meet up with me. I am inspired to act in the same way, as something as simple as that shows just how much an Archon cares for their District.

Why do you feel you are qualified for the position of Archon? What strengths do you bring to this position?

I believe that I am very qualified for the position of an Archon, given the vast amount of leadership roles I have acquired on campus, the national exposure I have had, and the people I have met and talked to about the position. First, I gained these leadership roles so that I would grow as a man, and so I would be prepared for what it is like to represent a large population. From Phi Psi, Cru, and Student Government, I have had that opportunity to represent different sections of our student body, and I can say I am confident deciding what best suits their needs. None of us are perfect, yet our fraternity expects perfections from its members. Our Creed encourages us to hold ourselves to higher ideals than we would normally. They are like the bylaws of our lives. As district Archon, I will work to ensure every chapter operates with the intention of realizing these lofty ideals.

What do you want to accomplish in your role as an Archon?

A national fraternity the size of Phi Kappa Psi, I imagine, runs efficiently only so long as each chapter is well connected to our national organization. Our identity - the creed by which we live - differentiates us from others. A certain level of conformity must be shared between each and every chapter, colony, and alumni association of Phi Kappa Psi to maintain our identity. This is essential, in my opinion, because without it, we absolve to nothing. A consistent identity lends itself to a predictable culture which assists in our national agenda: ritual, educational programs, risk mitigation, and, ultimately, our reputation.



If elected Archon, I plan to strengthen District VI through heightened communication and support of each chapter held within it. This would assist my advocacy and expertise in regards to my district at Executive Council meetings. Failure to keep detailed tabs on each chapter would, in my opinion, render my position useless. Therefore, I would seek to form strong relationships with each chapter president in order to ensure I know how their chapter is performing. I'll keep track of key performance indicators, such as grade point average and service hour totals. I'll require termly check-ins to be more detailed than in the past, as it is the one time (currently) an Archon is in contact with the District VI presidents.

Why do you feel you are qualified for the position of Archon? What strengths do you bring to this position?

I am qualified for the position of Archon because I have a deep understanding of the opportunities Phi Kappa Psi offers its members and community. Since joining Freshman year I have served in a number of different leadership roles including Recruitment Chairman, where I learned - first hand - the art of budgeting, event planning, and marketing. I understand the challenges our chapters face because I have spent nearly all of my time in Phi Psi trying to find solutions to them.

Although I find it difficult to write about my own strengths, I believe I am intelligent, fair, and well organized. I am quite good at inspiring my peers towards action. I enjoy designing policy which can help my chapter and am usually pretty good at articulating it. I believe the more efficiently a chapter operates the more successful it will be and am eager to contribute my knowledge and expertise to the chapters in District VI.

Moreover, as chapter president this past year I have observed a crucial time for Greek Life where it is necessary for chapters to adapt to new stipulations from universities, insurance groups, and society. As Archon, I would be the instigator of such change. To represent District VI's chapters at the national level while working with them to instill these changes - and to promote transparency and a sense of interconnection and identity while doing it - would be a continuation of the great honor it has been to serve Phi Kappa Psi.
