He continued to work at Wright-Patterson for over 2 decades on other defense programs of national importance in areas of electronic warfare and low observables technologies and was involved in the early development of the B-2 bomber's self-defense systems. Later, David moved over to the Wright Aeronautical Laboratories, where he became the founding Chief Engineer of the fledgling "Signature Technology Office", a new organization that was responsible for developing a wide range of advanced "stealthy" technologies for future aircraft. That office still recognizes individuals by awarding the "David W. Berrie" Excellence in Technical Management Award to this day. In 1988, he moved from Dayton to Alamogordo, New Mexico to take the Director role at the RATSCAT radar test range at Holloman Air Force Base. In this capacity, David instituted nationally important test range improvements that are still used today. In 1992, he retired from the Air Force and took a position with the Lockheed Skunk Works in Burbank, California. Throughout his entire career, he worked on technologies that influence the design and performance of today's advanced conventional and stealth fighter and bomber aircraft. In addition to his technical expertise, David had a unique talent for mentoring; many of his co-op students and young engineers went on to important (and often high) positions in government and industry. Through them, his influence will be felt for many years to come. He was well-respected within the technical community, served the Department of Defense on several special boards and commissions, and always upheld the core values of the Air Force by exhibiting "integrity first", "service before self", and "excellence in all we do". He retired to Richmond in 2002. David was a lifelong member of The Ohio State University Alumni Association, a charter member of the Association of Old Crows, and a member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers. Alan Tingquist '64

Alan Keith Tingquist passed away on Thursday, March 5th, inking the final chapter in the story he began one month shy of 75 years ago in Irwin, PA, where he was born to his parents Stanley Carroll Tingquist and Loretta Mae Pederson. Alan's formative years were spent between Sparta, NJ—where he attended school—and Becker, MN—where his grandparents' farm provided an idyllic setting to pass the summers. He acquired some small town fame in Sparta, making local headlines for his accolades on the baseball and football fields. Sports were his first



real passion, and a hobby that he pursued collegiately at the University of Minnesota and nearly professionally when several minor league baseball clubs briefly scouted his shortstop play. A career on the diamond never materialized, but he did graduate in 1968 with a Bachelor's degree in Psychology and a proud member of the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity. Finishing college in the height of the Vietnam War meant that Psychology would have to wait. He instead voluntarily enlisted in the United States Coast Guard and was shortly off to basic training. He graduated from Officer Candidate School in 1969 and was commissioned as an ENS. His service posted him first in Galveston, Texas and then in Okinawa, Japan, where he spent two years as the CO of the Hokkaido Loran station on the island of Miyako. He was discharged from active duty in 1972, but returned just five years later, logging periods of the following years both as an active reservist and active duty officer. He retired in 1993 with nearly 21 years of service and the rank of Captain. Alan was fiercely proud of his country. Very few things in his life rivaled the significance he placed on his military service. One of the things he did treasure more was the time spent with his loving wife Kathy. He met her in Bridgewater, NJ at his first civilian job at Ethicon. She agreed to marry him and they spent 44 years happily ever after. Together they nurtured a son, a daughter, two dogs, three cats, and some unknown number of goldfish. He had careers in banking and consulting that moved them to Phoenix, St. Louis, New York City, and Chicago before ultimately finding home near Cleveland, OH. He also continued his education, achieving an MBA from the University of Arizona (1980), a graduate degree from the Naval War College (1985), and an MA from Depaul University (1993). As a member of the American Legion, he became involved with the Hudson Community Service Association. As a vice-chairman of that group, he worked to address food insecurity within the Hudson School District and was instrumental in the launch and daily operations of Hudson's Food Pantry. Alan was a genuine, jovial, hard-working, and kind-hearted man. He is survived by his wife Kathleen Ann Tingquist; his daughter Tara Lynn Tingquist and her fiancée Ivan Francisco Ruiz; his son Bradley Keith Tingquist and his wife Maria Cristina Melendez; and his granddaughter Ebba Maria Tingquist. 

Warren Kennedy '47

Warren Robert Kennedy died peacefully of natural causes at his home in Williamsburg, Virginia, on April 6, 2020, at the age of 96. Warren (Jamie to his friends) was born on October 13, 1923,



in Rockville Center, Long Island, as the second son of Harry Kennedy and Josephine Sherrer Kennedy. He grew up in Rockville Center where he attended the local public schools. At the outbreak of World War II, Warren joined the U.S. Army Air Corps where he achieved the rank of Sergeant, serving in the 9th Troop Carrier Command, 437th Troop Carrier Group, 84th

Squadron. He was stationed in England, France, and Belgium for the duration of the war delivering troops and supplies via air to the combat areas of Europe. At the conclusion of the war, Warren took advantage of the G I Bill and enrolled in the College of Business Administration of Syracuse University. He joined Phi Kappa Psi fraternity and completely engaged university life. It was at Syracuse University that he met the love of his life, Jane Eyerly, eldest daughter of Edward Grone Eyerly and Marion Schimpf Eyerly. Warren and Jane were married at The Church in the Highlands in White Plains, New York, on June 15, 1948. After graduating from college in 1949, Warren was hired by the J.L. Hudson Department Store in downtown Detroit, Michigan,

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second in size only to Macy's of Manhattan. It was in Detroit that Jill was born, the first of Warren and Jane's three children. In 1951 Warren was hired as a buyer for E.W. Edward's Department Store and the family returned to Syracuse. It was there that their second child, Scott was born. In 1955 Warren joined the J. C. Penney Company to become a buyer for Penney's national chain of stores. The family moved to Garden City, New York, and Warren commuted to Penney's New York City headquarters. In 1960 Jo Ann Kennedy was born, and the family was complete. As the Penney Company expanded, Warren was sent further and further afield – Japan, Singapore, The Philippines, Italy, Spain, and Germany – in order to seek out quality clothing items for retail in the national chain. This experience instilled in him a love of other cultures that won him friends across the globe. The year 1965 was life-changing: Warren was made European Buying Manager for the Penney Company, and he and the entire family were transferred to London, England. Here he was free as never before to direct his own business affairs, to enjoy the rich life that London provided, to travel throughout the continent, and to engage the diversity of cultures that is Europe. At this time he discovered a love of skiing that led him to Kitzbuhel, Wengen, Saas-Fee, and Zermatt, where, for short periods, he would sail the mountains. In 1970, with the ready availability of inexpensive goods from other countries, Warren reluctantly closed Penney's European office, said good-bye to London, and brought the family back to the U.S. to settle in Old Greenwich, Connecticut. Again Warren commuted to Penney's Manhattan office. However, the lure of London turned out to be stronger than anyone anticipated. When the opportunity arose to join a start-up corporation called Dimension Weld—which owned the manufacturing rights to a new fashion applique process—Warren left the Penney company and signed on as European Distribution Manager of the new Dimension Weld Corporation. In 1972, the family again relocated to London and their second tenure turned out to be just as rewarding as the first—with one difference. During the first London venture the family had lived the entire time at Wellington Court overlooking Hyde Park; this time, their residence changed every year—Camden Hill Court, Astell Street, Albert Hall Mansions, Trevor Square. As a result they were able to experience several different neighborhoods of London, their shops, their pubs, and their local culture. In 1976, Warren again closed down a European office, returned to the U.S. and settled in Wilton, Connecticut. Here Warren and Jane resided until his retirement. Soon after retiring, Warren and Jane moved to Norwich, Vermont—their favorite area of New England. They spent several happy years in Vermont, but ultimately settled in Williamsburg, Virginia, where Warren continued to enjoy many of his favorite activities including travelling, skiing, dining out, hosting friends from across the seas, playing golf, and collecting antique clocks. For many years, he volunteered at the local public library, and he always looked forward to serving as one of the marshals at the Kingsmill PGA golf championship. He leaves behind his devoted wife of 72 years, Jane Eyerly Kennedy; his three children: Jill Marsceill (Michael), Scott Kennedy (Carole Dyal), Jo Ann Russell (Morgan); six grandchildren, Christopher and Patrick Marsceill, Sam, James and Ben Kennedy, and Henry Russel; and an ever-growing number of great-grandchildren.



Charles Stroh '56

Charles "Chuck" Stroh, who worked at newspapers across the Midwest and served in production at The Blade for nearly 30 years, died March 14 at Hope Hospice of Fort Myers, Fla. He was



81. He died of complications from pneumonia, his family said. Mr. Stroh became a newspaper man soon after graduating from Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio in 1959. He received his bachelor's degree in interior design, but he and a fraternity brother who would become a lifelong friend began traveling the Midwest, buying newspapers, improving them, and selling them, his son, Mark Stroh said.

"They would go into a town and they would buy a newspaper, a weekly. They would strip it down, rebuild it, fix things, get the production costs lowered - do everything they could to make it a functional and profitable paper," he said. "They would then sell the paper and move on to the next town, as it were." Mr. Stroh worked at newspapers in Indiana, Pennsylvania, and Kentucky before he and his friend and business partner, Thom Dunlavy, and their families moved back to Ohio. He was the general manager of the Port Clinton Daily News for just over a year and began at The Blade in 1969 as a production assistant, Blade archives show. He was promoted to production manager in 1972 and to operations director in 1993, where he supervised prepress production, the pressroom, mailroom, and maintenance department. "Chuck was proud of all his years at The Blade," his wife, Lois Stroh, said. "He loved The Blade. He worked there for a long, long time and met many, many friends there." He oversaw several changes in production technology, his son said, including The Blade's conversion from "hot type" to "cold type" when printing the physical newspaper. He remembers his father would read the newspaper and then show his family his hands. "Look. Hands are clean," he would say proudly, to emphasize the paper had been printed correctly. While he oversaw technological changes in the news business, he did not embrace them in his personal life. He never owned a

cell phone or a computer. "He always wanted the actual printed paper in his hand," his wife said. "He didn't want to read it on the Internet or anywhere else. He wanted to hold it in his hand." Mr. Stroh's sons each had a paper route over the years, and he would wake up at 4:30 or 5 a.m. to greet The Blade truck that delivered the newspapers to their home. He and the kids would then stuff the newspapers with the ads and then load them onto their bicycles for delivery. On Sundays, that work was followed by doughnuts and church, son Mark Stroh said. He lived in Port Clinton with his wife, Jane Herud Stroh, whom he met at Wittenberg University and married in 1959. They had three sons. When they divorced, Mr. Stroh moved to Toledo. He married Lois Young, who worked in health care and also had three sons, on July 27, 1979. The couple moved to Sylvania and lived there until they retired in 1996. In retirement, they lived in Cape Coral, Fla., because they loved the warm weather. Mr. Stroh was an avid runner, basketball player, and softball player and continued to play in a softball league until recently, his son said. The couple belonged to Faith Presbyterian Church. Mr. Stroh was born March 19, 1938 in Sewickley, Pa., to Katherine and Charles Stroh. He was preceded in death by his son, Daniel Stroh, who died in 1996, and whose wife, Molly Stroh, survives and lives in Toledo. He is survived by his wife, Lois Stroh; sister, Carol Kemp; sons Steven Stroh and Mark Stroh; step-sons William Young, Steven Young, and Stewart Young; and five grandchildren. Growing up in Perryville, Rhode Island, he spent time on the family farm helping to raise chickens, pigs and chinchillas, and selling eggs to neighbors. He was a graduate of South Kingstown High School, where he first started his training as a sports broadcaster, broadcasting basketball

games into a tape recorder in the balcony of Fagan's Hall in Peace Dale. To pay his way through college, he owned a clam cake and chowder stand at Roy Carpenter's Beach that he and his sister, Barbara, ran during the summers until it was washed away by the 1954 hurricane. Jim earned a degree in Civil Engineering at the University of Rhode Island, and was active in his fraternity, Phi Kappa Psi, a member of the Sachems, worked as manager of the baseball team, editor of the student newspaper, manager of the radio station, and treasurer of the student senate, while simultaneously broadcasting basketball and football games on the college radio station. He was also a member of ROTC and upon graduation, served several years on active duty with the United States Army, transitioning into Reserve Status until he retired as a Major many years later. Upon leaving Active Duty, he earned a Masters in Radio-Television Communications at Boston University, where he was one of the first sports news broadcasters on Boston television. His career at his beloved URI, his alma mater, began as a faculty member in the speech department in 1961. He became the Sports Information Director in 1971, and broadcast the play-by-play for 1,286 consecutive football and basketball games on commercial radio, never missing a contest in 34 years. He singlehandedly built the radio broadcast network for URI sports that continues to this day. During his career, Jim received more than 60 major awards for his outstanding contributions in the broadcast and sports information fields, and was inducted into seven Halls of Fame in Rhode Island, including the Rhode Island Heritage Hall of Fame, the URI Athletic Hall of Fame, the Rhode Island Radio Hall of Fame, and the Rhode Island Journalism Hall of Fame. The Meade Stadium press box at URI is named in his honor; he was active in Words Unlimited, the Providence Gridiron Club and many other RI professional organizations; and was listed by the Providence Journal in 1995 as among the "Top 40 Most Influential Persons in Sports in the past 40 years in Rhode Island."

Jim was a long-time member of Peace Dale Congregational Church. In the years where Berta was the chair of the Christmas Bazaar, he would help out as the cashier of the "White Elephant" sale, greeting everyone with a few words and his signature smile. Jim loved the many family and friend get-togethers where he would regale everyone with his wonderful stories (and if we were lucky, a taste of his famous clam cakes and chowder). Hobie was also a member of the Walpole Society, the Society of the Cincinnati, the Custis Pond Fishing and Hunting Club, the Cohoke Club, the Commonwealth Club and St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

Perhaps more than anything else, Hobie always showed warmth, gentleness and compassion, traits he exemplified every day of his life. Richard Andrew “Randy” Austin was born at Swedish Hospital in Seattle on September 22, 1948 to James R. and Barbara H. (Pat) Austin. He passed away November 16, 2019, after a long battle

with T-cell lymphoma and HLH. Randy grew up in Magnolia and was a 1966 graduate of Queen Anne High School. During his senior year of high school, he had the opportunity (unheard of today) to fly on a Boeing 727 test flight, including time in the co-pilot's seat. That experience drove his career path and spawned his two favorite sayings: “People make money doing this?” and “Why work for a living if you don't have to?” Randy earned a BS in Aeronautical & Astronautical Engineering from the University of Washington in 1970, where he was a member of Phi Kappa Psi fraternity and UW NROTC. Upon graduation, Randy received his commission as an officer and became a Naval Aviator. He was attached to Patrol Squadron VP-22 (the Blue Geese) at Barber's Point, Oahu, Hawaii, flying the P-3 Orion; deploying to the Indian Ocean (Diego Garcia), Okinawa, Thailand, Iran and the Philippines. He was also on board for the squadron's last deployment into a combat zone during the Vietnam War. Following active duty, Randy returned to the Northwest and spent time with VP-69 at NAS Whidbey, helping introduce the P-3 to the squadron. In 1976, Randy joined the Boeing Company where he worked for over 35 years. He started as a performance engineer on the 747 program in Everett, but soon moved on to be an instructor pilot, and then a production flight test pilot in 1979. Randy logged over 12,000 hours of flight tests, piloting every jetliner model Boeing ever made. He was the Lead Production Pilot on both the 737 and 777 and an FAA DER. Randy recorded many “firsts” and “mosts” as a Boeing pilot. In 2005, he was one of four Boeing pilots that broke the world record for distance with a commercial aircraft, flying the 777-200LR from Hong Kong to London - the long way around (13,423 miles, taking 22hrs and 22 mins). Randy reluctantly retired from Boeing in 2011, having spent most of his life doing what he loved the most, flying above the clouds. During the 70's and 80's when Randy was not flying, he crewed on Unlimited Hydroplanes and raced in the APBA inboard classes, owning and racing five different hulls all numbered 747. Randy set records not only in the air but also on the water. He set an APBA five-mile closed-course record and won numerous APBA regional, divisional and national championships in the Jet and 7-Liter modified classes. Randy also volunteered at Seafair for over 30 years as the race official/judge assigned to the Admiral's Barge (Old Man IV) at the start/finish line, where he acted as an ambassador between the racing community and Navy brass in attendance. Randy met his wife Patty, a Boeing engineer, on a 757 flight test in 1992. They married in August, 1995, and together they had four children. Randy was fully devoted to his family, always putting them first, supporting their endeavors, and paying for it all without complaint. He watched countless soccer games and dance recitals, and was the best damn taxi-dad ever. He will be remembered for his love of aviation, car racing, hydroplanes, classic rock, war movies, the Huskies, and his family. He is deeply loved and sorely missed. Randy was preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his wife of 24 years, Patty, and

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their four children: Dylan (UW, Physics, 2017), Connor (Purdue, Aeronautical Engineering, 2020), Lindsey (UC Santa Barbara, Marine Biology, class of 2023), and Evan (Shorewood High School, class of 2023), all of Shoreline.
