Brother Finds in Phi Psi a Pathway to Immense Opportunity

For Matthew D'Alessandro '15, a recent philanthropy week stands out as one of the most memorable and meaningful moments of his Phi Psi journey.

"Each year our 'Phi Psi 500' weeklong philanthropy event helps raise money for the Boys & Girls Club. In recognizing our chapter's greatest strength lies in service to others, we took a bit of a different spin this year," says chapter president D'Alessandro. "We challenged ourselves, and every Greek organization on campus, to prepare themselves to complete as many community service hours as possible throughout that week. We set and surpassed a goal of completing 700 volunteered hours, which provided an economic impact of \$17,000 to our local nonprofit community."

The staff at the Boys & Girls Club was thrilled with wave after wave of Phi Psi and other Greek students giving their all for the kids they serve. "We played, we helped with homework, we talked. Many who volunteered went above and beyond what we asked after many of the club kids would ask, 'Hey, are you going to come back tomorrow?' This week of volunteer service has led to many lasting relationships."

Philanthropy is just the beginning of the advantages Brother D'Alessandro has gained since joining Phi Psi his freshman year. Having held previous posts as Interfraternity Council Delegate and Vice President of Operations, as well as Indiana Epsilon's Philanthropy & Service Chair and House Improvement Chair, Matt credits the Fraternity as instrumental to his personal and professional growth. "It has allowed me to develop greater confidence in my leadership capabilities, it has strengthened my personal commitments and resolve, it has allowed me to be part of something greater than myself."

The close-knit brotherhood, in fact, is what catapulted Phi Kappa Psi to the top of the list when Matt was considering whether to join Greek life at all. The mentorship and friendship of one brother, along with the presence of a house, stood out to him as defining factors.

"Senior Richard Schraeger '13 was one of the first Phi Psis I encountered," he recalls. "He introduced himself and we quickly discovered that both of us were meteorology majors. We realized we had a lot in common and kept in contact. He took me under his wing and wanted to get to know me as a person — not just another potential recruit. He taught me by his example to work hard and to take advantage of all the opportunities I could. Most importantly, I watched him stand up confidently for what he believed in when things were tough. He showed me the true meaning of being a Phi Psi and encouraged me to live by the Creed. Because of Richard and confirmed through my interactions with others, I knew this was the place for me."

Brother D'Alessandro points to why having a house keeps the brothers close.

"It's a place to build stronger relationships. At night I'll simply walk the halls and start a random conversation and end up talking with a brother for hours. There's the very important built-in help for homework, career direction or simply general advice. It's all about camaraderie, community and being able to help someone on a moment's notice because you're right there."

Brother D'Alessandro hopes his legacy will include helping younger brothers develop their skills by involving themselves as much as possible in the operations of the chapter. "I want my brothers to recognize all the ways their fraternity membership can help them achieve personal and professional growth. And it's not just about their own enrichment, but also realizing that they are part of something larger. It's about helping the group be successful. And I believe that we really are working harder every day to better ourselves and each other."

With the current residence showing its age, the challenges of upkeep have mounted in recent years. "This past year several pipes burst and I'm certain it's not the last time," Matt says. "The plumbing isn't what it should be. It's an incredible place because of all the memories – but the structure is beyond where it's suitable for living and academics."

The brothers feel a sense of awe towards the past, and a strong responsibility to the future as they prepare for the eventual move. With valuable input from alumni, plans are in place to incorporate certain pieces of the original structure into the new construction to represent as fully as possible the illustrious history and traditions associated with the beloved chapter house.

In addition to his numerous leadership roles within Phi Psi, Matthew D'Alessandro is a member of Valpo's Storm Intercept Team, the American Meteorological Society and Order of Omega. He serves as the building supervisor for the campus arena and is active at the St. Teresa of Avila Catholic Student Center. GRANDSON OF FOUNDING FATHER Pays Tribute to His Legacy

Harrison Jenny's Phi Psi Story began 65 years ago, when his father's parents both attended Valparaiso University. "In 1953, my grandfather was a founding father of our Indiana Epsilon Chapter," Harrison says. "He passed away before I was born, at just 56 years old. But growing up and hearing about him was one of the most significant reasons I eagerly looked into Phi Kappa Psi when I chose to attend Valpo. He was a very successful businessman, a CEO, and also very devoted to his family – someone without physically ever meeting that I have always wanted to emulate."

Harrison's father and uncles also chose Greek life at Valpo, all joining the ranks of Sigma Phi Epsilon. As Harrison went off to college, his dad understood that his son might be torn about which fraternity to join. Harrison recalls his advice: "It's the brothers that are the most important — what they're doing, what they stand for and what they represent."

For Brother Jenny, Phi Kappa Psi's staunch commitment to serving others stood out right away. He'd heard many stories of how his grandfather lived out Phi Psi's values in his own life. He ultimately chose the men for whom "the great joy of serving others" was so evident. "In Phi Psi I found what I was seeking: a group of like and unlike minds to be around and grow with, individuals who would complement my academic and athletic life."

Having spent the past year living in 801 Mound Street, Harrison is committed to ensuring that treasured pieces of its past are able to be carried forward to the chapter's new home. "From the letters that hung outside our original home, the Wolf Den, to the charter, to the names of those who lived within 801 engraved on doors and walls, there's so much history here."

Brother Jenny will miss his room, dubbed "The Panther" — which he calls "the best" suite in the current house. "Everybody's often congregating in our room; it's a gathering place" he says proudly. At the same time, he's very eager for what lies ahead, and even sentimental about his pledge class being the brothers who see the changing of the guard, house-wise. "I get chills thinking that my class may be one of the last to live here on Mound Street. It's the end of an era but a very important start to the next stage of our rich history at Valpo."

The impact the Fraternity has had on Harrison's life extends far beyond just his living quarters. He has benefited by numerous leadership and growth opportunities, serving as the chapter's treasurer and attending the Woodrow Wilson Leadership School and the Nelson Leadership Institute's PIVOT program in Florida. "I'm thankful for the opportunity to be treasurer because of its value to my finance/accounting major. I also serve as Health & Wellness Chairman and New Member Education Chairman." These experiences have provided Brother Jenny opportunities to strengthen his skillset and embrace leadership responsibilities.

Another critical experience as a Phi Psi at Valpo has been receiving hands-on advice from wise and successful alumni. "Not every fraternity has such determined and gracious alumni – men truly eager to help us as undergraduates," Brother Jenny notes. "I remember a quote by one Phi Psi alumnus that has stayed with me, 'The only constant in life is change.'"

That quote certainly applies to the chapter as Harrison and his brothers prepare to bid a fond farewell to their current home.

Recently, the group discovered a time capsule on the main floor, thought to be about 25 years old. When alumni gathered for a recent golf tournament, Harrison mentioned the find. Among those in attendance were the very brothers who had helped compile its contents. "They sat down with me and we went through all the photo albums and other items. They described everything in the capsule and what it meant. It was inspiring to again recognize that I am part of something bigger, something larger than myself."

For Brother Jenny, there is an indescribable sense of community created within 801 Mound. And while he says the current location "has a ton of character," he admits that the facility is past the point of just needing updates. "It's time for Indiana Epsilon to open the doors of brotherhood to future generations in a new home – a modern, safe, efficient, competitive and well-resourced chapter house."

"I'd just like to say thank you so much to our incredible alumni! It's hard to put into words what you do for us. It's very special for you to give back out of what was hopefully a great experience for you."

This giving tradition is one Harrison says he looks forward to carrying on long into the future.

Harrison Jenny began his junior year in the fall of 2018. In addition to the above-mentioned roles, he has served as Risk Manager and is a former Division I swimmer. He is the grandson of Frederick Franklin Jenny, founding father of Indiana Epsilon.

Yesterday

Initiated by members of the Phi Kappa Psi chapters at Beloit, DePauw, Illinois, Indiana, Purdue, Northwestern and Wabash, as well as national officers, Indiana Epsilon was established in 1953. After a long history as the Phi Delta Psi Fraternity, the decision to transition from a local fraternity to an affiliation with a national organization was made in 1952. The chapter became the fifth chapter in Indiana and the 57th nationally. One of those in attendance during the weekend celebration noted "it was an outstanding event in Phi Psi history, and will be long remembered by members of both the Valpo Chapter and those on campuses all over the country." In total, 39 undergraduate members of Phi Delta Psi and a number of alumni were welcomed into Phi Psi's strong band, a desire that was born on Christmas eve, 1914, when Phi Delta Psi was founded by seven men interested in "a stronger than average friendship."

From these humble beginnings, Indiana Epsilon prospered and found themselves on top of the Valpo Greekletter ladder, as athletic, social and academically astute gentlemen. As Valpo's third fraternity to 'go national', Phi Psi found itself, over the course of the first few decades, living in what was referred to as the "Wolf Den". A 1955 initiate commented, "Phi Psi has meant more than a college home or a basis for the organization of championship golf and football teams. The traditions and inspirations of Phi Psi have developed the personalities and mutual understandings of its members." Through the 1950s and 1960s, the chapter's undergraduates' fraternal commitments did not detract from prominence as members and officers of other campus organizations and assets to many of Valpo's varsity athletic teams.

In the 1970s, the chapter remained competitive in intramurals, regularly capturing the All-Sports Trophy. The group also won first place in Songfest and always created a top-notch Homecoming float. 1970 saw great transition as the group moved into a new house, the current structure, located on the site of the previous house and categorized itself as "individuals within a brotherhood." In 1978, 20 young men joined the chapter, at a period when membership was low. These men, in concert with university and national Phi Psi support, banded together stating "conformity is not our ambition, but enhancement and encouragement of each other's individual talents."

In 1982, the chapter's hard work was recognized with the Ralph D. Daniels Award for House Excellence, a national award given every two years for chapters with high performance. The 1980s continued with chapter members heavily involved in campus leadership positions. Academics were a focus with the group receiving the highest average chapter GPA semester after semester. The group also remained competitive in the other campus-wide competitions including the Greek Run and Homecoming festivities and in the mid to late 1980s, the newly

establish Greek Week competition. A commitment to philanthropy and volunteer service was also evident. From assistance with the annual Popcorn Festival, volunteering at the Canterbury Nursing Home, to participating in Big Brothers Big Sisters, donating to the American Cancer Society and sponsorships through Compassion, the group made its mark on the community.

Throughout the 1990s and 2000s, the chapter remained active within the university and greater Valparaiso community. With brothers serving on Student Senate and the Interfraternity Council, Union Board, Chapel, Admissions Office, and campus honor societies, as well as resident assistants, cheerleaders and members of other teams, the chapter members were leaders on campus. Intramural dominance continued as did a commitment to community service. In 2003, Indiana Epsilon hosted a celebration commemorating its 50th anniversary, which was followed later in the year with the chapter receiving national top honors as Phi Psi's Grand Chapter.

Throughout its history, Phi Psi has enjoyed the social bonds of the fraternal experience. Date parties, homecoming pairings with sororities and special events were always highlights. The chapter prided itself on several signature events including its annual Country Club event as well as its Travel and Beach parties.







TODAY

The chapter relentlessly supports the campus and local community, philanthropically. Year after year proving its commitment through volunteering the most hours in total and per member of any Greek organization. Current membership outpaces all other fraternities and the chapter continues to maintain a GPA greater than the all-male average.

From farm fields to city suburbs, young men from diverse backgrounds come to find their home at 801 Mound Street. It is here they develop and mature into great family, business and community-minded men. The current chapter house has served our chapter for nearly 50 years, far outliving its initial life expectancy of 25 years.

Despite regular upkeep and maintenance, it is time for a new home for Indiana Epsilon. To remain competitive with other fraternity houses and residence halls, the chapter house would require a significant and very costly renovation. To stay in the current facility, the plumbing, electrical and fire suppression systems would need to be updated and major renovations to the kitchen, bathrooms and parking lot need to be completed. While the shell of the house is nearly indestructible, it is also extremely costly and difficult to make the repairs and updates necessary to make the house competitive and a desirable home for our undergraduate brothers.

With our society ever changing and evolving, we believe that there has never been a more important time to offer an opportunity for group living to young men of character. We also know an undergraduate's physical surroundings have been shown to dramatically affect his overall academic performance, and, thus, it is our duty to ensure our young brothers have the tools and resources to be successful. Twenty-first century students at Valpo have many housing choices, and we need not only a home for our undergraduate and alumni brothers to gather but also one that is competitive with newer and updated décor, technological access and safety requirements – a house we can be proud to call Indiana Epsilon's home.

The stakes have never been higher for Phi Kappa Psi at Valpo. Sigma Phi Epsilon, Sigma Chi and other fraternities on campus are engaged in capital campaigns to build new houses. We have an opportunity to continue to lead, as we have done throughout our history at Valpo. Today, we can set the gold standard for fraternity living on campus.

This opportunity to secure our future comes at a time when there is a great need for educated, ethical leaders – men of conscience and action who are prepared to take their places in society as citizens, professionals, husbands and fathers. With a new modern home, Indiana Epsilons from all generations will have the opportunity to share in the bonds of brotherhood at Valpo for years to come.

The Vision

Indiana Epsilon is a fraternity built on the notion that although our men will make mistakes – as we all do – we will return to our values and allow the Phi Psi Creed to guide our way. Along with the building of a new chapter home, the House Corporation and Chapter have established programs and policies to assist in fostering the appropriate environment for our members' success and to ensure the facility will be properly managed and maintained.

A FOCUS ON BROTHERHOOD

With every aspect of this project, the focus is on building on the culture of what makes Phi Psi exceptional. A chapter meal program necessitates an adequate dining room, full kitchen and a serving space with all-hour access for coffee and snacks. Social spaces, including a designated living room and lounge space, create the environment for conversation and comradery; a place for our brothers to come together.

SUPPORT FOR ACADEMICS

Valpo is as academically challenging as ever and the need for an enhanced, quiet, comfortable and flexible study space within our facility is necessary. We have seen the impact of technology over the years, as devices not present during our college years are now necessities. Our plan will ensure that Phi Psi continues to excel academically and remains a scholastic leader on campus and within the Greek community.

RISING COMPETITION

Across the country, the collegiate housing market is thriving and Valparaiso is no exception. Students identify housing and facilities as one of the top three factors when determining their school choice. No longer are we just competing with other fraternities, but we must also compete with the amenities offered in newly renovated on-campus residence halls and off-campus apartments. Additionally, many of our interfraternal counterparts are similarly engaged in housing campaigns.













MEAL PROGRAM

Indiana Epsilon continues to be the only chapter on campus with an operational meal program. In recent years, the program has witnessed a dramatic overhaul and is better supported and professionally resourced. With breakfast, lunch and dinner service, that includes healthy foods and technology such as an online menu and ordering app, the chapter has attested to the bonds created over breaking bread together.

HOUSE DIRECTOR

An adult presence in the chapter house will provide guidance, risk management assistance and be responsible for the general condition of the property. They will oversee move-in/move-out and have several housing administrative tasks.

CODE OF CONDUCT

Annually, every member signs a Code of Conduct outlining clear expectations of membership and behavior.

UNIVERSITY SUPPORT



Where We are Headed

It was indeed exciting when the Phi Delta Psi Fraternity brothers assembled on June 10, 1933, for the purpose of purchasing a new house, known later as the Wolf Den, which sat on the site of the current chapter house at 801 Mound Street. The purchase price, plus the funds needed for improvements at the time, amounted to \$3,300, of which \$500 was collected from alumni, \$300 spent on improvements and \$200 used as a down payment. "Our home is located on the corner of Mound and Garfield, a strategic location since the University plans on growing east from the present campus."

Today we can once again move our chapter's footprint to a strategic location within the Valpo campus. The new chapter house will be located on the lot which previously housed the radio station and recently the VUPD office. The site is located across from the Sorority Housing Complex, steps from the Athletics-Recreation Center and within what is positioned as an expanding Greek row.

The project is significant and larger than any effort previously undertaken by the Indiana Epsilon alumni. 

FLOOR PLANS




NORTH ELEVATION




South Elevation
